Dantzick, May 8. He Letters we receive from Poland tell us, That that King intends to go into the Field in Person this Summer. and that the Queen and Prince Allexander, the King's Eldest Son, do raise each a Regiment at their own Charge, and that the King will give 100000 Crowns out of his Patrimonial Estate, towards the providing a Train of Artillery; That the three Regiments of Horse, railed by Prince Lubomirski for the Emperor's Service, are on their March towards the Frontiers of Hungary, to joyn the Imperial Troops commanded by Major-General Schutz, and that besides these, the King of Poland has resolved to raise for the Emperor's Service eight hundred Hussars, who are Armed with Lances. There are Letters which fay, That the Cham of Tartary is in the Field; That he has divided his Army into two Bodies, the one being Posted near Caminiec, and the other deligned to fall into Silefia.

Venice, May 9. The two young Princes of Neubourg are arrived here from Rome, and are Lodged with the Emperor's Ambistador; from hence they intend to return for Germany. The said Ambastador had this Week an Audience of the Senate, to acquaint them with the League lately concluded between his Imperial Majesty and the Crown of

Poland.

Genoua, May 12. The seventh Instant Sailed from hence the Dutch Men of War and Merchant-Ships, in all nine ail, bound for Smirna and Scandaroon. The eighth arrived here the Sarah and Elizabeth from Villa-Franca, and the 10th the Hohn, Captain Tremblet Commander, from Cadiz; the latter met, about 15 Mil s from this Port, with four Algierine Men of War, who have for several days been Cruising on these Coasts, and have taken divers small Vessels. This day we received advice, That the French have taken and carried to Thoulon a great Genouese Ship, which lately

parted from hence for Spain.

Presbourg, May 12. In our last we gave you an account of the Rendezvous of the Imperial Army; Since, the Regiments of the Baron de Berke, and the Baron Richardi, have joyned it, and several Orders torcu other Regiments are said to be marching to it. The ninth a great Council of War was held here, and the rith the Imperial Army Decamped, and Marched from Kerser, by the way of Aitenburg, towards Rash, under the Command of the Duke of Lorrain, (who has an absolute and unlimited powert to act as he thinks sit) the Duke of Saxe-Lawerburg commanding the Right, and the Count de Caprara the Left Wing of the Horse, and the Count de Staremberg being General of the Foot. The same day their Imperial Majesties, the Archdutches, and the Elector of Bavaria, returned from have resolved are making. Vienna, May 13. The Imperial Court is return-

ed from Hungary to Laxemburg where a great Entertainment will be made on Monday next for the Elector of Bavaria. The 11th Instant the Imperial Army Decamped from Keiser, and Marched towards Raab, the Duke of Lorrain having defigned a Camp between that place and Comorra. From Hungary we have advice, That the Grand-Vizier arrived the first Instant, with the main Body of the Ottoman Army, at Greicks-Weissenburg; That the Grand-Signior is not expected there till the 20th; That the general Rendezvous is appointed to be held the 24th of this Month near Belgrade, and that in the mean time the Turks have formed a Camp of 20 or 25000 Men near Newheusel. The advices from Poland give us an account, That that King will be in the Field before the end of the next Month. Count Lamberg, the Emperor's Envoy to the Electors of Brandenburg and Saxony, has received Orders to halten his departure. We are told, That the Emperor will remove the next Month to Prague or Lintz, and thatthe Empress will lye in at one of those places. Count Teckeley's Secretary continues still here.

Ratisbonne, May 17. The Colledge of Electors has not as yet given any Answer to the Paper delivered to them by the Imperial Commissioner the Bishop of Aichstat, concerning the Difference now depending between the said Colledge and that of the Princes. The Letters we receive from Flungary informus, That on the fixth instant the general Rendezvous of the Imperial Army was held within half a mile from Presbourg; That it consisted of 37000 effective Men, well cloathed, and in good order, with a Train of Artislery of 70 Pieces of Cannon; That 4 or 5 Regiments more were on their march to joyn the Army, which will then amount to 40000 fighting Men. That the 11th the Imperial Court parted again from Presbourg, and that the same day the Army decamped, and marched towards Raab. The Letters add, that a Body of 25000 Turks is encamped near Newbeusel.

Hamburg, May 18. The Magistrates of this City have resolved to hasten the new Fortifications they, are making. From Copenbagen they write, that Monsieur Mortangia the French Ambassador has rescived Orders to return home, and that the Marquis de Villars, who was formerly Ambassador in Spain, is appointed by the Most Christian King to succeed him. From Poland they write, That the new Levies are making in that Kingdom with great diligence.

Cologne, May 21. The Bishop of Strasbourg intends to part from hence to morrow for Francfore, and from thence for Strasbourg, where the most Christian King is expected the beginning of the next Month. They write from thence that they are masking a great Way between Before and Hunningen, for which purpose a great many Country People are daily at work.
