AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 2d of February 1825,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to repeal certain duties of Customs in Great Britain, and to grant other duties in lieu thereof; to grant certain bounties on salted provisions and silk manufactures exported; and to make more effectual regulations for collecting the duties of Customs;" and by another Act, passed in the same session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to repeal the several duties and drawbacks of Customs chargeable and allowable in Ireland, on the importation and exportation of certain foreign and colonial goods, wares, and merchandise, and to grant other duties and drawbacks in lieu thereof, equal to the duties and drawbacks chargeable and allowable thereon in Great Britain;" His Majesty is empowered, by His Order in Council, to be published in the London and Dublin Gazettes, to direct, for the convenience of trade, and for the more economical collection of the revenue, that the management of all import duties should be placed wholly under the Commissioners of Customs, or wholly under the Commissioners of Excise; and whereas it is deemed expedient, that from and after the fifth of April next, the import duties upon the following articles, namely, coffee, cocoa, tobacco and snuff, pepper, spirits, wine, and all other foreign goods now subject upon importation, to duties collected by the Excise, except tea, should be placed wholly under the management of the Commissioners of Customs; His Majesty having taken the same into consideration is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to declare and direct, that all

such duties upon the articles above enumerated shall be placed, and shall be under the sole management and authority of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, according to the provisions and directions of the said Acts, from and after the fifth day of April next, during the time that the aforesaid duties shall continue to be payable: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE following is a copy of an Order of His Majesty in Council, approving of the division of the Vicarage of St. John, Hackney, in the county of Middlesex, into three distinct Rectories:

At the Court at Carlton-House, the 10th of March 1824, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional Churches in populous parishes," it is amongst other things enacted "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the Diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their consent thereto under his hand and seal, and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue and remain to be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division: provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided."—And whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that the parish of St. John, Hackney, in the county of Middlesex, is a vicarage; and that there is also a sinecure rectory in the said parish, both in the presentation of William George Daniel Tyssen, Esquire; that the Reverend Archdeacon Watson, Doctor in Divinity, is the Vicar and also the sinecure Rector of the said parish. That according to the parliamentary census, taken in the year 1821, the population of the said parish amounted to 22,494 persons, being an increase since the preceding census taken in the year 1811, of 5724 persons; that the accommodation in the parish church does not extend to more than about 2303 persons; that there is also one consecrated chapel in the said parish, which was built by subscription in the year 1810, and is in the nomination of the Vicar, and of which chapel the Reverend Henry Handley Norris is the gratuitous Minister; that the accommodation in this chapel extends to about 900 persons, the total accommodation in consecrated places of worship in the whole parish thus extending to about 3200 persons only, out of a population which in 1821 amounted to 22,494, and which it is believed at present exceeds

that number; that the said Commissioners taking into consideration the great want of church accommodation, resolved to build a new church in the said parish capable of accommodating about 1828 persons, about 1190 of such accommodation being in free seats to be appropriated to the use of the poor, and the same is now in a great state of forwardness, so much so that it will be completed and fit for consecration in about six weeks; that the church is built on a very eligible site of considerable value, with a handsome frontage to the public road, which was liberally granted to the said Commissioners by the patron of the living, with two acres of ground adjoining for a churchyard, which is now enclosed or about to be enclosed; that the patron has also liberally given an additional piece of land of about the same extent, close to the new church, as a site for a parsonage-house which has been erected thereon by private subscription, and for providing a garden and glebe for the incumbent; that with the view of further providing for the spiritual wants of this populous parish, the said Commissioners have deemed it expedient, by virtue of the powers vested in them by the provisions of the 16th section of the Act above-mentioned, and with the contents therein required to be given, to divide the said parish into three divisions, and each division to be constituted a distinct rectory, one of the said rectories to be called the rectory of Hackney, the second of the said rectories to be called the rectory of South Hackney, and the third of the said rectories to be called the rectory of West Hackney; that the said Commissioners beg leave to refer to the map of the parish accompanying the said representation, which is hereunto annexed, and to the paper writings marked A. B. and C. thereunto annexed (copies of which paper writings are also hereunto annexed), as containing a full description of the boundaries of the divisions which the said Commissioners propose for His Majesty's consideration; that in order to make a suitable provision for the incumbents of the said three rectories, in case His Majesty shall be graciously pleased to approve of the proposed measure, the patron agrees to annex permanently to each rectory their respective proportions of the great tithes, which, according to the best information that can be obtained from the lessee and collector, amount in the whole to the yearly sum of £333 4s. 6d. or thereabouts, and all other sources of emolument to the present rectory, except the manor of Grumbold, being the glebe or part of the glebe of the said rectory and now appendant thereto, and in furtherance of the same object the said William George Daniel Tyssen, the patron, being the lessee of the great tithes, has engaged to give up his lease of the said tithes from Michaelmas 1822, so soon as the three before-mentioned divisions are constituted rectories, and the Reverend Archdeacon Watson, the present Vicar and Rector, has liberally engaged to relinquish the vicarial tithes and Easter dues from Easter 1823, and the surplus fees and every other source of emolument, except as aforesaid, to which he is entitled within the limits of the two new parishes, so soon as the actual separation of them into distinct rectories is completed, and the consecration of the new church takes place; that the consent of the Lord Bishop

