Vienna, Fanuary 3 ..

Off of the Electors having excufed their meet ng th: Emperor at Ratiebonne in the prefent conjuncture of Affairs, there is now no more difcourse of his Imperial Majefties going thither ; but on the contrary, it is faid, that he will continue here, lest his removal might give a discouragement to these parts ; and at the fame time all poffible care is taken to provide for the fafety of this City: The Suburbs in Itead of being demolifhed are to 1 be fortified, with a Ditch and Pallifadoes; The Burghers fit for fervice are to be well inftructed in the exercife of their Arms; and all unnecellary perfons are to be put out of the place. We gave you an account in one of our last, that the Emperor had given out Commissions for five new Regiments ; but the Levies are not yet begun, the Officers demanding more Moneys, and time for the raifing the faid Regiments, than are allowed them. Great Magazines are providing in feveral places on the Waag for the fervice of the Imperial Army, which it's de-) figned fball encamp on that River; and Ingeniers have been fent to Raab, Comorra, Favarin, and Leopolfadt, to fee that the Fortifications of those places are in the condition they ought to be From Hungary they write, That the Turks have put a Garison into Caschaw, and that Count Teckeley had withdrawn the Troops he had there, from whence some would conjecture that there is no great confidence between the Turks and the Hungarians; The Letters add, That the Plague is broke out at Cafcham and other places : and a report is spread abroad, that Count Teckeley is dead ; but it needs a confirmation. The Turks have attempted three feveral times to make themfelves Mafters of the Island Schut, but have been as often repulled; Several Regiments are on their march to reinforce the Imperial Troops there, and the Emperor has ordered feveral Forts to be built for their greater fecurity. The Duke of Saxe-Eyfenach is arrived here.

Francfort, Fanuary it. From Ratisbonne we have an account, That the Electoral Colledge have written a Letter to the Emperor, wherein they earnefly defire, that a Treaty may be forthwith begun upon the French Propolals. The 8th Inflant the Deputies of the Empire that remained here, met the last time, and took their leaves of one another in order to their return home. Prince Waldecke, and the Counts of Naffaw and of Solms are arrived here. From Vienna they write, That the King of Sueden has offered to affift the Emperor with 10000 Men against the Turks, upon condition the Emperor pay them.

report here, that the French were making preparations in the Country of E)ffelt to receive fix thoufand Meu, which, it was faid, they intended to lodge there; but it was a Report which had no foundation, for we have certain advice, that the French have guitted and demclifhed the Caffig pf Aremberg, and that they have removed the Artille and Ammunition that was there, to Charlemert. The Elector of Cologne having written to the Chap-ter of St. Lambert at Liege, defiring them to fend a Deputation hither, they accordingly deputed four of their Body, who arrived here fome days fince, and have been feveral times with his Electoral Highness, he being defirous to confult wi h them concerning an accommodation with the City of Lieges The Deputies of that City had yesterday a Conference with the Bishop of Strasburg, the Deputies of the Chapter of St. Lambert being present; and things feem at prefent in a better dip fition to an accommodation, than they lately we'e.

Liege, Fanuary 4. Monileur de la Raudiere, the French Relident here, being come back from Cos logne, whither he went to Confer with that Elector concerning the Affairs of this City, did on the 26 pail acquaint these Magistrates, That his Electotal Highnels did policively infift to be reftored to all the Rights and Prerogatives he formerly enjoyed, and that he had prayed the most Christian Kings in case this City continued obstinate, to cause the Cittadel (which the French fomerime fince demolifhed) to be rebuilt; and that the King his Mat fler had commanded him (the faid Refident) th let them know, That though he defires they should give his Electoral Highness all the fatisfaction that is due to him, yet that he will dif-pole his Electoral Highnels to yield to fuch a Temperament as may reffor Peace and Tranquility to their City, provided they do on their part make fuch reasonable offers as may be an inducement 10 his most Christian Majesty to perfuade his Electoral Highnels to content himfelf therewith ; but, that if they shall refuse to make the Submissions and Reparations to his Electoral Highnels that becomes them, they will have reason to fear, that his faid most Christian Majesty will have other thoughts concerning them, which may not be so much to their advantage. The Magistrates hereupon thought fit to Affemble the 32 Trades or Companies, to acquaint them with what the faid Relident had communicated to them, that they might take a Refolution therein; And the faid Companies met accordingly, and with the Concurrence of the Magistrates, declared, That they thought this Pro-polition of the French Refident contained feveral points very prejudicial and dangerous to their Priviledges, and ordered, that their Deputies at Cologne should be made acquainted therewith; and that they should impart the same to his Electoral Cologne, Fanuary 12.
