HE Preparations at this Court for the War with the Turks, are made with greate application than ever, and the Emperor has acquainted the States of the Lower Austria, which are now affembled, That he has already 80000 Men on foot, and has command d them to make Provision for the Quartering of 6000 in this Country. A Train of Artiliery of 50 Pieces of Cannon is prepari g here for the next Campaign, and the Wagons, Horses, &c a c alreasy provided. The Troops that are quartered in Tyrol have Orders to March for Hungary. The Fortifications that are making for the Descare of this City, are carried on with great diligence, and it's faid they will be finished in fix Weks. The L tters from Swifferland tell us, That the Cantons have not only given the Emperor leave to raise Men within their Territories, but have likew se offered him 2000 Men against the Turks. Count Tecke ey does now openly endeavour tomake himself Prince of Opper Hungary; He has alre dy taken upon him the Title, and Governs and diposes of all things as he pleases. It is not yet known what Proposals he intends to make to the Port by his Ambassadors, which he has sent thither under the precence of solliciting a prolongation of the Peace, The Turks, in their late Incursion into the Island Sebuts, burnt a Village, killed about 50 Persons, and carried away with them 300 Priloners. The Baron Swerin, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, has had several Conserences with the Ministers of this On Sunday arrived here an Express from the Count de Martenits, the Emperor's Envoy at Rome; and two hours after a Courier was dispatched from hence to the Count de Wallastain, the Emperor's Ambassalor at Warsaw.

Vienna, March 4. Frequent Councils are held here, at which the Emperor is for the most part present, to give the necessary Orders concerning the Preparations for the approaching Campaign, for which, as all our advices tell us, the Tucks are providing in a very extraordinary manner. It is faid, That the Imperial Army will confift of 60000 Fighting-Men, and that befides these, 20000 will Encamp near this City, as a Body of Reserve. The Baron de Straetman, who lately arrived here from Ratubonne, will very suddenly return thither again, with new Instructions relating to the Treaty that is to be managed there with the Count de Creey. The Emperor has made choice of the Count de Hokens to affift in his name at the Meeting of the States of Franconia, which are to assemble the seventh In-

stant at Nuremberg.

Francfort, March 10. We have of late had Letters from Vienna, which spoke with great considence of a Peace between the Emperor and the Grand-Signior, but the advices we received by the lust Post from Hungary are in another Scile, and asfureus, That a War is inevitable, and at the same time give us an account, That the Dyet which is affembled by Count Teckeley's Command at Cafwhen, had made choice of the Sieur Szirmai, to accompany, as their Deputy, the Ambailadors which Count Teckeley has sent to the Port, and that in the Instructions they had given him, they do declare, That the Kingdom of Hungary which had been reduced to a low and milerable estate, was now, by the Elessing of God upon the indefarigable endeavours of Count Teskeley, and by the Favour and Protection of the Port, happily reestablished; and do command the said Deputy to make their due acknowledgments thereof to the Grand-Signior, and his great Ministers.

Co'ogne, March 12. The Deputies of the City of Liege, having received Orders from their Principals to leave this place, and to return home, they are accordingly parted from honce, leaving his Electoral Highness very much distarished with the Behavior of that City; he has resolved, as we are informed, to raise 5000 Men, and has appointed Magazines to be provided at the molt convenient places near Liege, and his Troops are faid to be Marching that way, fo that it's believed his Electoral Highness intends to besiege the said City. The Burghers here are much diffatisfied that Complaints have been made concerning their Proceedings to the Emperor, and that an Imperial Decret has been thereupon obtained, as we told you in our last; they are now affembled, and demand the execution of what was lately promifed them by

the Magistrates.

Hamburg, March 12. Bruffels, March 12. The Marquis de Grana has by an Express received Letters from Luxemburg, which give his Excellency an account, That the French Troops begin to move on that fide, and that they have put strong Garnons into Bertrange and Wafferbillicke, by which means they may cut off the Communication between Luxemburg and Trier, and that the Marquis de Lambert, who commands the French Forces in those parts, had let the Commandant of Euxemburg know, That if any Officers or Soldiers of that Garison should come into the French Territories swithout his Passport, they should be made Prisoners: Upon these advices, his Excel lency has Commanded the Prince of Chimay, Governor of Luxemburg, who is here, to repair immediately to his Government, and accordingly he Will part hence this Night or to morrow Morning. The Farmers of the Cultoms have not yet paid the Moneys they are by their Contract to advance, and if they do not do it by Monday next, the Farm will be again in his Excellency's disposal. a v.ce, That the Elector of Cologne is raising 7000 Men, which together with the Troops he has already on foot, will it's faid be empk yed against the City of Liege.

Bruffels, March 12. The motions of the French Froops in the Province of Luxemburg, of which his Excellency received an account by an Express, make us believe they intend again to block up the City of Luxemburg and therefore the Prince de Chimay, who is Governor thereof, is hastening thither: It is faid, That the place is so well provided, that it may Fold out a Year at least without any Supply. The French Letters assure us, That the Court will be back the 23 of this Month at Versailles. Our Leeters from Vienna tell us, That they begin very much . to suspect that Count Teckeley is not sincere in his Proceedings, and that at the same time that he enter ains the Court at Vienna with a fair Prospect of Peace, he does under-hand encourage the Turks to the War. The Deputies of Liege, that have been so long at Cologne, are finally parted from thence on their return home.
