An Act for applying the sum of ten millions five hundred thousand pounds, out of the Consolidated Fund, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five.

An Act to reduce the duties on wine, coffee, and hemp imported into the United Kingdom.

An Act to prolong the time of the commencement of an Act of the last session of Parliament for ascertaining and establishing uniformity of weights and measures, and to amend the said Act.

An Act to explain and amend two Acts, passed in the forty-third and forty-fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, for making and maintaining an inland navigation, commonly called the Caledonian Canal, by establishing further checks upon the expenditure of public money for that purpose, in certain cases.

An Act to continue, until the twenty-fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six, an Act, passed in the fifty-fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty, for rendering the payment of creditors more equal and expeditious in Scotland.

An Act to facilitate the proceedings before the Commissioners of inquiry relating to Courts of Justice in Ireland.

in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
