Vienna, Feb. 28.

THE Preparations at this Court for the War with the Turks, are made with greater application than ever, and the Emperor has acquainted the States of the Lower Austria, which are now assembled, That he has already 80000 Men on foot, and has commanded them to make Provision for the Quartering of 6000 in this Country. A Train of Artillery of 50 Pieces of Cannon is preparing here for the next Campaign, and the Wagons, Horses, &c are already provided. The Troops that are quartered in Tyrol have Orders to March for Hungary. The Fortifications that are making for the Defence of this City, are carried on with great diligence, and it's said they will be finished in six Weeks. The Letters from Switzerland tell us, That the Cantons have not only given the Emperor leave to raise Men within their Territories, but have likewise offered him 2000 Men against the Turks. Count Teckley does now openly endeavour to make himself Prince of Upper Hungary; He has already taken upon him the Title, and Governed and disposed of all things as he pleases. It is not yet known what Proposals he intends to make to the Port by his Ambassadors, which he has sent thither under the pretence of soliciting a prolongation of the Peace. The Turks, in their late Incurſion into the Island *Sebus*, burnt a Village, killed about 50 Persons, and carried away with them 300 Prisoners. The Baron *Swerin*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, has had several Conferences with the Ministers of this Court. On Sunday arrived here an Express from the Count de *Martenitz*, the Emperor's Envoy at Rome; and two hours after a Courier was dispatched from hence to the Count de *Wallaſtain*, the Emperor's Ambassador at Warsaw.

Vienna, March 4. Frequent Councils are held here, at which the Emperor is for the most part present, to give the necessary Orders concerning the Preparations for the approaching Campaign, for which, as all our advices tell us, the Turks are providing in a very extraordinary manner. It is said, That the Imperial Army will consist of 60000 Fighting-Men, and that besides these, 20000 will Encamp near this City, as a Body of Reserve. The Baron de *Stratman*, who lately arrived here from *Ratisbonne*, will very suddenly return thither again, with new Instructions relating to the Treaty that is to be managed there with the Count de *Crecy*. The Emperor has made choice of the Count de *Hokenlo* to assist in his name at the Meeting of the States of *Franconia*, which are to assemble the seventh Instant at *Nuremberg*.

Ratisbonne, March 3. The difference between the two Colledges cannot yet be reconciled, betw

of them persisting in their Sentiments concerning the Treaty that is to be entered upon with the Count de *Crecy*, and the Electoral Colledge positively declaring, That they do most firmly adhere to their Conclusion of the 12th of *December*. That the French Proposals ought to be accepted. From Hungary they write, That Count *Teckley* had taken upon him the Title of Prince of Upper Hungary, and that most of the Nobility had acknowledged him as such, and that there was sufficient ground to believe that all the professions he does make of his Inclination to Peace, and his endeavouring to dispose the Turks thereunto, are but amusements to slacken the Preparations for War on the Emperor's side.

Francfort, March 10. We have of late had Letters from Vienna, which spoke with great confidence of a Peace between the Emperor and the Grand-Signior, but the advices we received by the last Post from Hungary are in another Style, and assure us, That a War is inevitable, and at the same time give us an account, That the Dyet which is assembled by Count *Teckley's* Command at *Caschau*, had made choice of the *Sieur Szirmai*, to accompany, as their Deputy, the Ambassadors which Count *Teckley* has sent to the Port, and that in the Instructions they had given him, they do declare, That the Kingdom of Hungary which had been reduced to a low and miserable estate, was now, by the Blessing of God upon the indefatigable endeavours of Count *Teckley*, and by the Favour and Protection of the Port, happily re-established; and do command the said Deputy to make their due acknowledgments thereof to the Grand-Signior, and his great Ministers.

Co'ogne, March 12. The Deputies of the City of *Liege*, having received Orders from their Principals to leave this place, and to return home, they are accordingly parted from hence, leaving his Electoral Highness very much dissatisfied with the Behavior of that City; he has resolved, as we are informed, to raise 5000 Men, and has appointed Magazines to be provided at the most convenient places near *Liege*, and his Troops are said to be Marching that way, so that it's believed his Electoral Highness intends to besiege the said City. The Burghers here are much dissatisfied that Complaints have been made concerning their Proceedings to the Emperor, and that an Imperial Decree has been thereupon obtained, as we told you in our last; they are now assembled, and demand the execution of what was lately promised them by the Magistrates.

