

have Letters of the 30 past, which do not speak of any motion of the French Troops in those parts, and tell us, that the Marschal de Humeries was not yet returned thither from Paris. An old Italian Ingenier is come hither from Douay, who pretends he can make Pistols, Muskets, and Cannons, carry twice the ordinary distance with half the quantity of powder they use to be charged with, of which he is to make a trial before his Excellency. We have Letters from Liege of the 30 past, which say, That the Magistrates of that City did endeavour all they could to dispose the Commonalty to submit themselves to their Prince, by representing to them the mischiefs they would by their obstinacy expose themselves to, in case his Electoral Highness should make use of the assistance which the Most Christian King has offer'd him; that the 32 Trades or Companies were to meet the next day to resolve what Answer they should return to his Electoral Highnesses last Proposition, but that it was feared they would not be brought to those Submissive Resolutions which are necessary for the preventing the extremities things seem falling into.

Paris, Feb. 6. The Provincial of the Celestins having in his Visitation been seized, by the Kings Order, at Rouen, he was brought hither some days since, and committed to the Bastille; the cause of his imprisonment is not known, but it is generally believed, that he is charged with having been concerned in the design there was to publish several Books written against the late Proceedings of the Clergy, which were discovered and seized some time since. The Primate and Clergy of Hungary having condemned the four Propositions of the Clergy of this Kingdom in their last Assembly, and a Paper containing the said Censure having been spread about here, the Kings Attorney General took notice of it, and informed the Parliament thereof, who thereupon, on Saturday last, sent several of the Doctors of the Sorbonne, and told them, That the Parliament desired to have the Opinion of the Sorbonne upon a Proposition extracted out of the said Censure, without acquainting them from whence it came. The Doctors proposed the same the first Instant to the Faculty, whose Sentiments thereupon is expected with great curiosity. It is said that the King intends to make 20 new Masters of Requests, which will bring four Millions of Livres into his Coffers. The third Instant the Count de Mansfelt, who during his stay at this Court, has the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, had his Audiences of the King, Queen, Dauphin, &c, and performed his Imperial Majesties Compliments upon the Birth of the Duke of Burgundy. From hence the said Count goes for Spain in Quality of the Emperors Ambassador. Yesterday the King was present at a Review of the Regiment of Suisse Guards, Commanded by the Duke de Maine. The Marquis de Crequi, Son to the Marschal of that name, is going to Marry with the Daughter of the Duke d'Amont.

Whitehall, Jan. 29. Whitehall, Jan. 31. His Majesty was pleased this day in Council to order His Royal Proclamation to be Published, Commanding all Officers of Justice, and other His Majesties Subjects, to use their utmost diligence for the apprehending all Robbers or Highwaymen; and particularly James Husbards, William Hill, John Ashburnham, William Hancock, Henry Bugby, William Blockson, Andrew Edwards, Philip King, William Harvey, John Newisod, and Francis Morley. Persons notoriously known to be such; and declaring, for the encouragement of such as shall apprehend any of these Offenders, That any Person or Persons that shall within the space of One whole year next ensuing apprehend any of the Persons above named, or any other Highwaymen, shall within fifteen days after his Conviction, have a Reward of Ten pounds for every such Offender so Apprehended and Convicted, to be paid by the Sheriff of the County where such Conviction shall be had, upon the Certificate of the Judge, or two or more Justices of the Peace before whom such Highwayman shall be Convicted, of such Apprehension and Conviction, which shall be allowed to the said Sheriff upon his Account in the Exchequer.
