Three clear days' notice (exclusive of Sunday) of an intention to oppose any Prisoner's discharge must be given to such Prisoner; and the duplicates of such petitions and schedules, and all books, papers, and writings relating thereto, in the possession or power of the said Prisoners, will be lodged with the Clerk of the Peace of the said county, within ten days after the issuing of the Orders; and the said Prisoners respectively, or any Creditor or Creditors of such respective Prisoners, or his, her, or their Attorney, may inspect and examine, and have copies of the same, or any part thereof, according to the Act, 5 Geo. 4, c. 61.

*Note 2.*—Where upon the hearing of any case before the Court, the Court shall order the Prisoner to be removed, pursuant to the Act 5-Geo. 4, c. 61, s. 13, those Creditors only will be entitled to oppose the discharge of such Prisoner, at the hearing which will take place in the country, in pursuance of such Order, who appeared to oppose before the Court on the day when such Order was made, or gave notice of opposition for that day, and those upon whom the notices were not duly served for the hearing on that day.
