

Hamburg, Feb. 24. The Letters we receive from Sweden give an account, That the States of that Kingdom were still Assembled, but that it was believed they would in 8 or 10 days have finished all the matters before them to the Kings satisfaction. That an Express, which the Count d'Albeim, the Imperial Minister had sent to Vienna, was come back, and that it was said he brought with him the Emperors Ratification of the Alliance lately concluded between his Imperial Majesty and the King of Sweden; and that Count Coningsmarke was on his departure for Pomeran, of which he is Governour. From Poland they write, that the Dyer of that Kingdom would be opened at Warsaw the 27th of this month, against which time Count Wallastain, the Emperors Ambassador was expected there, to negotiate an Alliance between the Emperor and that Crown.

Cologne, Jan. 26. The eight days which our Elector gave the City of Liege to make their Submission in, expired on Saturday last, so that we are now expecting what farther Resolutions his Electoral Highness will take to reduce those People to their Duty. The Deputies of that City continue as yet here, but seem to expect Orders for their return home. The Commonalty of this City continue their Assemblies in their several Halls, on occasion of the differences between them and the Magistrates, which, it's hoped, will be accommodated, that so this City may not be exposed to the inconveniences which the present Disorders may otherwise have to its prejudice. From Ratisbonne we have an account, That the three Colledges having resolved to Treat with Monsieur Verjus, the French Minister, they had likewise agreed concerning the manner of it, and had declared, that they would observe the accustomed method, viz. That the Result of the Debates in the three Colledges being ~~formed into a general Conclusion, it should be put into the hands of the Imperial Commissioner, that it might be communicated to the Emperor, in order to its having his approbation, which being had, it should be delivered to Monsieur Verjus, who should be desired to return in Writing his Answer thereunto.~~ From Vienna they write, That the Vice-Chancellor of Bavaria had had several private Conferences with the Emperors Ministers, in order to the concluding a new Alliance between his Imperial Majesty and his Electoral Highness; that the Baron de Waldersdorf, whom the Emperor lately sent to the Princes of the Rhine, was not yet come back; but that he was with some earnestness expected, for that upon his Report much would depend in relation to his Imperial Majesties Journey to Ratisbonne.

Brussels, Feb. 29. The matter concerning the letting the Customs to Farm is not yet finished, so soon as it is, his Excellency the Marquis de Grana will go for Antwerp to receive the Moneys which the Farmers are to advance. The Affairs of Liege are in great disorder, and it is much to be feared things will at last come to extremities. We are hitherto very quiet in these parts, and hope we shall continue so, the Advices we receive from abroad speaking very much of the disposition there seems to be to Peace.

Paris, Jan. 30. Some days since arrived here Count Mansfelds, the Emperors Ambassador to the King of Spain. It is said he has Orders to remain

some short time at this Court, and to make the Emperors Compliments to the King, the Queen, the Dauphin, &c. upon the Birth of the Duke of Burgundy. We have an account from Ratisbonne, that the States of the Empire assembled there, have resolved to treat with Monsieur Verjus the French Minister, in order to the establishing a firm Peace between the Empire and this Crown. Monsieur Fambonndau is returning to his station at Cologne.

Falmouth, Jan. 12. The 29 Infant came in here a small French Frigate called the Folie of Havre de Grace, in three weeks from Cadix, she came from thence with another Man of War belonging to S. M. A. O. and several Merchant Ships, from whom she parted off of the Lands-end. Here are likewise arrived the Golden Anchor of London from the Canaries, and the Merchant of London from Portugal.

Whitehall, Jan. 20. His Majesty has been Graciously pleased, as a Mark of his Royal favour to the Loyal Society of the Middle-Temple, to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon Humphrey Mackworth Esq; their Treasurer at the Bar.
