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Copenhagen, April 7.

THe Swedish Minister here has presented a Memorial to the King of *Denmark*, wherein he offers, as we are informed, the King his Masters Mediation for the composing the differences that do depend between his Majesty of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein*, and acquaints him with the King of *Suedens* intention to transport some Troops to his Territories in *Germany*, to reinforce his Garrisons there. The diligence that is used here in fitting out the Ships the King has resolved to put to Sea, is very extraordinary, and part of them are almost ready to Sail.

Vienna, April 11. On Thursday last arrived here the Duke of *Lorraine*, who went directly to the Palace to wait upon the Emperor, and the next day a Council of War was held, where, as we are informed, it was resolved, That the Imperial Army, which is to Rendezvous the third of the next Month near *Presbourg*, shall consist of 40000 Men; That General *Schutz* shall, with 7000 Men, joyn the 6000 Polish Horse, which the Chevalier *Lubomirski* brings into the Emperors Service, and the Hungarian Troops, which together may make a Body of 25000 Men, and these are to act in upper *Hungary*; That another Body of 6000 Men shall Encamp near *Leopoldstadt* on the *Waag*, and in case they find the Turks have a design upon that place, they are to put themselves into it. And besides these, ten or twelve thousand Men are to be Posted on the Frontiers of *Moravia* and *Silesia*, to secure those Countreys against the IncurSIONS of the Turks. From *Hungary* they write, That Count *Teckelej* makes great Preparations for the Campaign, and that he has sent to the Bassa of *Buda*, to demand a Body of Horse, to joyn with his Troops, in order to their making an IncurSION into *Silesia*: The Letters add, That most of the Nobility of Upper *Hungary* are very much dissatisfied with him, and have refused to obey his Summons for their following him into the Field. There are Advices which give an account, That the Grand Signior is on his March towards *Belgrade*, and that an Army of Tartars is to Rendezvous the 25 Instant at *Pest*, not far from *Buda*.

Ratisbonne, April 12. The Point of the Publick Security being with great earnestness recommended to the Dyet by the Imperial Commissioner the Bishop of *Aichstadt*, the Electoral Colledge did on Saturday last enter upon the Consideration of it; and after some debate, declared, That for as much as the danger which the impending War with the Turks threatens, not only the Hereditary Countries, but even the whole Empire does encrease daily, they are of opinion that nothing is more earnestly to be desired for the Safety of the Empire, in this Conjunction than the establishing a firm Peace with the Crown of *France*, and that this being done, they will

take such Resolutions as may be farther necessary for the Publick Security; and that therefore they do adhere to their Conclusion of the 12th of *December*. At the same time the Colledge of Princes have resolved, to return their most humble Thanks to the Emperor for his Fatherly Care of the Common Safety of the Empire, of which he gives daily Instances in this difficult and dangerous Conjunction; And that seeing the Partition of the Quota's of the Army of the Empire has been agreed by the several Circles, it is necessary to appoint the general Officers, and that accordingly they are of opinion that the Command of General of the Army of the Empire should be conferred on Prince *Waldzcke*, a Person of great Abilities and Experience in War; and that at the same time that they dispatch the Point of the Publick Security, they will do what lies in them to advance the Negotiation of Peace with the Crown of *France*. The Imperial Regiments that have had their Quarters in the Empire are now marching for *Hungary*.

Hamburg, April 23. The Letters from *Copenhagen* tell us, That the King of *Denmark* has appointed the Rendezvous of his Troops in *Holstein*, to be the fourth of *May*, at which he will be himself present. From *Stockholm* they write, That there was a discourse at that Court, That the King of *Sueden*, to avoid giving his Neighbours any Jealousie, would defer the transporting the Troops he designs to send over for *Germany*, till there be a pressing occasion for it, and that in the mean time he will raise 4000 Men in *Germany*, which he is to assist the Emperor with against the Turks. From *Warsaw* they tell us, That there was arrived an Ambassador from the Czar of *Moscovy*, but that the business he came about was not yet known, though some reported that he had Orders to assure the King of *Poland* that the Czars desired to enter into an Alliance with him and the Emperor, for their mutual defence against the Turks. It's said that by the League now concluded between the Emperor and the Crown of *Poland*, it is stipulated, That the Polish Army shall act separately towards the *Ukraine*, but if *Vienna* or *Cracaw* shall be Besieged by the Turks, then the Imperial and Polish Forces are to joyn together for their relief.

