

conciled, cannot be yet said; Some think that Monsieur *Stracm*, who is expected back here from *Vienna*, will come instructed to propose some Expedient for the removing this difficulty, that obstructs the Treaty, which all the Colleges have resolved to enter upon, with the Count de *Crecy*, the French Minister.

*Cologne, March 26.* Our Elector raises Men, and every body believes he intends to employ them against the City of *Liege*, though at the same time we are told, that his Electoral Highness seems unwilling to let things come to that extremity, and some Overtures have been lately made on the part of that City, which it's hoped will have a good effect towards the disposing things to an accommodation.

*Hamburg, March 26.* The Letters we received by the last Post from *Copenhagen* tell us, That they are working with great diligence on the Ships the King of *Denmark* has ordered to be fitted out, and that several of the lightest Frigats will be ready to Sail in few days; The design of putting this Fleet to Sea, is believed to be to hinder the King of *Sweden* from transporting any Troops to *Pomerania* or *Bremen*. The King of *Denmark* will be very sullen in these parts; and this King, who cannot hear of that Prince's coming, this way, without apprehensions of his having a design upon them, have resolved to increase their Troops, and to raise for that purpose twelve hundred Foot and two hundred Horse.

*V League, March 30.* The Deputies of the Admiralties by Order of the States complained to Don *Buhasar de Fuen Mayor*, the Spanish Envoy, That the Marquis de *Grana*, Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, has sent the King of Spain's Customs in those Countries to farm, to the prejudice of the Treaties of Commerce between the Crown of Spain and this State, by which it is provided, That the Subjects of these Provinces Trading to the Spanish Netherlands shall be favourably treated by the Officers of the Customs, and that the Duties they are to pay for their Merchandise shall not be exacted from them with any rigor, which they have reason to believe will be done by the Persons to whom they are now let to farm. And we are informed, that the Minister of this State at *Brussels* has made the same Representation to the Marquis de *Grana*, and that the States have likewise written to their Ambassador at *Madrid* about it. The Deputies of the Admiralties continue their Conferences with these of the State, for expecting in execution the Resolution of the States concerning the fitting out a Squadron of Men of War, for the assistance of the *Suedes*. The Prince of *Orange* is expected here from *Dieren* on Thursday next.

*Paris, March 31.* He's said at Court, That the King will presently after *Easter*, take a Journey to *Lion*, and that the Duke and Dutches of *Savoy* will meet their Most Christian Majesties there; In the mean time a great many Troops March that way. The Fleet *deinsid*, by an Extraordinary from the States General at the United-Provinces, arrived here five days since; the chief business he comes about is, as it's believed, in relation to the Affairs of *Orange*. An Express arrived here two days ago from the French Ambassador at *Copenhagen*: we do not yet certainly know what he brought, but it is

reported, That that Ambassador has Concluded a new League with the King of *Denmark*. The Pope has sent the King a Brief, wherein he consents, That the Revenues of the Abbeyes of *St. Denis* and *St. Germain* shall be employed for the maintenance of new Converts, and it's said, That the Duke d'Espreé, our King's Ambassador at *Rome*, has lately received some assurance, That the Pope will very speedily dispatch his Bulls for all the vacant Bishopricks, without excepting any, even that of *Pamiers*, which will be very welcome to those that have been so long Solliciting them. We do not certainly know when to expect the Nuncio which the Pope is sending hither, but according to our last Advices from *Rome*, he may be here towards the latter end of the next Month. The Doctors of the *Sorbonne* continue their Meetings without Intermission, to consider of the Proposicion about the Popes Authority; they are very much divided in their Opinions, so that no Judgment can be made of what their Deliberations will conclude in. The King has named the Duke de *Villeroy* to command an Army of 20 or 22000 Men on the *Saar*, and on Monday last he received at *Versailles* the Companies of the whole Court thereupon.

*Deal, March 27.* The Merchant Ships that were in the *Dow*, sailed this Afternoon, the Wind at *S. E.*
