From *Ratisbonne* we have an account, That the Electoral Colledge will treat with the Count *de Crey* upon the French King's Proposals, but the Colledge of Princes will not; That the Imperial Commissioner, the Bishop *d'Aichstadt*, presses them both to dispatch the Point of the publick Security: But that the Electoral Colledge will not enter upon that matter till a Peace be established between the Empire and *France*, and that in this the Colledge of Princes likewise differ from them, for these have declared they will at the same time that they Treat with the Count *de Crey*, deliberate concerning the making the necessary Provision for the defence and security of the Empire.

Frankfort, Feb. 26. The Emperor, as we are informed, will call all his Troops out of the Empire, except only three or four Thousand Men, to employ them in the War against the Turks, and in their stead the Elector of *Bavaria* is to furnish a Body of Men for his Imperial Majesties Service in the Empire. The Magistrates of this City having excused their receiving an Imperial Garrison, are themselves providing for their Security, as far as they think the present conjuncture requires it. We have had several Letters from *Hungary* which speak of the arrival of the Grand Vizier at *Belgrade*, but those we receive from *Vienna* do not give any certain account of it; In this all our advices agree, That the Preparations of the Turks are very great, and that according to all appearance they will fall in a very numerous Body into *Hungary*, so soon as the Weather will permit it; That Count *Tockley* has a very close and secret Correspondence with them, and that he proposes to himself great advantages from their assistance and protection.

Cologne, Feb. 26. The Letters from *Liege* bringing an account, That the Commonalty of that City cannot be prevailed with to give out Elector the satisfaction he demands, His Electoral Highness has resolved to make use of Force to compel them thereunto, and we are told, That his Ministers are preparing a *Manifesto* against the said City, which will be very speedily published. We have advice from *Soest*, That there are as yet only arrived the Ministers of the King of *Denmark*, of the Electors of *Brandenburg* and *Cologne*, and the Bishop of *Munster*. The Duke *de Croÿ*, who is Levying in these parts a Regiment of 2000 Foot for the Emperors Service, has already raised 1000, who will very quickly March for *Bobemia*, where they have their Quarters assigned them.

Hamburg, Feb. 26. The King of *Denmark* raises what Seamen he can, as well here as at *Altena*, for the Service of the Fleet he intends to have at Sea this Summer, which as we are told will consist of 36 Men-of War. He likewise makes Levies by Land, intending to encrease his standing Forces, because his Neighbours augment theirs. The Dukes of *Lunenburg* do also raise Men, but it is only to recruit the Regiments they have already on Foot. It is reported, That the Poles have resolved in the Dyet that is now assembled at *Warsaw*, to raise 20000 Horse, for the service of the Emperor against the Turks, but our last Polish Letters not making any mention thereof, we know not what credit to give to it. From *East Friseland* we have an account, That the Imperial Troops,

who made an Attempt upon *Oredemburg*, being disappointed in it by Major *Linte*'s drawing together the *Militia* of the Country, are returned to their Quarters, and that endeavours are using to compose the differences between the Princes and States of that Country, which there is the more reason to believe may be successful, for that both sides grow sensible of the troubles they may otherwise bring upon themselves.

Paris, March 3. The King, the Queen, and the whole Court part to morrow as we told you in our last, for *Compeigne*, and we are informed, That the Marschal *de Bellefonds*, and the Marschal *de L'Orge*, are gone before. It is still said, That there will be a great Encampment on the *Soane*, and that the Dauphin is to command the Army, and the Marschal *de Schomberg* under him; and it is reported, That there will be other Encampments besides this, but without any certainty. On Monday last the Doctors of the *Sorbonne* met to consider of the Proposition they received from the Parliament, concerning the Popes Authority, and after some debate adjourned, the farther consideration thereof till Monday next. Four or five of the principal Streets of this City are going to be enlarged, and to be made more beautiful and commodious.

Whitehal, Feb. 28. This day the Right Honourable, *Theophilus* Earl of *Humington*, and *Henry* Earl of *Peterborough*, were Sworn of His Majesties most Honourable Privy Council, and accordingly took their places at the Board.

Trinity-House, Febr. 28. *The Candle-Light* at *Winterton*, belonging to the Corporation of Trinity-House, by extremity of Weather, and breaking in of the Sea, being like to be washed down, there was a necessity of its removal, which has been done so far Southward in the same Bearing, that it does not open so well with the great Light: These are therefore to give notice thereof to all Masters of Ships, and others concerned, and that care will be taken with all convenient speed, to place it more Northerly.
