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Turin, April 21.

THe 19th Instant the two new Regiments of Dragoons, the one under the Command of the Count de Ferrière, and the other, of the Count de Berné, each 300 Men, were drawn out in the Duke of Savoy's Presence, who was very well pleased with them; Yesterday they both Marched, the first to *Asti*, and the other to *Perceil*. All the Military Officers have received Orders to repair forthwith to their respective Commands.

Vienna, April 25. All things are preparing for the general Rendezvous of the Imperial Army near *Presbourg*, and the Duke of *Lorraine*, who is made General of all the Emperor's Forces, does cause a very strict Muster to be taken of the Regiments that are to compose the said Army. The Train of Artillery Marched from hence two days ago for *Hungary*; it consisted in 63 Pieces of Cannon, great and small, seven Mortar Pieces, and a very great number of Wagons, laden with Ammunition, &c. The Elector of *Bavaria* is expected here on Thursday next, and his Imperial Majesty has sent some of the Officers of his House to receive him at a place called *Melocke*. Their Imperial Majesties part from hence to-morrow for *Luxemburg*, where they will stay five or six days, and from thence go to *Presbourg*. The Elector of *Saxony* is expected at the general Rendezvous, which will be held the third or fourth of the next Month. They write from *Hungary*, That the main Body of the Ottoman Army marches very slowly, but that the *Bassa* of *Buda*, and the other *Bassa's*, are drawing together the Troops which are in *Hungary*, and have called upon Count *Teckelej* to make haste to join them, and that in the mean time they have caused all the Forage to be carried into the fortified places, that the Imperialists, in case they should be the first in the Field, may not have the Benefit thereof. The Emperor has conferred the Office of Great Master of his House upon Count *Albert* of *Zinzendorf*, and that of Great Marshal of the Court, upon Count *Francis Wallestein*. The new Fortifications that are making here will be very speedily finished.

Vienna April 29. Their Imperial Majesties parted from hence on Monday last for *Luxemburg*, where the Elector of *Bavaria* is expected this Evening. On Monday likewise arrived here the Secretary of the Count de *Saponara*, and with him Count *Teckelej's* Secretary; we know not yet the business they are sent hither about, but are willing to believe they bring some new Proposals in order to an Accommodation. This Day parted from hence the Duke of *Lorraine* for *Hungary*. The General Rendezvous is fixed for the fifth of the next Month. From *Hungary* we have Advice, That Count *Teckelej* has sent a Body of his Troops to Attack the Castle of *Dunawitz*;

That they had already made an Assault upon it, and that it was feared the place would fall into their hands, having no expectation of Relief.

Berlin, April 18. The 16th Instant the Sieur *Bierman*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Denmark*, had his first Audience of the Elector of *Brandenburg* at *Potsdam*; he has had several Conferences with his Electoral Highness's Ministers, but we cannot say with what Success. Some days since arrived here an Express, being dispatched by the Baron de *Crakaw*, his Electoral Highness's Ambassador at *Warsaw*, with the news of the Conclusion of the League between the Emperor and the Crown, which it's believed will very much influence the Councils at this Court.

Ratisbonne, April 26. Things continue here in the same state, the Colleges of Electors and Princes remaining firm in their several Conclusions, which obstructs as well the intended Treaty with the Crown of *France* as the Point of the publick Security, though the latter is very much pressed by the Imperial Commissioner. The Elector of *Bavaria* was to begin his Journey as yesterday for *Vienna*, from whence we have an account, that the Duke of *Lorraine* has acquainted the Emperor, That having made enquiry concerning the Troops that are designed for the composing the main Army his Imperial Majesty will have in *Hungary* this Summer, he finds they will not amount to more than 30000 Men; and that his Highness had commanded the Commissaries of the Musters to take a strict Muster of all the Regiments before they appear at the general Rendezvous, when his Highness will take an exact view of them himself.

