

# The London Gazette.

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Naples, January 12.

**T**HE sixth Instant arrived here our new Viceroy, the Marquis de Liche: On Monday next he will make his publick Entry, and take possession of the Government, which is as yet in the hands of the Marquis de los Pelez.

*Venice, Feb. 6.* This State is going to encrease its Forces: and we are told that a League is Negotiating for the preserving the Peace of Italy. Our Letters from Rome of the 25 past inform us That the Pope had ordered that 200 thousand Crowns shall be forthwith remitted to his Nuncio at Vienna, to be employed in the War against the Turks: and that the Pope had written to the Most Christian King to exhort him to employ his Arms against the Turks, and for that end to accommodate the Differences he has with the Princes his Neighbours.

*Vienna, Feb. 4.* The 2<sup>d</sup> past the new Treaty of Alliance concluded between the Emperor and the Elector of Bavaria, was Signed by the Imperial Commissioners, and by the Vice-Chancellor of Bavaria, and the next day an Express was dispatched to Munick, to give his Electoral Highness an Account of it: By this Treaty the Elector, as we are told, is obliged to furnish 13000 Men for the Service of the Emperor. Two days since arrived here an Express from Turin to call thither the Prince of Savoy, who had taken upon him the Command of a Regiment of Dragoons in the Emperors Service. From Hungary we have Advice, That the States of the Upper-Hungary, pursuant to Count Teckeleys Summons, were assembled at Caschau, and that Count Teckelely had proposed to them; First, That they should acknowledge him Duke or Prince of Hungary; Secondly, That they should raise the 40000 Crowns that are to be paid yearly to the Turks; Thirdly, That when He takes the Field the Gentry shall be obliged to mount on Horseback, and to follow him. However we have still hopes of Peace.

*Vienna, Feb. 7.* The Prince of Savoy parted from hence on Monday last for Turin. The Express that was sent to Municken is come back with the Elector of Bavaria's Ratification of the Treaty that was Signed here the 25 of the last Month. It is reported, that the following Articles or Conditions are offered by the Grand Signior to the Hungarians,

1. That Count Emericke Teckelely de Retzmarsh, of the Illustrious House of Prince Gabriel Berbelem, shall be Established King of Hungary, and that upon his decease the Grand Signior will take the Queen, his Wife, whose Father lost his Life for his Fidelity to the Port, as well her Person as her Lands, under his Protection. 2. That the Hungarians, after the death of Count Teckelely and his Children, shall be at liberty to choose whom they please to be their

King, but shall be obliged to give notice of their Election to the Port. 3. That the Honorary Present of 40000 Crowns which the Hungarians have promised to pay the Grand Signior every year, shall not be augmented on any pretence whatsoever. 4. That the Hungarians shall be maintained in all their Priviledges, Liberties, Franchises, and Immunities. 5. That the Grand Signior will defend them against all their Enemies whatever. 6. That he will assist Count Teckelely to subdue all that do oppose him in Hungary. 7. That he will not make a Peace with the Germans, but with the inclusion of the Hungarians. 8. That he will put into the hands of the Hungarians all the Places which the Ottoman Forces shall take, in the same condition they shall find them. 9. That he will inviolably maintain, in as much as they concern the Hungarians, the Conditions of Peace made with the Germans at St. Gothard. 10. That the Jesuits shall be banished Hungary, and never again received there, and such Persons as shall endeavour their re-establishment shall be severely punished. 11. That the Tribute of the Places that have yielded shall not be augmented, but what they pay to the Port and to the Hungarians shall be continued in the same manner it is now. 12. The Hungarian Treasurers shall have free passage through the Ottoman Territories. 13. And coming to the Port with the yearly Presents, or upon any other occasion, shall be Honourably received. 14. The Grand Signior will by his Oath and Imperial Word oblige himself, and all the Ottoman Nation, faithfully and punctually to observe these Articles, unless the Hungarians do on their part break them.

*Ratisbonne, Feb. 11.* The latter end of the last week arrived here an Express from Paris, who, we understand, brought the Count de Crecy Orders to receive the Proposals that should be made to him, by the Dyet, and to Treat with them thereupon, without any limitation of time: but withal to let them know, that his Most Christian Majesty does not now look upon himself to be obliged to make good the Conditions he offered by his Ambassadors at Francfort, and by his Minister here, but that he will take such measures, as he shall think most convenient. In the mean time the Electoral Colledge and that of the Princes cannot agree in the first steps that are to be made in Treating with the Count de Crecy, and the Emperor continues to press them to take immediately in hand the point of the publick security, that the safety of the Empire may in this dangerous conjuncture be provided for; but the Electoral Colledge declare, they think it necessary first to accommodate matters with France, which being done, they may turn their whole care and application to establish the most effectual means for their common defence against the Turks.

