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Warsaw, March 12.

**T**he Dyet proceeds very slowly in the Dispatch of the publick Affairs, which made the King some days ago send the Bishop of *Culm* to them, to remonstrate to them the great prejudice which the whole Kingdom may sustain by their consuming their time so fruitlessly, and to press them to bring the matters they have in debate to a speedy Conclusion; and because the term of 12 Weeks, which is the whole time the Dyet ought to sit, is ready to expire, his Majesty did exhort them to agree to a Prolongation of it. In return to this Message the Deputies ordered their Marschal or Speaker to present their humble Thanks to the King, for the great care he has of the publick Welfare; but entering upon the consideration of Prolonging the time for the sitting of the Dyet, they fell into great Contests; however at last it was agreed, That the Dyet should be continued till the 20th Instant. Count *Wallstein*, the Emperor's Ambassador, has daily Conferences with the Ministers here, and the League he Negotiates is lookt upon to be as good as concluded.

*Stockholm, March 14.* The Preparations which the Danes are making, both by Sea and Land, do give this Crown a great deal of Jealousie. The Admiral, and other Sea Commanders, are gone down to the Fleet, and the Seamen are every where pressed into the King's Service; and it's said here, That in case there be occasion for it, the States General of the *United Provinces* will joyne a Squadron of Ships with those of this Crown, to favour the Transportation of the Troops our King purposes to send to *Pomeren* and *Bremen*.

*Venice, March 18.* The Merchants here are very much concerned at the News they have from *Constantinople*, That three or four Venetian Ships that were ready to Sail, had been forced to unlade again, in order to their serving for the transporting the Ottoman Troops from *Cairo*, which will be of great Prejudice to their Trade. This State is fitting out three new Gallies, and three Men of War are Building in the *Arsenal*, which, as soon as finished, will be likewise fitted out to Sea. From *Rome* we have advice, That the Count *de Martenitz*, the Emperor's Envoy, was upon his departure from thence, very well satisfied with the Success he has had in his Negotiation at that Court.

*Vienna, March 21.* This Court is very much pleased with the account they have received from the Imperial Ambassador at *Warsaw*, of the disposition he has found the King of *Poland* and the

whole Dyet in, to assist his Imperial Majesty against the Turks, for that the Poles will be able to give the Grand-Signior a great diversion. The Letters we receive from *Hungary* tell us the Ottoman Troops are on their March towards *Belgrade*, near which place will be held their General Rendezvous, and that the Grand Vizier is expected there about the latter end of the next Month. It is reported, That the Emperor, after he has seen his Troops at their Rendezvous on the Frontiers of *Hungary*, will remove with the whole Court to *Lintz*. His Imperial Majesty has written to the Duke of *Lorraine*, to desire him to repair hither, to assist at the Councils of War, that are held here for the ordering things with relation to the War, in which his Highness is to have so great a part, being, as we are allured, to Command the Imperial Armies that shall be employed against the Turks.

*Francfort, April 2.* The States of *Franconia* are assembled at *Nuremberg*, and the Count *de Hohenloe*, the Emperor's Commissioner, is arrived there, and in our next we may be able to tell you what Resolutions they have taken. The Prince of *Waldeck* is gone to *Munick*, to Confer with the Elector of *Bavaria*. The Circle of *Smabia* is, it's said, going to enter into the League, which the Circles of the upper *Rhine* and *Franconia* lately made with the Emperor.

