

Schutz, we have Letters from *Hungary* which inform us, That a Party of Hussars meeting with 1000 Turks, and finding themselves too weak to encounter with them, had pretended themselves *Hungarians* of Count *Terkeley's* Troops, and so passed, but joyning soon after with a Party of German Horie, which was likewise abroad, they Marched after the Turks, overtook them, and charged them so furiously, that few of them escaped.

Cologne, March 26. New Orders are come from the Emperor, commanding the Burghers of this City to desist from their Irregular and Tumultuary Proceedings, and to yield that Obedience and Respect that becomes them to their Magistrates, leaving the matters in difference between them to his Imperial Majesties Determination.

Hamburg, March 26. Our Letters from *Copenhagen* of the 16th and 20th Instant, tell us, That the Preparations that are making there, as well by Land as Water, are carried on with great diligence and application, and that the King of *Denmark* will part from *Copenhagen*, presently after *Easter*, for *Gluckstadt*, where it is said he intends to pass most of the Summer: And from *Gluckstadt* they write, That they are adding to that place several new Fortifications, on which they work with great diligence, and that the Danes have furnished *Hittler Seans*, which lies very near the *Elbe*, with ten Pieces of bigger Cannon than they had there before. Some days ago we passed through this City *Monsieur Bierman*, whom the King of *Denmark* sends to the *Dukes of Lunenburg*, and having performed his Commission to them, he is to go to *Berlin*. The Emperor has forbid any Levies of Seamen or others to be made here for the Service of the King of *Denmark*.

Brussels, March 26. Here is arrived the Count *de Taaff* from *Vienna*; the *Marquis de Gramont* received him very kindly, and has Lodged him in the Palace. The persons that took the Farm of the Customs, not being able to comply with their Contract, his Excellency has now let it to the *Sieur Aersens*, and the *Sieur de Walla*, of *Bruges*, these are only named in the Grant, though it is said that the *Sieur Kronsbeck* is the principal Undertaker; they are to enter upon their Farm the first of *April*, and are to pay 1300 thousand *Florins* yearly. His Excellency intends very suddenly for *Flanders*, and because he purposes to stay some time at *Gaunt*, he has ordered the Kings House there to be prepared for him. We are very quiet in these parts, and do not hear of the motion of any Troops near our frontiers. The Letters which arrived yesterday from *Vienna* give us an account, That 400 Imperial Horse and Dragoons, with a few Hussars and Heydukes, had not only made head against 1000 Turks, which entered on the eighth Instant into the Island *Schutz*, but had forced them to retire in great disorder, leaving near two hundred of their Companions Slain, and about Forty Prisoners, behind them.

Hague, March 30. Most of the Members of the States of *Holland*, who went home upon their late Adjournment, are come back this day, and to-morrow they will be again assembled; and the Prince of *Orange* is expected here on Thursday next from *Dieren*. The Deputies of the Admiralties have had several Conferences with the Deputies of the

State, concerning Sea Affairs. It is said, That this State will have a Squadron of 13 or 18 Men of War at Sea this Summer, and that Lieutenant-Admiral *Van Tromp* will command it. From *Poland* we have advyce; That an Alliance of mutual Defence between the Emperor and that Crown is Concluded.

Newmarket, March 23. Last Night between Nine and Ten a Clock, a fire happened here, which began in a Stable-Yard, and burnt so violently, the Wind being high, that in few Hours above half the Town was laid in Ashes. Their Majesties removed to the Earl of *Suffolk's* House, and their Royal Highnesses to the Earl of *Rochester's*, which were at some distance from the fire, where they lay last night, but His Majesties House having received no damage, they returned thither again this Morning. His Majesty continues, Thanks be to God, in very good Health, and intends to return with the whole Court to *Whitehall* on Monday next.