Brussels, May 7. The Marquis de *Grana*, our Governor, went from hence yesterday for *Flanders*, to visit the Fortifications of *Newport* and *Ostend*; before his departure he appointed the Duke de *Haure* the Kings Commissioner for the renewing the Magistrates in the several Towns of *Flanders*. His Excellency's Marriage with Mademoiselle d'*Areberg*, the Duke d'*Archeb's* Sister, is Concluded, and will be Consummated immediately after his Excellency's return from *Flanders*. They write from *Namur*, That the French have provided at *Sedan* Thirty large Boats, and laden them with all sorts of Ammunition. Things are at present managed at *Liege* with great moderation, and there is a fair Prospect of an accommodation of the differences between that City and their Prince, the chief Obstrucster of it, the Burgermaster *Loos*, being Banished from *Liege*. They write from *Luxemburg*, That the French Cavalry in those parts are marched to the several places of Rendezvous upon the *Saar* and the *Soane*, and that there is no appearance of any action on that side. All is likewise very quiet in the French Conquests, which may change his Excellency's Resolution of Encamping his Troops in *Flanders*.

Brussels, May 11. His Excellency returned hither

ther last Night from *Flanders*, and parted again from hence this day to *Enghien*, to *Solema* 2. his Marriage with *Madamelle d'Artemberg*; from thence his Excellency intends to go with his Bride to *Mariemont*, and to stay there till his Daughter, who is coming from *Spain*, arrives, which will be about the 20th of this Month. From *Vienne* they write, That the Emperor was parted from thence for *Bangary*.

Hague, May 11. The Prince and Princesses of *Orange* returned hither the seventh Instant. The States of *Holland* are at present employ'd about making a Reformation in their Finances. The Men of War which the States-General have resolv'd to put to Sea, are fitting out with great diligence. The States-General have sent Orders to their Ambassador in *France*, to follow that King in his intended Progress.

Marseilles, May 4. The 30th past arrived here from *Paris* the Duke of *Mortemar* and Monsieur *Saignelay*; the first intends to go as a Volunteer in this Expedition, and Monsieur *Saignelay* is come to give the necessary Orders for the halting out as well the ships as the Gallies: They are ready, and will put to Sea with the first fair Wind. Monsieur *du Quesne* will command the Fleet, which will consist of 16 Men of War, and as many Gallies, besides Fire-ships, Victuallers, and other Vessels which have been purposely Built for the Shooting of Bombs.

Paris, May 12. The last Letters we received from *Tboulon* and *Marseilles* gave us an account, That Monsieur *d'Ampreville* put to Sea the 27th past with four Men of War, with Orders to stand over for *Argiers*; That the whole Fleet of Men of War and Gallies would Sail before the 15th of this Month, under the Command of Monsieur *du Quesne*, and that they have prepared a very great number of Bombs of an extraordinary bigness. His Most Christian Majesty has, as we are told, desired of the King of *Spain*, That his Fleet, may in Stress of Weather, or in case they shall come to wait fresh Water, have the Liberty of the Spanish Ports, and particularly of *Port-Mabon*. On Wednesday last the Secretary of the Marquiss *de Viter*, the King's Ambassador in *Poland*, arrived here in eleven days from *Warsaw*, which is a very extraordinary diligence: We know not what News he brings; but it's said he will not return, for that it's believed the Ambassador has by this time received his Orders to come immediately home. The King has named Monsieur *de St. Romain* to go his Ambassador to the Prince Regent of *Portugal*, in the room of the Marquiss *d'Oppede*, who is recalled. The last Letters from *Rome* told us, That the Bishop of *Fano's* Journey was put off for some days; That the Pope was very much dissatisfied with the Orders that have been sent to the University of *Doway*, to receive and teach the Propositions of the Clergy of this Kingdom in their last Assembly, and that there was not any sign of the dispatching the Bulls for the vacant Bishopricks. There is a Discourse at Court, That the King may begin his Journey some days before the 26th.

Plimouth, May 1. His Majesties Ship the *Reserve* sailed on Sunday last to the Eastward, and last night the *Faucon*, the *Francis*, and the *Boneto* Sloop sailed to the Westward.
