Warsaw, April 16.

THe 10th Instant the Dyet was again prolonged for eight days, and considering the good disposition things are in, there is all the reason in the world to believe it will have a happy Conclusion. The Moscovite Ambassador has had three several Conferences with the Commissioners appointed to Treat with him; his chief business, as we are informed, is to demand the execution of the Treaty concluded between this Crown and the last Czar, and he has been answered, That the Moscovites have not on their part made good the said Treaty; but as to any Overture of the Czars entering into an Alliance against the Turks, we do not hear that any mention has been made of it by the Ambassador, but it is said, That an Ambassador will be sent from hence to *Moscow*, to propose it.

Copenhagen, April 24. Our Fleet is hastening out, and many of the Ships are almost ready to Sail. The King will part from hence for *Holstein* the beginning of the next Month, and in the mean time his Troops are Marching to their Rendezvous. They are expecting at this Court, with some Impatience, an account of Monsieur *Bierman's* Success at *Berlin*, (whither he went after having performed his Commission to the Dukes of *Eunen-burg*) for much seems to depend upon it, and it's believed our King will not enter upon any great Enterprize unless he be certain of his Electoral Highness's concurrence therein. From *Stockholm* they write, That the Preparations that are making here by Sea and Land do give the King of *Sueden* great Jealousie, he looking upon them as the effect of the League lately concluded between this Crown and the Most Christian King; and that the King of *Sueden* continues his Resolution of sending a Body of Men to his Territories in *Germany*, but that he will not transport them all together, but in Parties and at different times.

Vienna, April 22. The Imperial Troops are marching to their Rendezvous, and the Duke of *Lorraine* will part from hence on Saturday next for *Hungary*, to mark out a Camp near *Presbourg*, and to give the necessary Orders for the preparing things against the opening of the Campaign. The Emperor's Harbingers are gone for *Presbourg*, to provide Quarters for the Court. Their Imperial Majesties remove from hence on Monday next to *Laxemburg*; and from thence they will go about the beginning of the next Month to *Presbourg*. His Imperial Majesty was this week to see the Train of Artillery, and the Wagons laden with Ammunition, which will begin to March the 24th Instant under a Convoy of 1500 Horse. The Elector of *Bavaria* is expected here in few days; he will come without any great Train, intending to be here *incognito*. It is reported, that the Elector of *Saxony*, and several other Princes of the Em-

pire, will be likewise present at the Rendezvous of the Imperial Army, but without any certainty. While we are thus preparing on this side to take the field, we have an account, That the Grand-Signior is parted from *Adrianople*; That his Troops are marching to their Rendezvous, and that the Grand-Vizier will be at *Belgrade* the latter end of this Month; That Count *Teckley* is drawing his Troops together, having appointed their Rendezvous near *Roffenau*, and that he has, to strengthen his Army, withdrawn his Safeguards from the Berg-Towns; That the report that was spread abroad of his having great mistrusts of the Turks appears to be without ground; That on the contrary there is a very intimate Correspondence between him and the Vizier of *Offen* and that Count *Teckley* was going to *Offen* to confer with him concerning the War. We have Letters from *Warsaw* which tell us, That the Dyet would end the day after, and that it was not doubted but they would finish all the Important matters before them.

Cologne, April 27. From *Aubourg* they write, That the Deputies of the Duke of *Wirttemberg* and the Bishop of *Constance*, who are Directors of the Circle of *Suabia*, were parted from thence without concluding any thing, with the Deputies of *Bavaria* upon the Proposals that have been made for the Circle of *Suabia's* entering into the Alliance which the Circles of *Bavaria* and *Franconia* have made with the Emperor. From *Munichen*, That the Elector of *Bavaria* has had frequent Conferences with the Prince of *Waldeck*, General of the Forces of the Empire; and that his Electoral Highness intended to part in few days for *Vienna*, to accompany the Emperor to the General Rendezvous of his Army, which will be held the beginning of the next Month near *Presbourg*: And from *Francfort*, That the Count de *Hohenloe*, the Imperial Minister, was passed through that City in his way to *Darmstadt* and *Mentz*, having a Commission to those Princes; and that by an Express arrived there they had advice of the Death of the Bishop of *Wirtsboung* and *Bamberg*.