Brussels, April 23. About the end of this Month the Marquiss of *Grana* intends to go to *Antwerp*, and from thence to *Gaunt*, where he purposes to pass greatest part of the Summer, that he may be near the Camp he designs to have on that side. This Court is much rejoiced with the News of the Alliance being Concluded between the Emperor and the King of *Poland*: It is Offensive against the Turks, and Defensive against all. They write from *Lille*, That they are daily expecting there the Mareschal d'*Humierès*; That 18 Companies of the French Guards, and several of the Swisse, are arrived at *Lille*, *Tourday*, and *Doway*, to supply the room of the Troops that are Marched from thence for

for *Lorraine*. The difference between the Duke de *Havre* and the Prince de *Vaudemont*, has been composed by his Excellency, and they made Friends. The Marriage between the Duke de *Aersbor* and the Marquiss de *Grana's* Daughter, who is coming from *Spain*, is now declared, and the Duke is going to meet his Bride at *Paris*, in her way hither. The Affairs of *Liege* are in a very fair way to a Composition, and the Sieur *Fodocus*, the Imperial Minister, is coming from *Cologne* to *Liege*, to assist towards the perfecting this Work.

Brussels, April 27. The Nations of this City are now assembled, in order to the Renewing the Imposts for six Months. This Afternoon the Fraternity of the *Cross-bow-Men* met at the *Sablon*, to shoot down the Bird; they had invited his Excellency to their Feast, and he was accordingly present at it. The Sieur *Battire*, who has been in *Spain* these two Years, in the quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Princes of *Luxenburg*, is arrived here in his Return home, and has been very kindly received by his Excellency, but will make no stay here. His Excellency has received Bills of Exchange for 160000 Crowns from *Madrid*, which are to be paid to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to satisfy the Arrears of Subsidies due to him from the Crown of *Spain*, in case his Electoral Highness will enter into Engagements with the Emperor, otherwise his Excellency has liberty to dispose of the same for the Service of these Countreys. We have advice, That the 19th Instant three Battalions Marched from *Avesnes*, and the 21 three Battalions more, and that on the 20th two Marched from *Mabeuge*, and that they all took their way towards *Mazieres*: In their stead 600 Soldiers are arrived at *Avesnes*, and 800 at *Mabeuge*.

Hague, April 27. The States of *Holland* will meet again the fifth of the next Month, against which time his Highness is expected here from *Dieven*. We are assured, That Monsieur de *Sommerdyke* will at last go for *Surinam*, and that he will have an absolute Power to do whatever he shall judge for the good of that Colony, without being accountable for the same to any person whatsoever. From *Liege* they write, of the 23 Instant, That the Burger-masters of that City, which were lately Banished, have been recalled, and that the 32 Trades had chosen one out of every Company, who are to assist at the Conferences that are to be held for the Composing matters with their Prince, but at the same time these Letters do assure us, That in case the endeavours that are now used for the bringing things to an accommodation do not take effect, the Elector of *Cologne* will Attack that City with all the Forces he can draw together. Our Northern Letters tell us, That Monsieur *Bierman*, the Danish Envoy, was arrived at *Berlin*, but that he had not yet seen his Electoral Highness, who was with his whole Court at *Postdam*.

Marseilles, April 20. Great Preparations are making here and at *Toulon* for the Prosecuting the War against the Algerines: The Fleet which Monsieur du *Quefne* is to Command will consist of 15 Men of War, and as many Gallies, besides Gallies and other Vessels, which are ordered to be ready to put to Sea by the end of the next month. The Tripolins have lately taken one of the best

Ships that belonged to this place; she was bound home from *Scanderoon*, and her lading is said to have been worth 150 thousand Dollars. The Algerines have also taken a Vessel laden with Corn, and two Barks; and the French do likewise expect a Rupture with *Tunis*.

Paris, April 28. The King's Journey is said to be fixed for the 26th of the next Month, but the Ladies will not be of it. The Count de *Roye* is gone for *Denmark*, to command that King's Forces. There is a Discourse, That the Duke of *Bouillon* is going for *Bavaria*, and the occasion of his Journey, as is reported, is to visit his Sister, who is Married to Prince *Maximilian*, Uncle to the Elector of *Bavaria*. The King has given Orders for the Building 14 new Ships, four at *Rocheffort*, four at *Brest*, two at *Havre-de-Grace*, and the rest at other Ports, Monsieur de *Mortangie*, the Kings Ambassador in *Denmark*, is coming home; and it's said that Monsieur de *Hatlay*, one of the Kings Ambassadors at the late Conference at *Frankfort*, will succeed him. From *Poland* we have advice, That some Letters has been intercepted, upon which Count *Morslein*, the Crown Treasurer, who was lately here as Ambassador from the King of *Poland*, has been accused in the Dyet. There are Letters from *Rome* which say, That the Journey of the Bishop of *Fano*, whom the Pope sends his Nuncio hither, is put off till after *Whitsontide*. The Doctors of the *Sorbonne* will, it's believed now in few days draw up an Answer to the Proposition concerning the Popes Authority, that has layn so long before them, but no body can say what it will be, for the Opinions are very equally divided.
