INHERITANCE.—DIED AT WEIMAR.

MISS ANNE DILLON, many years in the Court service of Her Imperial Highness, Maria Paulowna, the Princess Hereditary of Saxe Weimar Eisenach, born at Dublin, 1752, deceased, at Weimar, the Metropolis of the Grand Duchy Saxony, the 1st of March 1823, without a last will, leaving a considerable estate to heirs being quite unknown; her heirs, and all those who claim this inheritance, by whatsoever title, are therefore cited to appear before the High Court of Justice, the Grand Ducal Regency, at Weimar, Saxony, on the 25th of May 1824, either in person, or by sufficiently empowered and instructed Attorney, for which reason the advocates of Court Blunse, Lubeck, Hase, Ackermann, Boettner, Lindig, and Steps, at Weimar, are hereby named to be chosen in that quality, and to form and prove their claims to this heirship, on pain, that every claim and title that cannot be proved sufficiently the day fixed, as well as every claim, that, after the fixed day elapsed, would be intended to lay to the said inheritance, cannot be regarded upon, and must be excluded by a judicial sentence; for this purpose the 27th of August 1824, has been fixed to the publication of this definitive sentence, to which Act all heirs, claimants, creditors, and pretenders of every kind to this heirship, are likewise cited on pain of loss of all their exceptions and of the appellation against this published sentence.—Weimar, the 5th of August 1823.
