**PRESENT,**

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-seventh year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 57, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend training, and to regulate the quotas of the militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order or Orders in Council, to suspend the calling out of the militia of the United Kingdom, or any part of the United Kingdom, or of any county, riding, shire, stewartry, city, town, or place, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in any year, and to order and direct that no training or exercising of the militia of the United Kingdom, or of any county or counties, riding or ridings, shire or shires, stewartry or stewartries, city or cities, town or towns, or place or places, specified in any such Order or Orders in Council, shall take place in any year, any thing contained in any Act or Acts of Parliament relating to the militia, to the contrary notwithstanding: And whereas it is deemed expedient that such training and exercising should be dispensed with in the present year; it is ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the calling out of the militia of the United Kingdom, or any part thereof, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in the present year, be suspended, and that no training or exercising of the said militia do take place in the present year.

accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to justice the persons concerned in the felony above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious pardon to any one of them (except the person who actually fired the said gun), who shall discover his accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

**T**HE Exchequer Bills dated in the months of August and September 1821, viz. 58 Geo. 3, cap. 45, for building additional churches; 1 Geo. 4, cap. 60, for carrying on public works and fisheries; 2 Geo. 4, £29,000,000, anno 1821, with the interest due thereon, will be paid off on the 26th day of June instant, when the interest will cease.
