der intends to promote the new Levles with all the vigor he is able, and has already fixed upon feveral Officers to command them, but has not as yet given out their Commissions. Some thoughts there have been of entertaining a thousand Croats and some Hungarians for this Service, but this project was presently laid aside, believing those undisciplin'd people might not, without much difficulty, be brought to submit to their Mattial Laws, which might occasion great inconveniencles.

From Hungary we are advised, That the Hussars had by a party sent our towards Newhausel, taken away many Tu kish horses, besides other booty; whereupon the Governor of that place commanded 300 Turks to March after them, which they did, but with no success, the Hussars passing the River of Wang, and discovering the Turks in pursuit of them, broke down the Bridg behind them, and so made their escape.

chandizes.

The Siege of Dendermond has not proved so successful as was expected, the Town by the opening of their Sluices having drowned the Countrey about it, which much disturbing our Army in the League, and his Majesty being also assured of strong Succors put into it by Count Marsin, it was thought fit to draw off, much of the baggage being lest behind by reason of the too hasty retreat of our men for fear of the Inundation, baving besides other Officers and many Souldiers, lost the Marques, de Villarde killed by a great shot from the Town.

Whilk the Marshall d' Aumont was drawing off from thence, the Duke d' Enguyen was ordered with a considerable body of Horse to invest Lills, which was done the ninth infant, the Army marching after to form a Siege, not despairing of success; though besides the Cirizans, which are very numerous, and trayned up to Arms, there are also in it 3000 Foot, and 1000 Horse, and the Town commanded by the Count de Eronuy, an experienced Souldier, and excellent Officer. We are even now informed, that our Army is alresdy possess of the Suburbs, though with a considerable loss of our Men and Officers, and that they hope in sew days to give a good account of the City.