*Cologne, April 4.* From *Ratisbonne* they write, That the Sicur *Straelman* was expected there on Monday last from *Vienna*, and that it was hoped that he came instructed to offer some expedient for the reconciling the difference between the two Colledges, that so the Negotiation may be entered upon with the Count *de Crey* for the establishing a firm Peace between the Empire and the Crown of *France*. From *Francfort* we have an account, That the Count *de Hohenloe* was arrived at *Nuremberg*, and had represented to the States of *Franconia* that are assembled there, That the Endeavours which his Imperial Majesty had used to Prolong the Peace with the Turks, having been wholly fruitless, he was now preparing for the War; That he had made a League with the Crown of *Poland*, and was assured of a considerable Supply of Money from time to time from the Pope, and that with these Assurances, and the Divine Protection, his Imperial Majesty doubted not but to prosecute the War with Honour, without needing the assistance of the Empire. Our Letters from *Munick* inform us, That they were expecting there Prince *Waldeck*, General of the Forces of the Empire, the Elector of *Bavaria* having desired he would come thither, that he might consult with him about making a Regulation for the Troops which the Circle of *Bavaria*, and that of *Smabia*, are to furnish for their Quota of the Army of the Empire;

Empire; and that the States of *Suabia* had resolved, being pressed therunto by his Electoral Highness, to enter into the Alliance which the Circles of *Bavaria*, *Franconia*, and the upper *Rhine*, have lately made, with the Emperor.

*Hamburg*, April 4. Monsieur *Bierman*, the Danish Minister, is still at the Court of the Duke of *Zell*, but we do not yet learn what Success he has had in the Commission he was sent thither upon. From *Copenhagen* they write, That Vice-Admiral *De Wit* was gone for *Norway*, to fetch the Seamen that have been raised there for the Service of the Danish Fleet, which is fitting out with very extraordinary diligence. From *Sueden*, That to answer the Preparations of their Neighbors, they are likewise fitting out a Fleet, which will be ready to put to Sea the next Month. From *Berlin*, That the Elector of *Brandenburg* continues to be very much troubled with the Gout, and that the Recruits, as well as the new Levies, are made there with great application. From *Dresden*, That the Elector of *Saxony* had appointed a general Rendezvous of his Troops to be held the 15th of this Month, and that the Count *de Lamberg*, the Imperial Minister, was expected there from *Vienna*, and the Herr *Van Amerongen*, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces, from *Berlin*. From *Warsaw*, That the Dyet was prolonged for 10 Days, and that it was believed, before they separated, the Alliance would be concluded between the Emperor and that Crown.

*Hague*, April 9. The Prince of *Orange* came to Town on Tuesday last in the Evening, and the next day was present in the Assembly of the States of *Holland*, who are going to separate for 12 or 15 days. The States General have sent their Orders to the several Admiralties for the fitting out the 16 Ships which they have resolved to put to Sea: This Squadron, it's believed, is designed for the assistance of the *Suedes*, in case the King of *Denmark* shall go about to hinder the Transportation of the Troops, which they intend to send over to *Germany* for the security of their Territories there. The Admiralty of *Amsterdam* has acquainted the States, That of the six new Ships they are Building there for the Service of the State, three are almost finished, and have desired they may be supplied with the Moneys necessary for that Service. All the Provinces have not yet consented to the state of the War for this present Year, but it's believed they will now very speedily, the States General pressing them with great earnestness therein. The Count *de Stirum*, being lately made Vice-Admiral of the *Maese*, has resigned his Command of Lieutenant Colonel of the Prince of *Friseland's* Guards, to his Brother. The *East-India* Company are Building eight great Ships, four at *Amsterdam*, two at *Rotterdam*, and two in *Zealand*.

*Paris*, April 7. It is said at Court, That the King will part from *Versailles* the 26th of this Month, to go and see his Troops which are to Encamp on the *Soane*, near *Chalons*, but it is not yet known whether the Queen will go this Journey. We are now told, That the King will give the Government of *Guyenne* to the Duke *de Navailles*, and the Survivance of it to the Marquis *de Montrespan*, who is to Marry with the Duke *de Na-*

*vaillies's* Daughter. The Doctors of the *Sorbonne* meet every day, to consider of the Proposition they received from the Parliament here, concerning the Popes Authority, and to draw upon Answer to it, but they make very little Progress in this matter, their Opinions therein being very much divided. We have advice from *Toulon*, That one of our King's Ships has forced ashore, on the Coast of *Barbary*, an Algerine Man of War of 30 Guns, and that the Moors set Fire to the Ship, to prevent her falling into the hands of the French.
