THE Exchequer Bills dated in the months of July, August, and September 1825, viz. 58 Geo. 3, cap. 45, for building additional churches; 3 Geo. 4, cap. 86, for carrying on public works and fisheries; 6 Geo. 4, cap. 2, £20,000,000, 1825; 6 Geo. 4, cap. 70, £10,500,000, 1825, with the interest due thereon, will be paid off on the 26th day of September next, when the interest will cease. NOTICE TO MARINERS.

NEW LIGHT-HOUSES ON THE SKELLIGS ROCK.

THE Corporation for preserving and improving the port of Dublin, &c. hereby give notice, that two Light-houses have been erected on the Skelligs Rock, on the West Coast of Ireland, and off the County Kerry, which will be lighted on Monday the 4th December next, and will continue from that time to exhibit two steady bright lights every night, from the going away of day-light in the evening to the return of day-light in the morning.

The Skelligs Rock bears by compass from the Western point of Dursey Island, N. W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. distant 19 miles; from the Western point of the Great Blasket Island, S. S. W. distant 16 miles; and from Bolus Head, W. N. W. distant 9 miles.

The Lights are distant from each other 650 feet, and bear one from the other N. by E. and S. by W. and are so placed as to answer as leading lights to vessels sailing either North or South; as by keeping the lights open, a handspike's length from each other, they will give the Foze Rock (which is situated $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles West of the Great Blasket), a birth of 5 miles, and the Bull Rock (which lies $2\frac{3}{4}$ miles N. W. from Dursey Island), a birth of 3 miles.