of the Diocese, and all other consents required by the provisions of the 16th section of the said Act, and the 14th and 15th sections of the Act, passed in the 3d year of His Majesty's reign, ch. 72, have been obtained to the proposed division; and the said Commissioners beg leave therefore to lay before His Majesty the before mentioned circumstances, and humbly pray that His Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into His royal consideration, and make such order in respect thereto as to His Majesty in His wisdom shall seem meet.

His Majesty having taken the said representation of the said Commissioners into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed divisions be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act. *Jas. A.

The parish of Hackney is bounded on the east by the river Lea, from (near) Bell's-wharf to the commencement of Temple-mills-river, and then by the said river to a place, called Bully-point, being the same boundary line that separates the counties of Middlesex and Essex; from Bully-point the boundary line turns westward through the marshes, as far as the brook, called Hackney-brook (abutting so far on the parish of Bow), and then along the course of the said brook, northward, about 350 yards, where, leaving the brook, it follows the sewer which separates Hackney-marsh from the enclosed meadows, and again falls into the same brook, near the Silk-mills, and proceeds along the brook as far as Water-lane, and then up the centre of that lane to opposite the Black Boys public-house, where it turns westward along the north side of the late John Dekewer, Esquire's estate to the south side of St. Thomas'-square, and up the centre of London-lane, and along the east and south sides of London-field, crosses Mutton-lane, and, passing by the north-west side of Cat and Mutton-field, joins Shoreditch parish (from the parish of Bow to the Cat and Mutton-field, the parish of Hackney abuts on the parish of South Hackney), from the Cat and Mutton-field it follows the boundary of Shoreditch parish as far as Mayfield-street, where it turns, north, up the middle of Mayfield-street, and along the centre of Dalston, to the end of Red Lion-lane, and then up that lane, and along Downs'-lane, to the brook at the bottom of the Downs, and then follows the course of the said brook as far as Newington-bridge (N. B. From the end of Mayfield-street to Newington-bridge, the parish of West Hackney abuts on the parish of Hackney), from Newington-bridge it turns, north, up Stamford-hill to nearly opposite the Bird-cage public-house, and then leaves the road, and proceeds, westward, round part of the estate of W. G. D. Tyssen, Esq. which is bounded by the parish of Stoke Newington on the west, and by Tottenham on the north, as far as the turnpike-road to Tottenham, and then crosses the said road, and proceeds down Bell's-lane, to the river Lea.

B.

The parish of South Hackney is bounded on the

south, from the brook at the bottom of White Post-lane, to a cast iron post standing in the corner of a field, near Grove-street, in the occupation of Mr. Ridge, is bounded by the parish of Bow, and from the said cast iron post to another iron post, standing near the end of Margaret-street, it is bounded by the parish of Bethnal-green; such boundary line passes through sundry enclosed lands, and is set out all the way by cast iron posts, marked HP. and by the parish marks of Bow and Bethnal-Green; from the end of Margaret-street the boundary follows the foot-path leading to the Cat and Mutton, and along the south side of Cat and Mutton-field, being so far joined by the parish of Shoreditch, and from thence along the west and north sides of the said field, and across Mutton-lane, and along the south and east sides of London-field, and down London-lane to St. Thomas'-square, and then up the south side of the said square, and along the north side of the late John Dekewer, Esquire's estate, by the south side of the Black Boys public-house, and then down Black Boys, or Water-lane, to the brook by Berger's Colour-factory, and then, following the brook as far as a little beyond the Silk-mills, at Hackney-wick, where it leaves the brook, and passes along the north side of a field, in the occupation of Mr. Christie, to the sewer which separates the marshes from the enclosed lands, and then follows the said sewer till it falls into the said brook, and then along the said brook to the bottom of White Post-lane, being bounded all the way from Cat and Mutton-field to White Post-lane, by the parish of Hackney.

C.

The parish of West Hackney is bounded on the north and east, from Newington-bridge to Downs-lane, by Hackney-brook, and from thence the boundary line passes up the middle of Downs-lane to the end of Red Lion-lane, and then down Red Lion-lane to Dalston, and along the centre of Dalston to the north end of Mayfield-street, and down the centre of Mayfield-street to the parish of Shoreditch (being so far bounded by the parish of Hackney), from Mayfield-street to the Rosemary branch, it is bounded by the parish of Shoreditch, and from the Rosemary branch to the west end of Cock-lane, by the parish of Islington, it then passes down Cock-lane to the turnpike-road leading to Newington, and along the centre of the said road as far as Newington-bridge, being bounded from the west end of Cock-lane to Newington-bridge, by the parish of Stoke Newington.
