Men in Pow.ren and Bremen; and from Stockholm they write, that the Ki g of Sweden intends to encreate very confiderably his Forces in his Forcign D minious. Cur Letters from Danizick tell us, That there are great differences between the Duke of Courland and his Brothers, concerning the Execution of the Will of the late Duke their Father, and that the Elector of Brandenburg, their Uskle, has undertaken to accomstodate things between them.

Cologne, I ec. 5. The Courier which the Deputies of Liege lent-eight days agone to Liege, to give their Plincipals an account of what had paffed in the Conferences they have had with the Bilhop of Strashurg, and his Electoral Highness's Minifters, is not yet some back, but the Letters we receive from Liege inform us. That they are refolved not to quit the point concerning the free Election of their Magiffratez, but to maintain the Privile ges they are now poffeffed of, fo that things feem not fo well difpored to an accommodation, as was expected, and we are told, That the Bilhop of Sirasburg has declared, 1 hat if the City of Liege will not let matters come to an amicable composure, other means mult be made use of to bring them to realon. We have advice, as well by thoway of Hungary, as Poland and Venice, of the great preparations of the lurks. The Emperor has furtine Baron of Walderdorf to the Electors on the Rbine, to communicate to them his Relolution of coming to Ranisbonne. The Imperial Tro.ps are in their Winter Quarters, as well in Hungary as in other the Emperor's Hereditary Countries.

Bruffels, Dec. 15. His Excellency the Marquifs de-Grana, has ordered a Placatt to be published, nerwithflanding all the opposition that has been made in that matter, to give notice, That he will let the Kings Outloms in these Countreys to Farmfor three Years, counting from the first day of March next, and that the faid Farm will be Lett on the 14th of Faniary to the highest Bidders: And from Madid we have an account, That the King is likewile about Letting to Faim all his Cutions throughout Spain to the Marquits de los Balbaces, for ten Years, who will give four Mil-lions more yearly, than they have amounted to in any one Year within these ten Years last palt and befides will take off'a third part of the Duties that are now paid, for the encouragement of Trade. The Spanish Letters likewise tell us. That the Duke de Vila Hermofa, the Duke of Bournonvile, and the Count de Menterey, aré in nomination for the Government of Milan, and that it was believed it would be given to the Duke of Bournonville. From Coogne th y write That there have been great diforders becafioned by the dilputes between the Magiltrates and the Burghers, That the latter were for (everal days in Arms. but that this gs had been at last compoled. From Vienna we are told, That the Emperor was preparing to remove from thence to Rainborne, where he will convoke a great Affembly of the Princes and States of the Empire, to confult with them in order to the taking the neceffary Refolutions for their common Security.

Braffels, Dec. 18. The Placaet for the Letting the Luiloms to Farm is Publithed, which a great many People, effectially those that have been em ployed about the Finance, are very much dillatisfied at. The Affairs of Liege are in as much diforder as ever, those people seeming resolved note to yield the points which their. Prince the Elector of Cologne infilts upon, which are, Tl at the Militia shall be put into be bands ! And that their first Burgermaster shall be annually chosen by him.

Hague, Dec. 18. The Deputies of Holland and Zealand have had leveral meetings to adjust the differences between the two Provinces, concerning the Imposition upon Turff and other matters. The Here Citters, Ambasilator from this State to His Majelty of Great-Britain, is returning for England. Our German Letters tell us, That the Emperor intends to be at Ratiobonne about the latter end of fanuary, or the beginning of February, to confult with the Princes of the Empire upon the prefent exigency of Affairs.

Whitehal, Dec. 13. Some days fince arrived here Monfieur d'Haxthaufen, Envoy Extraordihary-from the Duke of Stefwig-Holltein. He has had his Audience of their Majeflies, and of their Royal Highnefles, being conducted thereunto by Sir Charles Cotterel, Mafter of the Ceremonies, in the ulual manner.
