Vienna, Jan. 24.

WE have an Account from Hungary, That the Turks have still their Eye upon the Island *Sibutz*; having some days since attempted the fourth time to make themselves Masters of it: they took the opportunity of the Frost, and passed the *Danube* with 3500 Horse, who fell upon the Imperialists, and at first put them into some disorder, but they rallying, recovered the ground they had lost, and at last obliged the Turks to retire and to repass the *Danube*. Since this news the Emperor has resolved to send more Troops thither for the greater security of the said Island. We have likewise Advice, That the Imperial Troops having forced the Protestants in the Berg-Towns to leave the Churches they had there, Count *Teckelej* has declared he looks upon it as a breach of the Truce on the Emperors part, and that therefore he will keep it no longer on his; upon which General *Caprara* has sent an Officer in great haste to Count *Teckelej*, to prevent his breaking the Cessation. The Preparations for the War are made here more vigorously than ever, the Emperor being resolved to employ his whole strength against the Turks; and that he may do so, it is said, he has resolved to accommodate matters with France. His Imperial Majesty intends, as is given out, to have three Armies in Hungary, composed of his own Troops and those of his Allies; and we are told, that the Circles of *Fraconia* and the *Upper Rhine* have undertaken upon certain Conditions to assist the Emperor with 24000 M.n. Two days since the Duke *de Croj* parted from hence for *Saxony*, to receive a Regiment of Horse which that Elector gives leave to in consideration of a Sum of Money, to pass into the Emperors Service. The Alliance which is Treating between the Emperor and the Elector of *Bavaria*, will, it is said, be concluded in few days.

Strasbourg, Jan. 25. We are expecting the return of our Governor the Marquis *de Chamilly*, who has been some time absent. The Baron *de Mouchet* Commands here in his absence; This week he caused a Company of the young Gentlemen, who are bred up here, by the Kings Command, in the Exercise of Arms, and are now stragg, to mount the Guard for the first time. The new Fortifications that are making here are carried on with great diligence.

Strasbourg, Jan. 30. We are at present very quiet in these parts, and hope we shall continue so; for we have Advice from several parts of the Empire of the great disposition there is to Peace. Five hundred Men are employed to enlarge the great way from this place to *Haguenaw*, and from thence to *Croon-Weissburg* and *Landaw*; and Mon-

sieur *de Monclar*; and the Intendant *de la Grange* have been to visit the Work.

Frankfort, Jan. 27. All the Deputies of the Empire that were here are gone home, so that this place is now very empty again. We are told that Prince *Waldecke*, at his late being here, obtained a promise from these Magistrates, That they will receive an Imperial Garrison into this City, whenever they shall stand in need of any assistance, and that in the mean time they will not be wanting to make the necessary provision for their defence.

Frankfort, Feb. 1. Our Letters from *Ratisbonne* inform us, That the Bishop of *Aichspade*, the Imperial Commissioner, had communicated to Monsieur *Verjus*, the French Minister, the Resolution of the Dyet to enter into a Treaty with him, but that the Term which the Most Christian King had allowed for the same being ready to expire, there could be nothing done until that King send a new Power to his Minister, of which we do not as yet hear any thing. The Letters we receive from *Kyenna* give us an Account, That that Court seemed now wholly intent to provide for the War with the Turks, which they saw could not be diverted; and that they were in great expectation concerning the success of Count *Wallstains* Negotiation in *Poland*; From whence our Advices tell us, That the *Poles*, how desirous soever they may be of Peace, will be obliged to enter into an Engagement with the Emperor, for that they fear the Turks, if they should be turned from the War they seem to be now preparing for, may employ their Arms against them.

Cologne, Jan. 29. The Sieur *Lenthe*, who was at the Conference at *Frankfort* on the part of the King of *Denmark*, is arrived here, having a Commission from that King to our Elector. The Deputies of *Liege* are expecting new Instructions from their Principals how to proceed, since the term which his Electoral Highness gave that City to make their Submission in, is expired.

