The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the tenth of March last, for prohibiting the exportation of gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Streights of Gibraltar), will expire on the nineteenth day of September next; and whereas it is judged expedient that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service), do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the nineteenth of September next), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Streights of Gibraltar) or ship or lade any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf, first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty

"to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for the transportation of offenders from Great Britain," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to appoint any place or places beyond the seas, either within or without His Majesty's dominions, to which felons and other offenders under sentence or order of transportation or banishment should be conveyed; His Majesty was this day pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to appoint the islands of New South Wales and Van Dieman's Land, and all islands adjacent thereto, to be places to which felons and other offenders now being or hereafter to be under sentence or order of transportation or banishment, shall be conveyed under the provisions of the said recited Act: And whereas by the same Act it is further enacted, that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order or Orders in Council, to declare His royal will and pleasure that male offenders, convicted in Great Britain, and being under sentence or order of transportation, should be kept to labour in any part of His Majesty's dominions out of England, to be named in such Order or Orders in Council, His Majesty was further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to declare His royal will and pleasure, that male offenders, convicted in Great Britain, and being under sentence or order of transportation, shall be kept to hard labour in His Majesty's colony of Bermuda: And His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State for the time being are to take the necessary measures herein as to them may respectively appertain.

His Majesty has been pleased to grant permission to the 24th Regiment of Foot to bear on

its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have heretofore been granted to the Regiment, the words

"Salamanca," and
"Vittoria,"

in commemoration of the distinguished conduct of the 2d Battalion of that Regiment at the battle of Salamanca, on 22d July 1812; and at Vittoria, on the 21st June 1813.

His Majesty has also been pleased to permit the 60th Regiment of Foot (or the Duke of York's own Rifle Corps) to resume the motto,

"*Celer et Audax*,"

which was formerly borne by that Regiment, in commemoration of its distinguished bravery while employed with the British Army in North America, under Major-General Wolfe, in the year 1759.
