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Warsaw, March 26.

THe Term for the sitting of the Dyet is again Prolonged for 15 days, in which time it's hoped the publick Affairs that are before them will be brought to a happy conclusion. Here is arrived a Turkish Chiaus, who demands a free passage, through the Polish Territories for 50000 Tartars, and endeavours with Threats and Promises to divert this Crown from entering into any Engagement with the Emperor, but both are very little regarded, and the Alliance which Count *Wal-lenstein*, the Imperial Ambassador, is Treating here, will in few days be concluded. The Accusation that has been brought against Count *Morstein*, the Crown-Treasurer, will be Examined in the next Dyet, that the important Affairs that are debated in this may not receive any interruption, which they would do in a very great measure, should this Charge against him be now particularly enquired into.

Flornce, March 28. The Great Duke's Gallies that carried the Marquiss *de los Velez*, late Viceroy of Naples, to *Marseilles*, are come back. By a Vessel arrived from *Port-Mahon* we have advice, That three Gallies of the Squadron of the Duke of *Turbs* were gone for *Sardinia*, to carry thither the Count *de Fuenfajida*, Viceroy of that Island, and that so soon as they have Landed him, they are to take their Course for *Naples*, to joyn four other Gallies of the same Squadron. From *Thou-lon* we have an account, That the French are making great preparations there against the *Algierines*, and that they will have 18 Men of War at Sea, besides their Gallies, and other Vessels that are to attend the Fleet; and at the same time we are told That the Spaniards will have this Summer, in the *Mediterranean*, a Fleet of 25 Men of War, and 15 Gallies, besides 10 Gallies of the State of *Genous*, who are to joyn them. From *Turin* they write, That the two new Regiments of Dragoons, which the Duke of *Savoy* has raised, are compleat, and that they were to Muster as yesterday, and that that Duke is going to Fortifie *Trino*. The Letters from *Milan* say, That Monsieur *de Louvigny*, *Maistre de Camp* General of the Forces of that Dutchy, was gone in great haste, with several Ingeniers, to *Tortona*, to Fortifie that place.

Venice, April 3. The Letters we receive from *Dalmatia* give us an account, That the Bassa of *Bosnia* is sending all the Troops and Provisions he can possibly draw together to *Belgrade*, where the Grand-Signior, as these Letters assure us, will be in Person the latter end of this Month; It's said

he will not go into the Field with his Army, but that he will leave the Command thereof to the Grand-Vizier. From *Rome* they write, That the Pope has received an Answer from the Most Christian King, to the Letter he lately writ him, exhorting him to turn his Arms against the Turks, and to that end to compose the differences that do depend between him and the Princes his Neighbours; and that the Pope has likewise written to the Emperor and the King of *Spain*, pressing them to do their part for the establishing a firm Peace in Christendom; That the Count *de Marteniss*, the Emperor's Minister, had made fresh Instances to the Pope in the Name of his Imperial Majesty, That he will give the Emperor such Assistance as may be proportionable to the exigency of the Conjunction, and that a Congregation of Cardinals had been thereupon held the 26th past, to consider of the means to raise a more considerable Supply than what has been as yet sent his Imperial Majesty, but we do not hear what was resolved on.

Genous, April 6. This Week arrived here the *Unity*, from *Majorca*, and the *Tunseene* from *Tunis* and *Legborne*. The four new Gallies which this State have resolved to joyn to the six they have already at Sea, are fitting out with great diligence, and will in a very short time be ready to Sail. The Senate are sending some Companies of Soldiers to *Savona*, to reinforce the Garrison that is there, which makes People believe the Senate have some Apprehensions that that place may be Attacked. From *Naples* they write, That the Marquiss *del Carpio*, their new Viceroy, has done several things, since his being in that Government, which have given great satisfaction to the People.

Vienna, April 4. The Train of Artillery, which has been prepared here, will March the next week for *Hungary*, and the Imperial Troops are on all sides in motion; The place of their General Rendezvous is not yet declared, and will not be till the arrival of the Duke of *Lorraine*, when a great Council of War will be held here. From *Hungary* we have advice, That Count *Teckley* is returned from *Keismarck* to *Caschau*, being somewhat concerned at the Demand which the Bassa of *Buda* had made to have one of the Gates of *Caschau* put into the Hands of the Janizaries, which he would send thither for that purpose, and to have the Baron *Kohary* late Governor of *Fillecke*, delivered to the Turks, whose Prisoner he pretends he is, and that Count *Teckley* had sent an Officer to *Buda*, to endeavour to discover what is at the bottom of this Demand, Count *Rabatz*, whom the Emperor sent to visit the Places in *Croatia*, is come back, and has made his report. The Margrave of *Baden*, President of the Council of War, has been at *Raab* and *Comorra*, and

and is gone to the Isle of *Schütz* to give the necessary Orders for its defence and security. The Emperors Ministers are treating with several Merchants here for the remitting 350 thousand Florins to *Warsaw*, which are to be paid to the King of *Poland* upon the conclusion of the Offensive and Defensive League which is treating between his Imperial Majesty and that Crown.

