From Naples we have Letters of the ninth Instant, which iell us, That the Regiment of the Marquis (e Grottalo, confilting of looo Men, and eight Troops of difmounted Cavalry, were Embarked on three Merchant Ships, who were to carry them to Genous, or fome other con-; preferving the publick Peace of this City, and prevenient Port, from whence they might March for Milan, and that the Viceroy of Naples had fent Bills for 20000 Crowns to the Governor of Milan, to mount the faid Troops.

Genoua, March 3. The 25th Infant arrived here the William and Mary, Captain Allen Commander, having on Board 400 Soldiers, and two other Ships, a Genoueze and a Spaniard, with 1200 Men more, all from Naples : They have Landed them at Recea, 15 Miles to the Eaflward of this place, from whence they are Marched to Milan. The first In-fant came in here the Sea Flower Captain Smith, from New England. In Post are the Legborne Mer-chant bound for Legborne, the Rebe sca for Lisbon, and the Success for Galippoli.

Vienna, Feb. 28. We have advice from Hungary That Count Teckeley, purfuant to his late Decla-ration, That he would employ his Mediation at the Port, in order to the diverting the War with the Furks, has dispatched four D puties to Adrianople, where the Grand-Signior now is, and many begin to believe, That Count Teckeley does in good earnest labour for Peace, thinking this the most favourable conjuncture he can have to obtain his own Terms of the Emperor, and to chablish himfelf and his Family. But whether his Interpolition, fuppoling it to be real, will be fo far confider'd by the Turks, as that they will be thereby induced to change the measures, for the execution whereof th:y have made fuch vaft Preparations, is a quaflion that time only can determine. There are Letters from the Count de Caprara, the Emperor's Minister at the Port, which give an account, That he arrived at Adrianople on the 18th of December, That he was expecting an Audience of the Grand Signior; That the Preparations of the Turks are very great, and that nothing but a War is to be expected; and with this our other advices do agree, and particularly they continue to write from Greicks Weiffenbourg, That the Ottoman Troops arrive daily in those parts, That valt Magazines are providing, and that a great many fmall Boats or VeBels are building, to be employed on the Danube. Chanday, and it's faid, That the Sicur Straetman; one of the Emperor's Ambaffadors at the Conference at Francfors, who arrived here two or three days agone from Ratubonne, will fucceed him. Hamburg, March 9. The Letters we receive from Copenbagen inform us. And from Berlin they -write, That the Elector of Brandenburg will raife 4000 Men, to recruit his flanding Regiments. Amidd these Preparations there is much discourse of Peace, and we are sold, That the Elector of Brandanburg docs very much endeavour, by his initter sat Kienna, to dispose that Court to Treat with the Crown of France-upon the Proposals which the Brench Amballadors made at Francfort. From Warfaw we have an account, That the Count de Wal-Jaffain, Ambaffatior Extraordinary from the Emperor, did meer-with great opposition if his Negodation concerning the League of Inutural Defence between the Emperor and that Crown, which has -been to often fpoken of, but that it was believed he would overcome it. The difference between the Magiltrates and the Purghers of this City, about executing the Imperial Decret, Concerning Poleman, mentioned in our laft, is compoled.

& Hague, March 13.
