Geneua, December 30.

HE Referve Captain Boucher, arrived here this week from London, Alicant, and Valentia. The Genous Merchant, the Fane, and the Coichester Merchant are departed from hence.

Fienna, December 24. Yefterday arrived here an Express from the Island Sebus, and brought an account, That on the 20th Instant a Party of 2000 Turks marched from Newbeuset, with a design to pass the Danube, and to fall upon the Imperial Troops that are in Winter-Quarters thereabouts, but that the Regiments of Grana and Caffel, which are quartered in the Island Schut, having timely notice of it, drew together, and charg d the Turks, while they endeavoured to pals the faid River, so successfully, that they were forced to refire with confiderable loss; That the 21th at night a Party of Turks passed the Danube, but were so warmly received by the Imperialists, who were lodged in a small Port, that the Turks thought sit, aster having loft 80 Men, to repass the River, and to teturn to Newhensel, from whence they came, the Im-perialist loung only seven Men. The Palatine of Hungery has had a Conference with the principal Nobility of that Kingdom at Edenburg, of which he has given the Emperor an Account, and thereupon a great Council has been held here; and it's faid, that Orders will be sent to the Palatine and the chief of the Nobility to repair hither. The Colonels that have lately received Commissions to make new Levies, are ordered to have their Regiments on foot by the first of March, and upon failure therein, are to loose their Commands. The Emperor has sent Orders to the Count de Caprara his Minister at the Pors, to re-turn home. The Duke of Lorrain is expected here in few days.

Vienna, December 27. It being believed that the Turks have a defign to make themselves Masters of the Island Schut, the Emperor has ordered another Regiment to go and quarter there, and that everal Forts shall be built for their greater security Our Letters from Hungary give us an Account, That these is a very intimate Correspondence between Corps. Teckeler and the Bassa of Offen; and that the Gid Gount had publickly declared. That he had only given the Deputies he fent hither Orders to treat and conclude a Collation of Arms, that his Troops might quietly enjoy their Winter quarters, and that he was resolved not to hearken to any Proposals that may be s made for his leparate Accommodation. Francfore, January 6. From Vienna they write of the 27th past, that that Court seemed to be wholly taken up in providing for the War against the Turks, whose preparations, as we hear from all hands, are yery great,

Cologne, Fanuary 7. The Burghermaster Krebs, who was some time agone at the initance of the Barghers forced to leave this place, returned hither two days fince, and brought with him a Letter from the Emperor to the Magistrates of this City, whereby they are required to restore the said Burghermaster Kfebs to the Places and Dignities he formerly enjoyed. The Deputies of Liege are still here, but have not of late and any meetings with the Electors Ministers, each fide remaining firm in the great points that and in dispute between them; and from Liege the write, That the 32 Trades or Companies of that City bents, the last week Assembled, did declare their disk wo of the Letter which the Magistrates writ to his Electoral Highness, by their Deputies that are now here, and their resolution to maintain their Priviledges.