Hamburg, April 30. The generality of people seem to expect a War will break out in these Northern parts, the Preparations that are making giving the occasion for such an Opinion; but those that pretend to be well informed tell us, That the King of *Denmark* will not engage himself unless he have the Elector of *Brandenburg* on his side, and concerning his Electoral Highness's Resolutions there are at this time very different Reports; which of them is best grounded we shall be able to learn from the Success of Monsieur *Bierman*, the Danish Envoy's, Negotiation, who is now at *Potsdam*. This City in the mean time makes what Provision they can for their Defence, by raising of Men, and making some new Fortifications before the *Altena* and the *Steen-G. te*, and by sending

ing to the Princes their Neighbours, to desire their Protection in case of need. It is said that the Princes of *Lunenbourg* have sent to the Magistrates of *Bremen*, to offer them such a number of Men for a Garrison as may secure them against all danger, but this is a Report which we know not what Credit it deserves, but if it is true, there is reason to believe that that City is too jealous of their Freedom to receive any Foreign Troops, unless the danger be very pressing. The King of *Denmark* is not expected in *Holstein* till the eighth or tenth of next Month; his Troops have Orders to keep themselves in readiness to March upon the first Command.

Hague, May 4. The Deputies of the States of *Holland* are most of them come to Town, in order to their meeting to Morrow. The Prince of *Orange* is gone from *Dieren* for *Grave*, *Maastricht*, and *Brada*, to visit those places, and is expected here on Thursday or Friday next. The Heer *Van Dieft*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, is on his Journey hither. The Heer *Van Sommerdyke* is now at *Amsterdam*, to adjust matters concerning his Voyage to *Surinam*; it's not doubted but he will obtain all he desires, though he meets with some opposition at present. The Heer *Heinsius*, whom the States General lately sent in quality of the Envoy Extraordinary to the Most Christian King, concerning the Affair of *Orange*, has given the States an account of his Reception at that Court, and of a Conference he had with Monsieur *Croissy*, Secretary of State; It's believed he will make no long stay there. From *Hamburg* they write, That the King of *Denmark* will not part from *Copenhagen* till the beginning of *May*; That his Troops are to Rendezvous in *Holstein* about the 20th of that Month, and that the Danes continue to work with great diligence on their Fleet. At *Hamburg* they raise Men, and are making several new Fortifications for the Security of that place. There are Letters from *Danzick* which give an account, That the Dyet of *Poland* was happily ended the 8th Instant, about three or four a Clock in the Morning.

Paris May 5. On Friday last Monsieur *Colbert*, having sent for the chief Farmers of the King's Revenues, told them, That his Majesty has occasion for five Millions of Florins, and that they must furnish it, which it's said they have promised to do. Several Expresses are daily dispatched by Monsieur *de Louvois* to different places, with Orders concerning the march of the Troops that are to compose the several Camps. People continue to speak of the King's Journey as a thing that is certain, and it's said that his Majesty will be on *Whitsunday* at *Dyon*; and the Marquis *de Montauban*, the King's Lieutenant in the *Franche Comte*, is gone to prepare things against the Courts coming thither. The King has named the Marquis *de Villars Orondate* to go his Ambassador to the King of *Denmark* in the place of Monsieur *de Mortarign*, who is coming home; They write from thence, That the King of *Denmark* is hastening out his Fleet, in order to hinder the Transportation of the Troops which the King of *Sueden* purposes to send to *Germany*, but that it is not certain what measures the Elector of *Brandenburg* will take: great Offers are said to be made him by the Emperor and *Spain*, and the Alliance lately Concluded between his Imperial Majesty and the Crown of *Poland* is it's belie-

ved very much considered at *Berlin*. The Marechal *de Navailles* is made Governor to the Duke of *Chartres*, the Duke of *Orleans*'s only Son. The Marriage between the Marquis *de Coassin* and Mademoiselle *d'Aligre* is Concluded with the King's Approbation. Monsieur *de Saignelay* is at *Toulon*, to hasten the Equipage that is making there, and it's said that the Ships will be ready to put to Sea by the 25th of this Month. The King was on Sunday last indisposed with a Fit of the Cholick, which did very much disturb him for several hours, but the next day he was very well again, and was present at a Review of the Troops of his Household.

Edenburg, April 19. Some days ago the Lord Bishop of this place, with the whole Clergy of his Diocesis, did in a Solemn manner give their humble and hearty thanks to the Lord High Chancellor, Lord High Treasurer, and the rest of the Officers of State, for their extraordinary care in promoting and supporting the Interests of the Church and Orthodox Clergy, to which (next to the Blessing of God, His Majesties Favour, and the prudent Management of his Royal Highness) they owe the great Quiet and Tranquillity which they and all their Brethren over the whole Kingdom do enjoy under the present Administration of Affairs.
