Warsaw, Nov. 29.

**T**He Advices that come from all hands of the great Preparations which the Turks are making for War, are received at the Polish Court with much Concern, and it has been confidently reported, That the King of Poland had resolved to enter into strict Engagements with the Emperor for their mutual Defence and Security against their common Enemy; but whatever disposition there may be on this side to such an Alliance, it is not to be doubted but a matter of so great importance will, according to the constitution of this Government, be referred to the consideration of the Dyet, which the King has therefore appointed to meet here in January next. In the mean time the Imperial Minister at this Court is not wanting to do his part in this Conjunction. From Moscow we have advice, That the Czar had caused their Ambassador, who had been sent to Constantinople with the Ratification of the Peace concluded between the last Czar and the Grand-Signior, to be upon his return imprisoned, and his head to be cut off, for having gone beyond his Commission; and that the Czar had sent Forces towards the Ukraine to retake several places which are now in the hands of the Turks, and which the Moscovites say were not yielded to them by the Peace: This news has occasioned a report, That a new War is breaking out between the Moscovites and the Turks; but they that know the present state of things at Moscow, and the jealousy and divisions that are among the great Men there, and threaten new Troubles, cannot believe the Moscovites will make any Steps at this time that may draw a War upon them.

Naples, Nov. 20. We are still expecting here our new Viceroy, the Marquis de Liebe, and great preparations are making for his Reception. In the mean time our present Viceroy, the Marquis de los Velez continues his care for the sending Supplies of Men and Moneys to the State of Milan, according to the Orders he has received from Spain. The German Regiment, consisting of 1000 Men, commanded by Colonel Urbino, parted from hence the beginning of this Month, being Embarked in 10 Tartanes, which meeting with very bad Weather, one of them was cast away on this Coast, but all the Men were saved.

Venice, Nov. 28. The Commission which this Senate has given Prince Alexander of Parma, is, to be General of the Foot; and it's said, they are likewise about choosing a General of the Horse. We have Letters from Constantinople of the 15th of October, New Style, which give an account, That on the 10th of that Month the Grand-Signior left Constantinople, and that his departure was attended with a great deal of Solemnity, as is usual when the Grand-Signior goes upon some great Expedition; That the Ottoman Forces were Marching from there,

motest parts of the Empire, and that the Horse Tail had been sent to the Bassa of Aleppo, and other Bassa's, who are accounted their best Commanders, which signifies a Command to them to repair forthwith to the Army; That the Grand-Vizier, as was said, intended to go as far as Belgrade to give the necessary Orders, and to return to Adrianople against the time that the Grand-Signior has done his Hunting, and arrives there; That the Grand-Signior would be absent from Constantinople three years; and that it was believed the Turks were so resolved on the War, that no Proposals that it can be expected should be made, will be able to divert it.

Genoa, Dec. 2. The 26th past parted from hence the French Gallies under the Command of the Duke of Mortemar, bound for Marseilles, but the ill Weather obliged them to put into Pado, where they still are. The Duke of Savoy continues at Moncaliari. It is said that some other Princes of Italy are come into the defensive League, lately concluded between the most Christian King and the Duke of Savoy. We have advice from Tripoli, That that Government is going to break with the French, and that they have cut off their Dey because he opposed it. It is said that preparations are making at Thoulon to put a very considerable Squadron of Ships to Sea against Spring, to be employed against the Algerines, under the Command of the Sieur du Quesne.

Vienna, Nov. 30. The great expectation here is, what Success the Negotiation that is now on Foot in order to prolong the Peace with the Turks, will have; much will be done on this side to obtain it, that so the Emperor may be at liberty to look towards Germany, but it is to be feared, that the Turks, after the great Preparations they have made, will not change their Resolutions, and if they do not, a very dreadful War is to be expected, for our Letters from Turkey say, That the whole Force of that Empire is bending towards Hungary. The Letters likewise speak of the departure of the Grand Signior with his whole Court from Constantinople; and consequently we may conclude that the Count Caprara, the Emperor's Minister, is on his return hither; but what was said of a Turkish Chiaus coming with him, needs a Confirmation.

Hamburg, Dec. 9. From Zell we have advice, That the Marriage between the Prince of Hanover and the Princess of Zell was privately solemnized the second Instant: From Berlin, That the Baron de Cracow was returned from Vienna, whither he had been sent by the Elector of Brandenburg to represent to his Imperial Majesty his Electoral Highness's opinion concerning the French Proposals; and that he had made report to his Electoral Highness of his Negotiation, in which it seems he has not had the desired Success. Our Letters from Stockholm of the first Instant tell us, That the Dyet had con-

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sent to whatever the King of Sweden had desired of them, and that his Majesty would be thereby enabled to erect a very considerably his Forces both by Land and Sea.

**Thoulon, Dec. 7.** This day arrived here a French Man-of War commanded by the *Sieur Foran*, with a Vessel he had taken from the *Algierines*. This Ship belonged formerly to *St. Malo*, and being taken by the *Algierines*, was bought by two Jews of *Argiers*, who having manned her with Dutch Seamen, sent her for *Holland* to take Ammunition and Cordage, and other things necessary for the Equipage of Ships. In her return from *Holland*, she joined a Fleet of 30 Dutch Merchant Ships under the Convoy of three Men of War, and came with them the beginning of the last Month into the Road of *Alicant*, of which the *Sieur Foran* and the *Sieur Aubin*, who were cruising in those Seas, having notice, they sailed for *Alicant*, and coming to an Anchor in that Road, they sent their Chaloupes to observe the said Vessel, and some Seamen of *St. Malo's* knowing her, the night following the said French Men of War armed out their Boats, who made themselves Masters of the said Vessel; which the Commander of the Dutch Convoy understanding, he sent to the *Sieur Foran* to complain that they had taken a Ship under Dutch Colours, and under his Protection; but was answered, that the said Ship belonged to Jews of *Argiers*, and was bound thither, and was a good Prize. There was a long contest upon the matter, but the French would not part with their Prize.

**Paris, Dec. 19.** The 14th Instant the Council of State made an Order forbidding the Exercise of the Protestant Religion at *Languedoc* and *Bedouin*, in the Diocess of *Sarlat*, and commanding, That the Protestant Churches there should be forthwith Demolished. And from *Mompeller* we have an account, That the Duke de *Niville*, the King's Lieutenant in *Languedoc*, had, upon the Orders he received from Court, executed the Decree of the Parliament of *Toulouse* for the Demolishing the Protestant Church at *Mompeller*. The Letters we receive from *Rome* tell us, That the Endeavours that have been used to accommodate the Differences between that Court and this, and particularly those concerning the Regale, seem not hitherto to have had any Effect, the Pope remaining very much dissatisfied with the proceedings of this Court, and appearing not at all disposed to yield on his side in the points in question. We have advice from *Germany*, That the three Ecclesiastical Electors, and two of the Secular, had declared, they thought, the Proposals which the French Ambassadors made at *Frankfort*, ought, in the present State of things, to be accepted, that so a firm Peace and good Correspondence may be established between the Empire and the Crown of *France*. We have advice, That the *Sieur de S. Amand*, whom our King sent with the Character of his Ambassador to the King of *Fex* and *Morocco*, arrived in the Road of *Téuan* the second of *October*; That the Algaide of that place being then absent, the Ambassador continued on Board the Man of War till his return, which was on the 17th, and then went ashore, and was received by the Algaide, being attended with 50. Horse, and 200 Foot; That the Ambassador was to stay at *Téuan* till the Express, that had been sent to the King (who it was said was three days Journey beyond *Morocco*,

making War upon his Nephew) to give him an account of his arrival, was come back.
