fon to depart from their former Conclusions; That they were flill of opinion that it was ablolutely neceffary in this conjuncture to establish a firm Peace with the Crown of France, and that they could by no means confent to what was propofed of fending their Resolutions to the Emperor, for the prejudice it might be to their antient Liberty.

Hamburg, May 4. They write from Copenhagen of the firit Inflant, That the King of Denmark intended to part from thence about the 20th for Holflein; and that the Danish Troops are marching to their general Rendezvous. From Zell we have an account, That the Sieut de Haxbaufen was trived there in quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, and that he had had his first Audience of the Duke of Zell; and that the Baion de Welling, Euvoy Extraordinary from the King of Sueden, was parted from thence on his return home.

Hamburg. May 11. The Letters from Copenhagen pive us an account, That the general Rendezvous of the King of Denmark's Troops is to be on the 26 h of this Month on the Cropperbeyde, near Slefwicke: That the King would pait from Copenhagen about the 20th, and interded to be at Giuck stadt the 24th. They work with very great diligence on the new Fortifications they are making at Gluckfindt. From Berin they write, That the Steur Bierman, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, has had feveral private Conferences with th: Elector of Brandenburg's Minillers; That there was à difcourfe that his Electoral Highne's was going to raife more Forces, and that he had ordered his Equipage to be prepared which he ufually takes with him when he gos into the Field. The Sicur Harbussen, the Darifs Envoy, continues at Zell, but we know not what fuccels he has in his Negotiation there. Our Letters from Warfaw inform us, That the King of Poland had declared his refolution of taking a Journey towards Pruffia in July; and that they have begun their new Levies in order to the forming the Army they are to have on Foot in purfuance of the Alliance Concluded between the Emperor and that Crown.

Co ogne, May?. The Bilhop of Strasbourg intends it's faid to go for Alface about the end of this month, to meet his most Christian Majesty at Strasbourg. From Francfort they write, That great Preparations are making at Wirtsbourg for the Interment of the Bilhop of Wirtsbourg and Bamberg.

Paris, May 15. The Marquils de Saignelay, who parted from hence the 24 of the last month for Marfeilles and Thoulon, is come back, and, as we are informed, has given the King an account, that his Fleet of Men of War and Gallies are failed under the command of the Marquits du Quefne. The Marquis de Villars, formerly Ambailador from this Crown in Spain, is preparing for his Embally to Denmark, from whence Monfieur de Mortangis is recalled. Several Troops are marching towards Roufillon to form the Camp which the King intends to have on that fide this Summer; it's faid there will be about 10000 Men. The Officers of Chaftean Trompette, who were imprifoned for fuffering the Marquils de Flamarin, who was lately feized on account of a Duel he was many years agone engaged in, to chape, have again obtained their liberty.

Deal May 8. This day failed out of the Downs the Succels and the Scipio Africanus bound for Surat, rogether with three or four other Merchant Ships outward bound.

Portfmouth May 8. On Sunday last came into this Harbour from the Weltward His Majesty's Ship the Reference.

Windfor, May 6. This Evening at a Chapter of the Moth Noble Order of the Gaster, Thomas Duppa Efq; Firft Gentleman Lither Daily-Waiter to His Majelly, being introduced by the Regifter of the Order, and Gaster Principal King of Arms, and the Letters Patent for Conditioning him Uther of the Black Rod being read, was invelted with the Mantle, Gold-Chain, and Badge belonging to that Office, and had the Black Rod delivered unto him by His Majeffy: After which, having taken the accouft-med Oath, His Majefiy was pleated to confer upon him the Honour of Knighthood.

London, May 8. This day the Lord Chief Juffice Saunders fitting at the Guildbal. after a long Tryal, Thomas Pilkington and Samuel Shute Elquires, late Sherifls of this City, Ford Lord Gray, Henry Cornifin Alderman, Sir Thomas Piayer, Slingsby Bethel, and divers others, were found Guilty of a Ryot and Affault made on fir John Mior, Knight, the late Lord-Mayor, upon Midfummer-day lalt, being the day for Election of Sheriffs and other Officers for this City.
