

would go on with the Negotiation where it was broke off by the departure of the French Ambassador from Frankfort.) The Letters from Vienna inform us, That the Baron de Waldkirch, whom the Emperor had sent to the Electors on the Rhine, was returned, and had made Report to his Imperial Majesty of the success of his Commission, and that his Imperial Majesty had therupon charged his Intention of coming higher.

Frankfort, Feb. 20. The new Alliance between the Emperor and the Elector of Bavaria is Ratified, and the general belief is, that it will in a short time be further confirmed by his Electoral Highness's Marriage with the Emperor's Daughter. From Vienna they write, That the Emperor's Ministers had lately had several Conferences with the Marquis de Seppville, the French Envoy, concerning the Affairs of Germany; and that the Baron de Saponara was sent back to Count Teckely, with an Answer to some Proposals he had made to the Emperor, for the Establishing a Peace, as well with the Turks as the Hungarians.

Cologne, Feb. 23. Things are here very quiet again, the Magistrates having given the Burgers satisfaction upon their demands. It is said that the Elector of Cologne has drawn his forces together, to employ them against the City of Liege, and that Orders have been sent to Lieutenant General Lanzberg, who Commands them, to march thither.

Brussels, Feb. 26. We told you in our last that the Commonwealth of Liege had agreed to the Tax of the 6th Penny, imposed by their Prince, which proves a mistake, for the Letters we have since received from Liege give an Account, That the Magistrates had indeed consented thereto, but that the 23 Traders or Companies, who Assembled the instant, had absolutely refused to submit to the said impositions, and that the Magistrates durst not press them in it, fearing they might thereby occasion some great disturbance. What Resolutions the Elector of Cologne will take hereupon, we must expect to hear. Our last Letters from Cologne said, That his Electoral Highness has declared, that he will not make use of the Troops which the French do not him for the reducing his Subject of Liege to his Obedience. The French we hear are making great Provision at Philippsburg, where several Convoy have arrived very lately, which makes us believe they design some Action, so soon as the Season will permit; whereupon the Marquis de Grancs has ordered several Regiments to march for the reinforcing our Frontier Garrisons on that side. His Excellency has demanded a Sum of Money of the City of Antwerp, which, it's not doubted, but he will obtain.

Hague, Feb. 23. The Members of the States of Holland who have been to consult their Principals upon some important Affairs at present before them, are gone back. It is said the said States will separate the latter end of this week till the 15 of the next Month, and that the Prince and Princess of Orange intend to go to Dieren, and to stay there till the said States meet again. The Sieur Heinrich, whom the States General are sending in Quality of their Envoy Extraordinary to the Molts Christian King, has not yet begun his Journey, being undeniably indisposed. There is no Difficulties as yet concerning the fitting any Ships to sea this summer, save those which the Admiralty do not employ for Convoy.

Paris, Feb. 24. The necessary Orders are given out for the Kings Journey to Compiegne, which he will begin the fourth of the next month: The Court will return from thence to Versailles on the 26th, and it's said that this Journey will be followed by another of greater importance. The Doctors of the Sorbonne are to meet on Monday next, to conclude on an Answer to the Proposition they lately received from the Parliament of Paris, concerning the Authority of the Pope. The King, the Queen, the Dauphin, &c. after having Dined under Tents in the Plain d'Acere near St. Germain en Laye, saw several English Horses run, with which they were very much pleased; The King gives 1000 Pistolets to him that won.

Dover, Feb. 18. Yesterday arrived in the Downs from the River the Humber, Commanded by Sir John Berry, and the Happy Return; Besides these, there are in the Downs His Majesties Ship, the Dragon, the Foresight, the Ruby, the Woolwich, and the Mary-Rose, all out and about.
