League between his Imperial Majeliy and the Crown of Poland, is dispatched back with Bills of Exchange for 400 thousand Hurins, which are to

be paid to that King.

There. April 24. The Magistrates of this City do Labour all they can to dispose the Commonalty to an Agreement, and in order thereunto have prevailed with them to choose 32 Persons, one out of each Company or Trade, who are to meet with the Deputies chasen by the Magistrates, to consider of a speedy and effectual way for the determining the differences that do depend between their Prince and them; and in the first place it is proposed. That to shew their willingness to give his Electoral Highness satisfaction, they will confent to the Tax of the 60th Penny, and to the Impost upon Beer.

From Francfort we have an Cologne, April 25. account of the Death of the Bithop of Bamberg, and that the Deputies which met at Ansburg were feparated without taking any final Resolution up-on the Proposals that have been made for the bringing the Circle of Suabia into the Alliance which the Circles of Franconia and the Upper-Rhine have lately made with the Emperor. From Ratubonne of the 19th they write, I hat the two Colledges cannot agree in their Opinions, by reafon whereof the Resolution they took some time fince to enter into a Negotiation with the Count d: Crecy, for the composing the differences between the Empire and the Crown of France, has not yet

had any effect.

Hamburg, April 23. Our Letters from Copenha-gen of the 16th Instant give an account, That the Preparations are continued there with great diligence; That the King will have a Fleet of 36 Men of War at Sea the next Month, and an Army of 30000 Men in the Field, which are to Rendez-Vous, the 11th of May, on the Groperbeyde; That accordingly the Danish Troops are on their march, and that the King will part from Copenhagen about the end of this Month, for Holftein. From Berlin they write, That Monsieur Bierman, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, was arrived at Posldam (where the Elector of Brandenburg at present is) and had had a private Audience of his Electoral Highness; and that it is said high pulmess is to engage his Electoral Highness to enter into the League now lately concluded between the King of Denmark and the Crown of France. The Polish Letters tell us, That they do already begin to raise Men in that Kingdom for the forming the Army which that Crown, pursuant to the League now concluded with the Emperor, is to employ against the Turks, and that the Affair of the Crown-Treasurer, Count Morftein, is put off till thenext Dyct.

Hague, April 30. The fix Men of War, which the Admiralty of Amsterdam does Build as their Queta of the 18 Ships which the States-General reiolved should be built this Year, are almost finished, and three of them are already Launched; but the other Admiraltics are not so forward, and particularly that of Frizeland, where they have not yet begun the Ships they are to Build. In he Heer Van Owerkerke, Master of the Horse to the Prince of Orange, and Colonel of his Guards du Corps, has been very dangerously ill, but is ab present somewhat better. The Astions of the Ragi-india

Company in these Countreys are fallen to 300. The Northern Letters fay, That there is some appearance of an accommodation of the differences between the king of Denmark and the Duke of

Holftein.

Paris, May 1. The 26th past the Sieur Heinsius, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General of the United Provinces, was Conducted to his Audience of their Majesties, &c. as the Si ur Hax-thausen, Envoy from the Duke of Hossein-Gottorp, was the day following. Monsieur du Luesne is at present at Thoulon, to hasten the Preparations that are making there against the Algierines. There are Letters from Italy which say the Bishop of Fano, the Popes Nuncio, is on his Journey hither, but the last Letters from Rome made no mention of it.

Deal, April 23. This day came into the Downs the Scipio Aftricanus, bound for East-India: There are likewise in the Downs four other East-India Ships, the Josias, the George, the Fleece, and the Success, and about 20 Merchant Ships more, outward bound.
