#### From Thursday April 26. to Donday April 30. 1683.

Warsaw, April 16. He 10th Inftant the Dyet was again proloaged for eight days, and confidering the good difpolition things are in, there is all the reason in the world to believe it will have a happy Conclusion, The Molcovite Ambaffador has had three feveral Conferences with the Commissioners appointed to Treat with him; his chief bufinefs, as we are informed, is to demand the execution of the Treaty concluded between this Crown and the last Czar, and he has been answered, That the Mofcovites have not on their part made goed the faid Treaty; but as to any Overture of the Czars entring into an Alliance against the Turks, we do not hear that any mention has been made of it by the Ambassador, but it is said, That an Ambassador will be fent from hence to Mofcovy, to pro pole it.

Copenbagen, April 24. Our Fleet is haftening out, and many of the Ships are almost ready to Sail. The King will part from hence for Holjtein the beginning of the next Month, and in the mean time his Troops are Marching to their Rendezvous. They are expecting at this Court, with fome Impatience, an account of Monfieur Bierman's Succels at Berlin, (whither he went after having performed his Commission to the Dukes of Lunenburg) for much feems to depend upon it, and it's believed our King will not enter upon any great Enterprize unless he be certain of his Electoral Highnels's concurrence therein. From Stockbolm they write, That the Preparations that are ma-king here by Sca and Land do give the King of Sueden great Jealoufic, he looking upon them as the effect of the League lately concluded between -this Crown and the Molt Chriftian King; and that the King of Sueden continues his Refolution of fending a Body of Men to his Territories in Germany, but that he will not transport them all together, but in Parties and at different times.

Viennas April 22. The Imperial Troops are marching to their Rendezvous, and the Duke of Lorrain will part from hence on Saturday next for Hungary, to mark out a Camp near Presbourg, and to give the neceffary Orders for the preparing thiogs against the opening of the Campagne. The Emperor's Harbingers are gone for Presbourg, to provide Quarters for the Court. Their Imperial Majefties remove from hence on Monday next to Laxemburg; and from thence they will go about the beginning of the next Munther Prefbourg. His Imperial Majefty was this week to de the Train of Artillery, and the Wagons laden with Ammunition, which will begin to March the 24th In-flant under a Convoy of 1500 Horfe. The Elector of Bavaria is expected here in few days; he will come without any great Train, intending to

pire, will be likewife prefent at the Rendezvous of the Imperial Army, but without any certainty. While we are thus proparing on this fide to take the Field, we have an account, That the Grand-S gnior is parted from Adrianople; That his Troops are marching to their Rendezvous, and that the Grand-Viz.er will be at Belgrade the latter end of this Month; That Count Teckeley is drawing his Troops together, having appointed their Rendezvous near Roffenau, and that he has, to firengthen his Army, withdrawn his Safeguards from the Berg-Towns; That the report that was spread abroad of his having great miltrufts of the Turks appears to be without ground; That on the con-. trary there is a very intimate Correspondence-between him and the Vizier of Offen and that Count Teckeley was going to Offer to confer with him concerning the War. We have Letters from Warfam which tell us, That the Dyet would end the day after, and that it was not doubted but they would finish all the Important matters before them.

Cologne, April 27. From Au bourg they write, That the Deputies of the Duke of Wirtemberg and the Bilhop of Constance, who are Directors of the Circle of Suspia, were parted from thence without concluding any thing, with the Deputies of Bavaria upon the Proposals that have been made for the Circle of Suabia's entring into the Alliance which the Circles of Bavaria and Francania have made with the Emperor. From Munichen, That the Elector of Bavaria has had frequent Conferences with the Prince of Waldeck, General of the Forces of the Empire ; and that his Electoral Highnels intended to part in' few days for Vienna, to accompany the Emperor to the General Rendezvous of his Army, which will be held the beginning of the next Month near Presbourg: And from' Francfort, That the Count de Hobenloe, the Imperial Minister, was passed through that City in his way to Darmstadt and Mentz, having a Commilfion to those Princes; and that by an Express arrived there they had advice of the Death of the

