At the Court at Carlton-House, July 22, 1822.

A CHAPTER of the Most Noble Order of the Garter having been summoned for this day, the Knights Companions, in their mantles and collars, with the Officers of the Order hereafter mentioned, in their mantles, chains, and badges, attended the Sovereign in his own apartment soon after three o'clock; and, being called over by Garter Principal King of Arms, a procession was made to the Chapter-Room in the following order, the Prelate and Garter going no further than the door, not having been sworn:

Earl Bathurst.

Marquess of Londonderry. Earl of Liverpool.

Duke of Wellington.

Duke of Montrose.

Earl of Winchilsea.

Duke of Beaufort.

Earl of Westmorland. Marquess of Salisbury.

His Royal Highness the Duke of York.

Sir Thos. Tyrwhitt, Knt. Sir George Nayler, Knt.
Gentleman Usher of Garter Principal King
the Black Rod. of Arms.

The Lord Bishop of Salisbury, Chancellor of the Order. The Lord Bishop of Winchester, Prelate of the Order.

THE SOVEREIGN.

The Sovereign and the Knights Companions being seated, Black Rod acquainted the Sovereign that Sir George Nayler, Knt. Garter Principal King of Arms, attended at the door, and humbly prayed to be admitted to take the oath of office, as Chief Officer of Arms of this Most Noble Order: and Garter, in his mantle, and wearing the chain and badge of his office (with which he had been invested by His Majesty on the 10th day of May

last), being, by His Majesty's command, introduced by Black Rod, and kneeling near the Sovereign, the oath was administered to him by the Chancellor, Black Rod holding the book. Garter, rising, made his obeisance to the Sovereign, and having had the honour to kiss His Majesty's hand, withdrew to his place at the bottom of the table.

The Chancellor then acquainted the Sovereign that the Right Reverend Father in God Dr. George Tomline, Lord Bishop of Winchester, attended at the door, and humbly besought His Majesty that he might be admitted to take the oath of Prelate of this Most Noble Order, as enjoined by the statutes: whereupon the Bishop, in his mantle, and wearing his chain and badge (with which his Lordship had been previously invested by His Majesty), being, by the Sovereign's command, introduced between Garter and Black Rod, was conducted to His Majesty, and kneeling, the oath of office was administered to him by the Chancellor, Garter holding the book. The Prelate, rising, had the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand, and retired to his place on the right hand of His Majesty.

The Chancellor, standing in his place on the left hand of His Majesty, then signified to the Chapter the Sovereign's royal will and pleasure, that the vacant stall in the Royal Chapel of Saint George at Windsor he filled.

The suffrages were thereupon collected by the Chancellor (beginning with the Junior Knight Companion), and, by him, presented to the Sovereign, who was pleased to command his Lordship to declare, and he accordingly declared, that the Most Honourable George-James Marquess of Cholmondeley had been duly elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Then, by the Sovereign's command, the Marquess (being already a Knight) was received at the door of the Chapter-Room by the Marquess of Londonderry and the Earl Bathurst, the two Junior Knights Companions present, and con-

ducted between them to His Majesty, preceded by Garter, carrying the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion, and by Black Rod.

The Marquess of Cholmondeley kneeling near the Sovereign, and Garter presenting, on his knee, the Garter, His Majesty, assisted by his Royal Highnesses the Duke of York and the Marquess of Salisbury, the two Senior Knights Companions présent, buckled it on his Lordship's left leg; the Chancellor pronouncing the usual admonition.

Garter next presented the ribband with the George; and His Majesty, with the assistance of the aforesaid two Senior Knights Companions, put the same over the Marquess's left shoulder; the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition.

The Marquess, having kissed the Sovereign's hand, and received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions, withdrew.

The Chancellor then, by command of the Sovereign, read a new statute, bearing date the 13th day of February last, dispensing with the existing statutes as far as may be required for the especial purpose therein mentioned, and declaring *His Majesty Frederick the Sixth, King of Denmark*, a Knight of the said Most Noble Order.

After which the Chancellor, by the Sovereign's command, read another new statute, bearing the same date as the preceding, dispensing with the existing statutes, as far as may be required for the especial purpose therein mentioned, and declaring *His Most Faithful Majesty John the Sixth, King of Portugal and the Brasils*, a Knight of the said Most Noble Order.

The Chapter being ended, Garter, by the command of the Sovereign, called over the Knights Companions, and a procession was made, back to the private apartment of His Majesty, in the order as before.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-sixth year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 38, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to direct that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia shall take place; but that such ballot and enrolment shall remain and continue suspended for the period specified in any such Order of Council, and from time to time, by any like Order or Orders in Council, to continue such suspension so long as His Majesty shall deem the same expedient, any thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding: and whereas it is deemed expedient that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia should be suspended for the space of one year; it is, therefore, ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia do

take place for the space of one year from and after the date hereof, but that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia be suspended for the space of one year from the date of this Order.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the fourteenth of November last, for prohibiting the exportation of gun-powder, arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant May; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth day of this instant May), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place within the dominions of the King of Spain, or to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Straights of Gibraltar), or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places within the dominions of the King of Spain, or into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa (except as above excepted), or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council."

And the Right Honourable the Lords Com-

missioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the forty-third year of the reign of His late Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting certain goods imported into Great Britain to be secured in warehouses without payment of duty," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the importer or importers, proprietor or proprietors, consignee or consignees, of any of the goods, wares, or merchandise, enumerated or described in the table thereunto annexed, marked (E), and which shall have been legally imported or brought into the port of London, to lodge and secure in a warehouse or warehouses to be provided for that purpose, any such goods, wares, or merchandise, under the joint locks of the crown and the merchant, without payment at the time of the first entry of the duties of customs due on the importation thereof: and it is by the said recited Act further enacted, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, or any three or more of them shall deem it expedient, that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to any goods, wares, and merchandise, not enumerated or described in either of the tables annexed thereto, and should cause a list of such goods, wares, and merchandise, to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions, of the said Act, shall extend to such goods, wares, and merchandise, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said tables respectively, at the time of passing the said Act:

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in execution of the powers vested in us, in and by the said Act, do hereby declare, that it appears to us expedient that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to the articles of

legally imported or brought into the port of London (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies); and that such black or Dantzic beer should be added to the list of goods, wares, and merchandise enumerated and described in the table annexed to the said recited Act, marked (E), and that such black or Dantzic beer should be lodged and secured at or in such warehouse or warehouses, under the regulations and directions of the said Act: and we do further declare, that from and after the publication of this our certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the directions of the said Act, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions of the said Act shall extend, and be construed to extend,

to all such black or Dantzic beer, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the table annexed to the said Act, marked (E), at the time of the passing of the same Act.
