

*Brussels, May 28.* On Tuesday last the Marquis de Grana returned hither from *Anwers*, where he had had a Conference with the Prince of *Oranges*. The Duke of *Clair* is come back from *Flanders*, having performed his Commission, which was to appoint the new Magistrates in the several Towns of that Province, very much to his Excellency's satisfaction. The City of *Anwers* has not yet renewed the Impolls upon Wine and Beer; and without their concurrence, the other Towns can conclude nothing in that matter. The Letters from *Madrid* of the 13th Instant give us an account, That the King of *Spain* returned the seventh from *Aranjuez*, very much indisposed, That he had been let Blood, and that he was afterwards much better.

*Brussels, June 1.* On Sunday last w. s. kept the Burgheis Annual Feast; the Magistrates had prayed his Excellency to Honour it with his presence, and had designed a great Entertainment for him, but his Excellency would not let them be at that Charge, but did at his own Expence entertain that day the principal of the Nobility, and other Persons of Quality, together with the Magistrates, at Dinner. The same Evening arrived here his Excellency's Daughter, accompanied with the Countess of *Salazar* and *Soye*, from *Spain*. We have an account that the Marechal d'*Humieres* arrived at *Lille* on Saturday last; and Monsieur *Colbert Mauvevier* the same day at *Tourday*; and that the French intend to have three Camps this Summer, the first near *Bouchain*, the second near *Bincho*, and the third near *Condé*; and upon these Advices the Marquis de *Grana*, as we are told, has commanded all Officers to repair immediately to their respective Garisons, and not to stir from thence without particular leave. We have Letters from *Madrid*, by the way of *France*, which tell us, That the King of *Spain* was recovered of his illness, and was very well again. From *Vienna* they write, That the Duke of *Lorraine* had resolved to attack *Gran*, or some other place, which he doubted not but to make himself Master of before the Turks would be in a posture to oppose him, and that for this purpose several great Cannon for Battery, and four great Mortar Pieces, had been sent from *Vienna* to the Army.

*Hague, June 1.* The Affair of *Surinam* is settled, and Monsieur *Sommerdyk* declared Governour of that Colony, without any dependance upon the *Weylandia* Company; He will part very suddenly, and is to take with him 400 Soldiers. Here is arrived the Sieur *Swanbielm*, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Sueden*; from hence he is to go for *England*. The Sieur *Vander Pecke*, the Elector of *Cologne's* Resident, has presented a Memorial to the States-General, wherein he acquaints them with the League lately concluded at *Sosst*, between the King of *Denmark*, the Elector of *Cologne*, the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the Bishop of *Munster*, for the defence and security of their respective Dominions; assures them of his Electoral Highness's Resolution to maintain the Friendship and good Correspondence established between him and this State, and desires them not to intermeddle in the Affairs of *Liege*, but to withdraw the Troops they have put into the Castle of *Horne*. We have advice, That the Count de *Reye* is arrived at *Hamburg*, in his way to *Denmark*.

*Paris, June 2.* Here have been several reports in Town this Week, concerning the King of *Spain's* illness; The account which the Letters from *Madrid* give thereof is, That that King had been ill for several days, and that his Distemper was turned to a Tertian Ague, which was not looked upon to have any danger in it. We are told, That before the Courts Departure from *Verfailles* a Courier was dispatched with Letters to the Bishop of *Fano*, the Pope's Nuncio, wherein he was desired to remain at *Avignon* till he should hear farther from his Most Christian Majesty, but having made no stay at *Avignon*, he did not meet the Courier till after his arrival at *Lyon*. Monsieur de *St. Roman* is preparing for his Embassy to *Portugal*.

*Windfor, May 24.* His Majesty was this day Graciously pleased (as a farther mark of His Pavour) to Confer the Honour of Knighthood upon Mr. Serjeant *Hoboway*, one of His Majesties Serjeants at Law.