*Cologne, Feb. 19.* Things have been of late in great

great disorder here, and a general Commotion was feared; but the Magistrates having given the Burghers satisfaction upon most of their demands, they are at present pretty quiet. Our Election has drawn his Troops out of *Nims Kesperwaerth Lim, Kempen*, and other places in the lower Diocess, which making about 2000 Men, are marched to *Bonne*, but with what design we know not. By the Treaty now lately concluded between the Emperor and the Elector of *Bavaria*, his Electoral Highness, as it is said, is in consideration of 300 thousand Florins, which he is to receive from the Emperor, to furnish 13000 Men for his Imperial Majesty's Service, which are to be employed in the Empire in the room of the Imperial Troops at present there, (who are to go and serve in *Hungary*, against the *Turks*) and are to be paid by the Emperor.

*Hamburg, Feb. 9.* We have Letters from *Warsaw* of the 29<sup>th</sup> past, which give us an Account, That the King of *Poland* arrived there the 25<sup>th</sup>, that the 17<sup>th</sup> the Dyet was opened, and that they had chosen the *Sieur Leszeroy* to be their Marshal or Speaker. It is still hoped that the Differences between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holsheim*, will be amicably composed.

*Brussels, Feb. 19.* The Marquis de *Grana* continues still at *Antwerp*, and we are uncertain when he will return hither. His Excellency has sent Orders to the Governors of the several Provinces, to repair to their Commands; and the Viadore General is passing from one Province to another to muster the Troops, which he does with great exactness. We have Advice, That the Count de *Montal* is at *Dinant*, and that, it's believed, he has Orders to draw the *French* Troops together, which the Most Christian King has promised to assist the Elector of *Cologne* with for the reducing the City of *Liege* to his Obedience. Our Letters from *Germany* tell us, That the Count de *Crecy* had received new Powers to Treat with the States of the Empire Assembled at *Ratisbonne*; but withal, that he had Orders to declare to them, That the Term which the Most Christian King had given to the First of *February* being expired, his Majesty was at liberty to take what measures he thought fit, without being tied to the Conditions he had before offered them.

*Brussels, Feb. 23.* The Prince de *Sarbacou* parted from hence this day to his Government of *Namur*; and the other Governors of Provinces that were here have likewise left this place, pursuant to the Orders they received from the Marquis de *Grana*, who continues still at *Antwerp*, and intends before he returns hither, to go for *Flanders*. From the new Conquests we have Advice, that the *French* Troops are drawing together near the *Meuse*, which, it's believed, are designed against the City of *Liege*, if those People do not submit themselves to their Prince, but suffer things to come to extremities. We are likewise told, that the *French* intend an Encampment near *Phalspuille*, so soon as the Season will permit it, and that in order thereunto the necessary Preparations are making in those Quarters.

*Brussels, Feb. 23.* The Letters arrived this afternoon from *Liege*, give an Account, That those Magistrates having again caused the 32 Fracks or Companies to Assemble, and represented to them the unavoidable mischiefs they would by their ob-

stinacy expose themselves to, they had resolved to submit to the Tax of the 60th Penny, (which they have hitherto refused to do) to shew their willingness to comply with their Prince, which is looked upon as a very good Step towards an Accommodation.

*Paris, Feb. 20.* The 17<sup>th</sup> Instant the Count de *Mansfeldt* had his Audience of Leave of the King, Queen, &c. and in few days will part from hence on his Journey for *Spain*. This week died here the *Sieur de Mestre*, a Citizen of this place, in the 118<sup>th</sup> year of his age, having been born in 1655, and having enjoyed a perfect health not many days before his death. The King will certainly part from hence the fourth or fifth of the next month for *Compeigne*; and, it's said, he will be back again at *Versailles* the beginning of *April*. We are now told, that the Duke de *Fermandois* will not go to Sea this Summer, as was reported, and that the *Sieur du Queine* is to Command the Squadron the King intends to employ against the *Algerines* this next Summer. It is said that an Army of 40000 Men will encamp the next Month on the *Joan*, under the Command of the Dauphin.
