IN GREAT BRITAIN.

IN lieu of the present countervailing duty and drawback on flint, phial, enamel, stained, or paste glass, a countervailing duty of £5 8s. 7 cwt. to be charged on importation from Ireland, and a drawback of the same amount to be allowed on the exportation of such glass to Ireland, provided the packages do not contain each less than 100lb weight avoirdupois, and that they be not imported in any vessel of less than seventy tons burthen.

ADDITIONAL RULES and ORDERS for Regulating the Trade between Great Britain and Ireland, directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to be observed.

ARTICLES OF FOREIGN PRODUCE.

THAT articles of the following description, for which the duties have been paid, be accompanied, on the removal from one country to the other, by Excise permits, testifying the payment of the duties, viz. foreign spirits, tea, tobacco and snuff, wine, coffee, and cocoa-nuts, and pepper.

Regulations are established by Act of 4 Geo. IV, cap. 24, for the removal of such of the before-mentioned articles, except tea, as have not paid the duties, but are taken from the warehouses in which they have been lodged upon bond, and tea may be removed from the East India Company's warehouses to Ireland, without payment of duty, under regulations established by Act of 41 Geo. III, cap. 75.

ARTICLES OF HOME GROWTH OR MANUFACTURE.

That articles subject to countervailing duties (except bricks and tiles, and common glass bottles) be put into convenient packages, marked and numbered; and that each of the packages of candles, soap, starch, hair-powder, and British gum contain not less than 100lb avoirdupois, net weight.

That all paper, button-board, mill-board, scale-board, and paste-board be removed in the original packages, having the stamp and other marks, denoting that the duty, payable in the country from which removed, has been duly charged, perfect thereon.

That sweets or made wines, passing from the premises of the maker for sale, be accompanied by certificates to shew that the duties have been paid.

That British hops continue in the original bags or pockets, with the marks required by law to be placed thereon perfect, and the package unbroken.

The trade in spirits between Great Britain and Ireland is regulated by Act of 54 Geo. III, cap. 149.

That on the arrival of articles liable to countervailing duties in Great Britain, in addition to the entry required to be made with the Collector of the Customs, an entry be made thereof with the Collector of Excise, and the countervailing duties paid to him, and the goods not landed without his warrant.

And that the drawback allowed in this case be paid, under all the rules and regulations which are established by law, in regard to the exportation of exciseable commodities with drawback.
