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Venise, May 1.

**O**N Wednesday last arrived here some of the Servants of the Princes of *Newbourg*, who are now at *Rome*, to prepare a House for them, but the Imperial Ambassador here has let them know, That he expects their Masters will do him the Honour to take an Apartment in his House. The Letters we have from *Rome* do not tell us of the departure of the Bishop of *Fano*, whom the Pope has appointed to go in quality of his *Nuncio* Extraordinary to make his Compliments at the French Court, upon the Birth of the Duke of *Burgundy*; nor do they speak of any likelihood there is of an accommodation of the differences between the two Courts. There are several Solicitors now at *Rome* for the Pope's Bulls for Bishopsricks lately disposed of by the Most Christian King, but hitherto they have not obtained the dispatch of them. The Letters from *Turkey* inform us, That the Grand-Signior was parted from *A-drianople* for *Belgrade*, where he was expected about the beginning of this Month.

*Vienna* May 2. The General Rendezvous of the Imperial Army will be held on Thursday next near *Presbourg*; The Emperor and the Elector of *Bavaria* are gone thither from *Laxemburg*, and it's not to be doubted but there will be a very fine appearance. Here is made publick a List of the Emperor's Forces, according to which, his Imperial Majesty has in his Pay 27 Regiments of Foot, making together 55700 Men, whereof 25296 are at the General Rendezvous, near *Presbourg*; 4692 in upper *Hungary*, 2040 at *Fabluncka* on the Frontier of *Hungary*; 2040 at *Leopolstadt* on the *Wag*, 3640 in *Austria*, 2040 at *Vienna*, 13912 in the Empire, and 2040 in *Bohemia*; 17 Regiments of Horse, making together 13600 Men, seven Regiments of Dragoons, consisting of 5600, and four Regiments of Croats, making 3200, whereof 15200 are at the General Rendezvous, 800 in upper *Hungary*, 400 at *Fabluncka*, 2400 at *Leopolstadt*, 800 in *Austria*, and 2800 in the Empire: So that the General List of Horse and Foot stands thus; at the General Rendezvous, 39696; in the Empire 16712; in upper *Hungary*. 7532, &c. making in all 78540 Men. Besides these there will be the *Hungarian* Troops, under the Command of the Palatine of that Kingdom, thole of *Croatia* commanded by that Viceroy, and Six Thousand Polish Horse, under the Command of the Prince of *Lubomirski*. The whole Army is to be commanded by the Duke of *Lorraine* as *Generalissimus*, who has an absolute Power to act as he shall think fit for the Emperor's Service. This day arrived here Count *Wallenstein*, the

Emperor's Ambassador in *Poland*, to give the Emperor a particular Account of the present state of Affairs on that side. The Count de *Lamberg*, the Emperor's Envoy to the Courts of *Saxony* and *Brandenburg*, is upon his departure, and we are told that he has Orders to make new Proposals to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, in order to the inducing him to enter into Engagements with his Imperial Majesty. The Secretary of Count *Teckley* is still here; he was dispatched by his Master before he knew that the League was concluded between the Emperor and the Crown of *Poland*, and the Errand he was sent hither upon is of so little Importance that no body speaks of it. From *Warsaw* we have advice, That the King of *Poland* has forbid all Commerce and Correspondence between the Poles and the *Hungarian* Rebels.

*Berlin*, May 5. Count *Lamberg*, the Emperor's Envoy, is expected very suddenly here from *Vienna*, our last Letters from thence telling us, That he had received his Dispatches, and was upon his departure. Daily Conferences are held here with Monsieur *Bierman*, the Danish Minister, and it's said he will part from hence very well satisfied, and that his Electoral Highness is resolved to pursue the Measures he has taken for the preserving the Peace of *Germany*; and we are told, That the Sieur *Bierman*, when he has finished his Negotiation here, will return to the Courts of the Princes of *Lunenburg*, which he passed in his way hither, and that his Electoral Highness will likewise send thither the Sieur *Meinders*, in quality of his Envoy Extraordinary. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, That they have begun to raise Men, but that that Crown will not be in a posture to act offensively against the Turks this Summer.