Bilhop of Wirtsbourg and Bamberg. Hamburg, April 30. The generality of peo-ple feem to expect a War will break out in these Northern parts, the Preparations that are making giving the occasion for such an Opinion; but those that pretend to be well informed tell us, That the King of Denmark will not engage himfelf unleis he have the Elector of Brandenburg on his fide, and concerning his Electoral Highnels's Refolutions there are at this time very different Reports; which of them is best grounded we shall be able to learn from the Succels of Monficur Bierman, the Danish Envoy's, Negotiation, who is now at Poflam. This City in the mean time makes what Provision they can for their Defence, by raising be here incognito. It is reported, that the Elector, of Men, and making fome new Fortifications be-of Saxony, and feveral other Princes of the Em- fore the Altena and the Steen-G te, and by fendfig to the Princes their Neighbours, to defire their Protection in cafe of need. It is faid that the Princes of Lunenburg have fent to the Magiffrates of Bremen, to offer them luch a number of Men for a Garifon as may fecure them against all danger, but this is a Report which we know not what Credit it deferves, but if it is true, there is reafon to believe that that City is too jealous of their Fre dom to receive any Forreign Troops, enkls the danger be very preffing. The King of Denmark is not expected in Holftein till the eighth or tenth of next Month; his Troops have Orders to keep themselves in a readinets to March upon the first Command.

Hague, May 4. The Deputies of the States of Holland are molt of them conceto Town, in order to th ir meeting to Morrow. The Prince of Or-targe is gone from Dieren for Grave, Maejlricht, and Bridd, to visit those places, and is exp field here on Thursday or Friday next. The Heer Van Diejt, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Branden-Burg, is on his Journey hither. The Heer Van Sommerdyke is now at Amsterdam, to adjult matters concerning his Voyage to Surinam; it's not doubted but he will obtain all he defires, though Le meets with fome opposition at prefent. The Heer Heinfus, whom the States General lately fent in quality of the r Envoy Extraordinary to the Moft Christian King, concerning the Affair of Orange, has given the States an account of his Reception ac that Court, and of a Conference he had with Monficur Croiffy, Secretary of State ; It's believed he will make no long flay there. From Hamburg they write, That the King of Denmark will not part from Copenhagen till the begin ing of May; That his Troops are to Rendezvous in Holftein about the roth of that Month, and that the Danes continue to work with great diligence on their Fleet. At Hamburg they raife Men, and are making few ral rew Fortifications for the Security of that place., There are Letters from Danizick which give an account, That the Dyet of Poland was happily ended the 18th Inflant, about three or four a Clock in the Morning.

On Friday laft Monfieur Colbert, Paris May 5. laving fent for the chief Farmers of the King's Revenues, told them, That his Majefly has occafion for five Millions of Florins, and that they muft furnish it, which it's faid they have promifed to do. Several Expressere daily dispatched by Monfieur de Louvon to different places, with Orders concerning the march of the Troops that are to compose the several Camps. People continue to ipeak of the King's Journey as a thing that is certain, and it's laid that his Majefly will be on Whitfunday at Dyon; and the Marquils de Montaubon, the King's Licutenant in the Francke Comte, is gone to prevare things against the Courts coming thither. The King has named the Marquils de Villars Orondate to go his Ambalfador to the King of Denmark in the place of Monfieur de Mortargie, who is coming home; They write from thence, That the King of Denmark is hallening out his Fleet, in order to hinder the Transportation of the Troops which the King of Sueden purposes to fend to Germany, but that it is not certain what incalures the Eleto be made him by the Emperor and Spain, and the Alliance lately Concluded between his Impe-Fial Majelly and the Grown of Poland is it's belie-

ved very much confidered at Berlin. The Marcichal de Navsilles is made Governor to the Duke de Chartres, the Duke of Orleans's only Son. The Mar-riage between the Marquis de Coaflin and Madamoifelle d'Alegre is Concluded with the King's Approbation. Monsieur de Saignelay is at Thoulon, to hallen the Equipage that is making there, and it's faid that the Ships will be ready to put to Sca by the 25th of this Month. The King was on Sun-day laft indifposed with a Fit of the Cholick, which did very much diffurb him for feveral hours, but the next day he was very well again, and was prefent at a Review of the Troops of his Houlehold.