Hamburg, March 12. Our Letters from Berlin tell us, That they were very busy at that Court in giving out Commissions for the new Levies; the Electoral Highness is going to make, and which it's said will amount to 10000 Men. From *Holstein* we have advice, That the Danish Commissaries have received Orders from *Copenhagen*, to raise after the
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expiration of this Month, the Tax upon the Land, by Military Execution, which has very much Alarmed the Country People who had hoped that things would have been composed between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Holstein, through the Interposition that has been employ'd for that purpose at the Court of Denmark. The Letters from Warsaw tell us, That Count Wallastain, the Emperor's Ambassador, has had several Conferences with the Ministers he was to treat with, and that it was generally believed he would succeed in his Negotiation. From Sweden they write, That the King was in good health, and that his Leg was so well that he could walk about.

Brussels, March 12. The Marquis de Grana has by an Express received Letters from Luxembourg, which give his Excellency an account, That the French Troops begin to move on that side, and that they have put strong Garrisons into *Bertrange* and *Wasserbillige*, by which means they may cut off the Communication between Luxembourg and Trier, and that the Marquis de Lambert, who commands the French Forces in those parts, had let the Commandant of Luxembourg know, That if any Officers or Soldiers of that Garrison should come into the French Territories without his Passport, they should be made Prisoners: Upon these advices, his Excellency has Commanded the Prince of Chimay, Governor of Luxembourg, who is here, to repair immediately to his Government, and accordingly he will part hence this Night or to morrow Morning. The Farmers of the Customs have not yet paid the Moneys they are by their Contract to advance, and if they do not do it by Monday next, the Farm will be again in his Excellency's disposal. We have a Voice, That the Elector of Cologne is raising 5000 Men, which together with the Troops he has already on foot, will it's said be employ'd against the City of Liege.

Brussels, March 12. The motions of the French Troops in the Province of Luxembourg, of which his Excellency received an account by an Express, make us believe they intend again to block up the City of Luxembourg and therefore the Prince de Chimay, who is Governor thereof, is hastening thither: It is said, That the place is so well provided, that it may hold out a Year at least without any Supply. The French Letters assure us, That the Court will be back the 23 of this Month at Versailles. Our Letters from Vienna tell us, That they begin very much to suspect that Count Teckley is not sincere in his Proceedings, and that at the same time that he entertains the Court at Vienna with a fair Prospect of Peace, he does under-hand encourage the Turks to the War. The Deputies of Liege, that have been so long at Cologne, are finally parted from thence on their return home.

Hagles, March 16. The States of Holland have resolv'd, That a good number of Ships shall be fitted out this Summer, and have communicated their resolution herein to the States-General, who will recommend the same to the other Provinces. The French Ambassador, the Count d'Avaux, received, the last Week, an Express from France, and since has been in Conference with the Ministers here. The States-General have written a Letter to the Emperor concerning the Affairs of *Bast-Friekand*, which they are very desirous to see com-

posed. The Court de Nassau, General of the Horse in the Service of this State arrived here two days ago e.

Paris, March 20. The Court will be to morrow at St Cloud, and will stay there two days, and on the 23 they will return to Versailles. The ordinary discourse is, That the King will take a Journey towards Burgundy the beginning of the next Month, to see his Army which is to Entamp on the Soane. We are told, That the King has accepted the Mediation of the Crown of Poland for the composing the differences that depend between the Emperor and him. The last Week died here the Duke de Roquelaure, Governor of Guyenne, and the Sieur Hottman, Intendant of the Finances. Many people do with much impatience expect the arrival of the Nuncio which the Pope is sending hither, for that they think he may very much contribute to an Accommodation between the two Courts; in the mean time we are told, That part of his Errand hither is to exhort the King to employ his Arms against the Turks, who are making such formidable Preparations against Christendom.