*Hamburg*, May 11. From *Stockholm* they write, That the King of *Sueden*, to avoid giving any jealousy to his Neighbours in this conjuncture, has declared, That he will not at present send any Troops to his Territories in *Germany*; That there has been some disorder among the Bores in *Smaland*; who disowned what their Deputies had done at the late Dyet, and refused to pay the Tax which the King had ordered to be raised in pursuance of an Act of the said Dyet; upon which some Soldiers were sent down, and 10 or 12 of the most turbulent having been seized, all was quiet again: That the King was sending the Sieur *Swanbeilm* in quality of his Envoy Extraordinary for *England*, and that he had Orders to pass through *Holland*, and to confer with the Suedish Minister at the *Hague*. Our Letters from *Copenhagen* give us an account, That the Danish Fleet would in a short time be ready to Sail, That the King of *Denmark* continued his resolution of parting for *Holstein* about the middle of this Month, and that his Troops were in the Mean time Marching to their general Rendezvous. From *Poland* they write, That the Marquis

Marquís de Vetry, the French Ambassador, was preparing to return home; That that King had given out Commissions for the raising of Men; and that he has sent to Count Teckley, to admonish him to make his Peace with the Emperor: **A**

*Hamburg, May 14.* We have Advice from *Leutzler*, That the *Sieur Bierman*, and the *Sieur Meinders*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Denmark* and the Elector of *Brandenburg*, passed through that place yesterday in their Journey to *Zell*. It is said, That the *Sieur Bierman* has finished his Negotiation at *Berlin* to his Satisfaction. The *Sieur Haxhuyser* is passed through this City in his return home from *Zell*, whither he was lately sent by the King of *Denmark*. **O**

*Cologne, May 14.* *Gravel* *Frankfort* have had an account, That at the late Meeting at *Ausburg* a League was concluded between the *Duchies* of the Circle of *Bavaria* and those of *Franconia*; by which these two Circles are obliged to maintain each of them 20000 Men for their common Defence and Security against any Foreign Power; and that endeavours were used to bring the Circle of *Suabia* likewise into this League, but without Success at present. From *S. Radsborg* they write, That the *Baron de Monclar* was parted from thence for *Landaw*, to give the necessary Orders concerning the Camp which is to be held that place this Summer. From *Vienna* they tell us, That the Emperor and the Elector of *Bavaria* were gone to the General Rendezvous in *Burgary*.

*Brussels, May 14.* Yesterday arrived the Spanish Ordinary, which brought the Marquís de *Grana* the King of *Spain's* Approbation of his intended Marriage with *Mademoiselle d'Artemberg*, and this Evening his Excellency will part from hence for *England*. Great Preparations are made on the occasion of this Marriage, as well as that of the Duke of *Aerschot* with his Excellency's Daughter, who is expected at *Marimont* about the middle of this Month. The last Week was executed at *Mons* a Woman who was accused of being a Witch; It's said she confessed; That she had by Witchcraft caused the Death of the Duke of *Aerschot*, late Governor of that City and Province, and that she named several Persons who she said were engaged with her in those Hellish Practices. The Letters from *Germany* tell us, That the Circle of *Suabia* does seem unwilling to enter into the League made between the Emperor and the Circles of *Bavaria*, *Franconia*, and the upper *Rhine*; and that the Imperialists are much concerned for the Death of the Bishop of *Wirsburg*; who did greatly support their Interests.

*Hague, May 18.* The *Sieur Camprich*, the Imperial Resident, has presented another Memorial to the States-General concerning the Affairs of *East-Friesland*, which is put into the hands of the Deputies for Foreign Affairs. The *Heer Van Sommerdyke* has adjusted all matters with the *West-India* Company, and the other interested concerning the Colony of *Surinam*, of which he is to be Governor. The Deputies of the State for Maritime Affairs have frequent Conferences with the Deputies of the Admiralty, concerning the 16 Ships that are now fitting out; These complain that they want Moneys to carry on this Service; That some of the Provinces have not yet consented to this Equipage;

and that the Admiralties of the *Meuse* and of *Amsterdam*, who can best advance it, will not make use of their Credit for others, unless the occasion be very pressing, (as it does not yet appear to be) in which case these two Admiralties alone can in a very short time put these 16 Ships to Sea. From *Bremen* they write, That that City is going to receive a Garrison of the Troops of the Circle of the *Lower Saxony*, for their Security in this conjuncture.

*Paris, May 19.* The French Fleet of Men of War and Gallies Sailed the seventh and eighth Instant from *Marseilles* and *Thoulon*, consisting in near 100 Sail, and it's not doubted but they are gone directly for *Argiers*, and that we shall quickly have some News of them. The Marquís d'*Amfreville*, who has been Cruising, is returned to *Marseilles*, and has brought in with him a Ship belonging to *Genova*; It's said she has on Board her a very considerable Sum of Money. The King's Journey continues fixed for the 26th, or at farthest the 28th of this Month.

*Deal, May 9.* This Morning Sailed out of the Downs his Majesty's Ship the *Constant-Warwick*, to the Westward.
