To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, Freeholders, and Inhabitants of the County of Mayo, impressed with the highest sentiments of respectful attachment to your Majesty, and to your illustrious Family, beg leave to approach your sacred Person, with our renewed assurances of devotion and loyalty.

We offer your Majesty our dutiful acknowledgements for the paternal regard which induced your Majesty to visit this part of your dominions, and for the benign and excellent counsel which your were graciously pleased to impart, which had for its chief object to cherish and promote a spirit of concord amongst your Irish subjects.

Every act of your Majesty in Ireland, was calculated to excite in the minds of your people the warmest sentiments of gratitude, and in common with your Majesty we entertain a confident and gratifying persuasion that the influence of those acts will long continue to be felt, and that your invaluable parting admonition and injunction will not be left to us in vain.

We particularly recognize in your Majesty's immediate selection and appointment, on your return to England, of the Marquess of Wellesey to the Government of Ireland, the strongest evidence of your continued regard for the interest and welfare of this country. That eminent Statesman, whose brilliant services are already recorded in the history of the British empire, has been wisely chosen by your Majesty, as we hope and believe, not only to put an end to existing difficulties, but also to lay a solid and permanent foundation for the future happiness and security of this country, whose peculiar

circumstances it could not have been concealed from your Majesty, require that talents and experience, such as those by which His Excellency is distinguished, should be exercised in her behalf.

Deeply sensible of the blessings we enjoy under your mild and beneficent rule, and praying that your Majesty may be disposed to continue to us your most gracious protection and favour, we implore for you a long, happy, and prosperous reign over a grateful affectionate, and contented people.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 18th of May 1822,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the fourteenth of November last, for prohibiting the exportation of gun-powder, arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant May; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth day of this instant May), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port