Cologne, Feb. 3. The Burghers of this City continue their Assemblies, and at the same time the Magistrates are considering of the Complaints they have made to them, being resolved to give them all reasonable satisfaction. The Affairs of *Liege* are in a very ill posture, the Commonalty of that City not being to be prevailed with to do their part towards an Accommodation, and having now lately given his Electoral Highness a fresh occasion of offence by the Resolutions they have taken in their Common Assembly, in which the meaner sort have by their number over-powered the more considerable Burghers, who endeavoured all they could for to order things as to prevent the mischief that seem ready to fall upon them. The time which the French King allowed his Minister at *Ratisbonne* to receive the Proposals of the Empire in order to the establishing a firm Peace, expiring the first Instant, we are in some impatience to know whether

His Most Christian Majesty has prolonged the Term, upon the Resolution of the Dy-t at *Ratibonne* to Treat with Monsieur *Ferjus*.

Brussels, Feb. 5. Yesterday the Farm of the Customs was finally let to the *Seur Abbat* and his Partners, for Twelve hundred and seventy thousand *Livres*; of which they are to advance 200 thousand. The *Marquis de Granz* intends to go the beginning of the next week to *Amoy* to treat the Complaints of the Merchants, and to redress them, as well as to settle other matters. From the *French Conquests* they write, That neither the *Marquis d'Hamieres*, nor *Monheur de Mombroux* was, as yet, returned from *Paris*, and that in the absence the Troops continue very quiet in their Quarters. From *Liege* we have an Account, That the Commonalty of that City, in stead of submitting to their Prince, did justify what they had done, and were resolved to hazard all for the maintaining their Privileges, which we are not at all pleas'd to hear, for that it is to be feared, they will by their obstinacy not only bring themselves, but likewise the Neighborhood into Troubles. A Person, who came post from *Paris*, and arrived here this day, reports with great confidence, that the *French King* has put off his intended Journey to *Compeigne*.

Hague, Feb. 2. The States of *Holland* are Adjourn'd to the ninth of this month; and in the mean time the Prince of *Orange* is gone to *Dieren* to Hunt. The Merchants concerned in the Ship called the *Hope*, bound for *Angiers*, having represented to the States General, that the said Ship was some months since taken out of the Road of *Amoy* by two *French* Men of War, and carried to *Boulogne*; For the States did thereupon appoint a Deputation to carry the said Complaint to the *French* Ambassador, and to desire him, that it should appear to them, that the said Ship was not laden with any Contraband Goods, and to desire him to inform the King his Master thereof, that reparacion may be made for what has been done, so much as the prejudice of the Treaty of Commerce concluded between his Most Christian Majesty and this State; and we are told, that the said Ambassador has promised to employ his best offices in this matter. The *Heer Delwich*, Lieutenant General of the Foot Guards, who Govern'd of *Couerden*, being invited into the Service of the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and having thereupon desired leave to quit that he is at present engaged in, the States, and the Prince of *Orange*, who are unwilling to part with so good an Officer, have answer'd, That they cannot at this time consent to his Request, and have writen to the Elector of *Brandenburg* to make him a Compliment at this occasion.

Hague, Feb. 5. On Monday last the *Heer Hun Nicker*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Saxony*, had his first Audience of the States General. The States, upon the account they have received, that the Treaty that was broken up at *Francfort*, is going to be renew'd at *Ratibonne*, have sent Orders to the *Seur Packer*, their Resident at *Francfort*, to repair to *Ratibonne*, and to take care of their Interests there. The *Heer Van Amerongen* is returning to *Berlin*, and is the more hail'd, for that the States desire he should be there before the *Seur Dieft*, whom his Electoral Highness is sending back thither, comes away from thence. There

is nothing yet concluded concerning the Equipage of the 24 Men of War, which has been so much spoken of. We have Letters from abroad which speak very confidently of an accommodation of the present Differences between the Empire and Spain, and the *French King*.

Paris, Feb. 10. The Abbot *Mesnard* and the *Chanoine* of the *Colestins* are both released out of the *Bastille*, it appearing they are innocent of the matters they were suspected of. The Friends of *Monheur de Flammarin*, who, we told you, was lately seized for a Duel he was engaged in many years ago, are in great pain for him, though they hope an Expedient will be found out to save him, for that some Persons of the greatest Quality concern themselves on his behalf. It is said, that if the King have any considerable Army in the field this Summer, it will be Commanded by the Dauphin, and under him by the Prince of *Conde*.
