The King has been pleased to present the Reverend William Spencer Whitelocke, Clerk, Master of Arts, to the Vicarage of Gedney, in the county and diocese of Lincoln, void by the death of the Reverend Doctor Douglas.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the forty-third year of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting certain goods imported into Great Britain to be secured in warehouses without payment of duty," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the importer or importers, proprietor or proprietors, consignee or consignees, of any of the goods, wares, or merchandise, enumerated or described in the table thereunto annexed, marked (E), and which shall have been legally imported or brought into the port of London, to lodge and secure in a warehouse or warehouses to be provided for that purpose, any such goods, wares, or merchandise, under the joint locks of the crown and the merchant, without payment at the time of the first entry of the duties of customs due on the importation thereof: and it is by the said recited Act further enacted, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, or any three or more of them shall deem it expedient, that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to any goods, wares, and merchandise, not enumerated or described in either of the tables annexed thereto, and should cause a list of such goods, wares, and merchandises, to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions, of the said Act, shall extend to such goods, wares, and merchandise, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said tables respectively, at the time of passing the said Act:

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in execution of the powers vested in us, in and by the said Act, do hereby declare, that it appears to us expedient that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to the articles of

legally imported or brought into the port of London (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies); and that such pigs' chaps, pigs' faces, and German sausages should be added to the list of goods, wares, and merchandise enumerated and described in the table annexed to the said recited Act, marked (E), and that such pigs' chaps, pigs' faces, and German sausages should be lodged and secured at or in such warehouse or warehouses, under the regulations and directions of the said Act: and we do further declare, that from and after the publication of this our certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the directions of the said Act, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions of the said Act shall extend, and be construed to extend, to all such pigs' chaps, pigs' faces, and German sausages, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the table annexed to the said Act, marked (E), at the time of the passing of the same Act.

**N**OTICE is hereby given, that application will be made at the next General Quarter Sessions of the Peace to be held at Kirton, in and for the parts of Lindsey, in the county of Lincoln, by and on the behalf of the Reverend Daniel Sheppard Wayland, Vicar of the Parish of Kirton, in Lindsey aforesaid, and his successors, to have two persons named or appointed by the Justices then and there assembled to be, together with a third person to be named and chosen by such two persons, arbitrators or referees, for inquiring into and ascertaining by or from or by means of the London Gazette, if the returns of the average prices of corn and grain shall be published therein, and in case of no such publication, then by such ways and means as they shall think equitable or proper, the average price of a Winchester bushel of good marketable wheat, within the said county of Lincoln, for the twenty-one years then last past, that the yearly corn-rents due and payable to the said Daniel Sheppard Wayland, and his successors, out of the lands and estates belonging to the several proprietors within the said Lordship of Kirton, in Lindsey aforesaid, may be ascertained pursuant and in conformity to the directions of an Act of Parliament made and passed in the thirty-third year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for dividing and inclosing the open common fields, meadows, pastures and other commonable lands and waste grounds, in the Lordship of Kirton, in Lindsey, in the county of Lincoln."—Dated this 21st day of January 1822.