Cologne, April 13. We talk here very much of an Accommodation between his Electoral Highness and the City of *Liege*, and it's said, that some Expedients are proposed which will remove the difficulties that have hitherto obstructed it; the Arch-Deacon of *Liege*, who is sent hither by that Chapter, is not wanting to do his part towards it, and being a Person that is well esteemed here, his endeavours are like to be the more successful. The last Letters we received from *Vienna* gave an account, That they were every hour expecting an Express from *Warsaw*, with the News of the Conclusion of the Alliance between the Emperor and that Crown, and that Major-General *Schutz* was to March with some Troops towards the Frontiers of *Poland*, to join the 6000 Polish Horse, which the *Chevalier de Lubomirski* is to bring into the Emperor's Service; That several Troops were likewise ordered to March to *Croatia*, to join the Militia of that Country, for its security against the Incursions of the Turks; and that the Emperor was fixed in his Resolution of being present at the General Rendezvous of his Army, which is appointed to be held the 20th of this Month on the Frontiers of *Hungary*. From *Ratisbonne* they write, That it has been proposed to the Dyet, That the Imperial Chamber may be removed from *Spire* to some place of greater security.

Hamburg April 13. The Letters from *Stockholm* of the second Instant, tell us, That the King had sent the Admiral *Wachmester*, to *Carelscron*, to hasten the Maritime Preparations they are making there, and that great Care and Diligence was used to raise Seamen for the Service of the Fleet; That General *Aschemberg* had Orders to draw together the Kings Troops on the Frontiers of *Norway*, and to choose a Camp for them in some convenient place, and that the King of *Sweden* intended to have another Camp in *Bleking* or *Schonen*, besides the Troops he designs to send over to his Territories in *Germany*. From *Copenhagen* they write, That their Fleet is in great forwardness, and that it will be ready to put to Sea the beginning of the next Month at farthest: and from *Holstein* we have an account, That the Danish Troops are Marching to the *Properbeyde*, where the King intends to see them in a Body. The motion of these Forces, and the Report that is spread abroad, That a Body of French Troops will come this way, does encrease the Apprehensions many People here are in; what ground there is for them time must discover. There are Letters from *Warsaw* which tell us, That the League with the Emperor is finally Concluded; and that Count *Morstein*, the Crown-Treasurer, is deprived of his publick Employment, and made a Prisoner upon the Accusation brought against him, but this last particular needs a Confirmation.

Paris April 21. The eighteen Companies of the

French Guards, mentioned in our last, and six of the Suisse, are on their March to *Lille*, *Tournay*, and *Doway*, to supply the room of the Troops that are drawn out of those places in order to their Marching to the several Camps which the King is going to visit: The discourse at Court is, That he will take his Journey first for *Burgundy*, That he will pass through *Dyon*, *Dole*, and *Besancon*, to *Alsace*, and that having made some short stay at *Strasbourg*, he will go for *Lorraine*, and so return home again. The *Sieur Heinsius*, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General of the United Provinces, has had a Conference with the Marquis de *Croissy*, Secretary of State, concerning the Affair of *Orange*, but has not yet had his Audience of the King. Monsieur de *Veignelay* is gone for *Thoulon*, to hasten the Equipage that is making there, and to give the necessary Orders for the Building Forty or Fifty double Chaloups, which will be of great use in the intended Expedition against the *Algerines*. A great Reform is making in the Hospital of the *Invalides*, all such as, upon a strict Examination, appear not to have been Wounded in the King's Service, being put out, and the Officers that gave them their Certificates are in danger of being called to a strict account for it.

Norwich April 9. On the seventh Instant our new Charter was brought down by one of the Earl of *Tarmouth's* Brothers, who was met about four Miles from hence by several of the Neighbouring Gentry, and at the end of the City bounds by the Mayor and Aldermen, attended with between five and six hundred Horse, and several thousands on Foot: The Charter being presented to Mr. Mayor, was afterwards carried by the Sheriff into the City, with Trumpets Sounding, and Waits playing, and continued Acclamations of many thousand Citizens, till they came to the Hall, where the Mayor, with his Brethren, gave Mr. *Paston* (with the rest of the Gentlemen accompanying him) a splendid Entertainment in their Court-Chamber. After Dinner the Mayor and several Aldermen were sworn, and the Night was concluded with all Expressions of Joy, as Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, &c.

Whitchal, April 14. This day their Majesties and their Royal Highnesses parted from hence, with the whole Court, to *Windfor*.
