Dantzick May 12.

THe Letters from *Warsaw* of the fourth Instant tell us, That the King of *Poland* does very much hasten the preparations for the Campaign; but that it's believ'd he will not have his Forces in a posture to take the Field till the latter end of *July*, or the beginning of *August*. That the Envoy which Count *Teckeley* lately sent to that Court, was dispatched, and that by him the King of *Poland* had again written to Count *Teckeley* to advise him to quit the Engagements he has with the *Turks* (which in the conclusion will turn to his ruine) and to make his Peace with the Emperor. That the Prince de *Lubomirski* had taken his leave of the King, to go and command the 6000 Polish Horse and Dragoons which he has raised for the Emperor's service; That most of the *Palatines* were gone from *Warsaw* to their respective Governments to encourage the new Levies, which are now making in the several Provinces of that Kingdom; and that the Baron de *Cracaw* Ambassador from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, was upon his departure in order to his return home.

Madrid, May 13. The fifth Instant the King of *Spain* found himself somewhat indisposed at *Aranjuez* (where the Court had been for several days) and was thereupon persuaded by his Physicians to leave that place; and accordingly his Majesty returned hither the seventh about ten in the Morning. The next day he was let Blood, and a second time on the 10th, and this morning again, and since his Distemper (which seem'd to be a *Tertian Ague*) has almost left him, and it's hop'd his Majesty will in few days be perfectly well again. Count *Mansfeldt* the Emperor's Ambassador, continues as yet Incognito, expecting the arrival of his Equipage, but that hinders not his receiving the Visits of the principal persons of this Court. Yesterday parted from hence for *Lisbonne*. *don Francisco Ablinas*, this King's Envoy Extraordinary to the Prince Regent of *Portugale* Yesterday likewise the Count d' *Aguilar* began his journey for *Cadix*, to take possession of his Command of General of the Armada; it will consist, as we are told, of 26 six Men of War, and three Fire-ships, and will be in a condition to put to Sea some time the next Month; Five and twenty thousand Pistols have been sent from hence to *Cadix* for this Service, and other sums will be remitted thither to hasten this Equipage, which it's said is chiefly made, to assist the *Genoueses* if there be occasion. We have advice by the way of *Barcelona* that three Algerine Men of War have lately taken the Captain of *Majorca*, a Ship of 42 Guns, on board whereof were several persons of quality, as well of *Sardagna* as *Majorca*, who were going for *Spain*, and

among others the Arch-Bishop of *Cagliari*, (to whom the King of *Spain* had given the Bishoprick of *Astura*) and a Lady of the first quality in *Majorca*, for whose Ransom ten thousand Crowns have been already offer'd by her Relations, but the *Moors* have refused it. At *Cadix* I arriv'd the Vice-Admiral of the *Galleons* which should have come home with the last Fleet, but was forced to stay behind by an accident he met with, together with another ship; Their Lading is said to be worth between 3 and 4 Millions of Pieces of Eight.

Genova, May 14. We are told that the Spanish Resident here has assured this Senate, that the King his Master has sent orders to *Cadix* to hasten out the Fleet, which he has resolv'd to have abroad this Summer for the security of this State. The Soldiers that have been rais'd to serve on board the four new Gallies, are arriv'd here, and the said Gallies will now very suddenly be in a condition to sail. The Senate have sent some money to *Savona*, for the carrying on the new Fortifications they are making there. On Wednesday last arriv'd here an Express in four days from *Paris*, with Letters to Monsieur de *St Olon*, the French Resident here. We are told that the Senate are treating with the Governour of *Milan* for a Regiment of Foot, which they are desirous to have pass into their Service; and instead thereof that Governour will, they say, raise a Regiment of *Suiffers*.

Venice, May 15. On Monday last the Senate received advice by an Express, That the Sieur *Sagredo* Captain of the *Golfe*, had taken near *Ancona*, a Pirate of *Dulcigno* (who had some days before landed near *Sinigaglia*, and carried away several of the Country People) after a very sharp Fight for several hours in which the Sieur *Sagredo* lost several men, and was himself wounded. The Princes of *Newburg* intend to part hence on Monday next for *Germany*. Some *Greeks*, who came hither this Week, inform us that the Fortrels of *Zigets* belonging to the *Turks*, was lately blown up with the great Magazine they had there, and that there was a report that a *Croat*, who had some time before put himself into the Service of the *Turks*, has set fire to the said Magazine, but that the general belief was it happened by Lightning. The Letters from *Rome* of the eighth Instant inform us, That the Bishop of *Fano* had orders to hasten his Journey that he might be at *Paris* before his most Christian Majesty begins his Progress. That the Pope had by an Express received an account from his Nuncio at *Vienna*, of the conclusion of the League between the Emperor and that Crown; and that the said League s to be sworn at *Rome* by Cardinal *Pio* on behalf of the Emperor, and Cardinal *Barbarin* in the name of the King of *Poland*.

Vienna May 23. According to our last Advices from *Hungary* the Imperial Army was encamped at *Silla*, four Leagues from *Graz*, the Duke of *Lor-*

rain being resolved to expect there the great Cannon and other necessaries for a Siege, which were lately sent from hence; He had given orders for the making a Bri'ge over the *Danube* between *Comorra* and *Gran*, and had sent out two Parties of Horse, consisting each in 4000 Men, to learn in what posture the Enemy is. There seems to be a Negotiation on foot for the accommodating matters with Count *Teckley*, which many persuade themselves will have the desired effect, though others are of opinion that Count *Teckley's* design is to gain time, that he may take his measures according to the success of things. The *Electoral of Hungary* having undertaken with the Troops under his Command, to defend the *River Waag*, and the *Viteroy of Croatia* to secure the Frontiers of that Country, the Emperor has resolved to draw out several Troops, that are now in Garisons on that side, to strengthen the Imperial Army. The *Electoral of Bavaria* parted from *Luxemburg* on Thursday, the Emperor accompanying him several Miles on his way, under the pretence of going a hunting; his *Electoral Highness* dined that day with the *Empress Dowager* at her House called *le Favorite*, and having taken his leave of her, went privately to the House of the Count *de Kaunitz*, where he intends to stay *Incognito* a day or two to see the Curiosities of this place, and then to return home by the way of *Moravia* and *Bohemia*. Count *Lamberg* has begun his Journey to *Dresden* and *Berlin*. Count *Leslie* parted on Monday last for *Hungary*, the Emperor having made him General of the Artillery.

Strasburg, May 28. This day the *Queens Regiment* of *Dragoons* marched from hence to the Camp on the *Saar*, and to morrow and the day following the *Battalions* that are appointed to attend the Artillery, will likewise march. Great Endeavours are used to finish the new Fortifications that are making here before the end of *June*, by which time the most Christian King is expected here.

Berlin, May 16. A very fine Train of Artillery is preparing here, and its said his *Electoral Highness* will take the Field about the middle of the next Month. The *Sieur Meinders* whom our *Electoral* lately sent to the *Princes of Lunenburg*, is expected back here in few days.

Brussels, June 4. The *Marquess de Grana* having sent the Count *de Bergeycke* and the *Marquis des Moties* to *Antwerp* to persuade those people to consent to the renewing the *Imposts* upon Wine and Beer for three Years, they are come back, without being able to bring that City to a compliance herein, they being unwilling to depart from their antient custom of granting the said *Imposts* from six Months to six Months. The Letters we receive from *Hamburg* and other places, do assure us, That the *Electoral of Brandenburg* is entred into new Engagements with the *Crown of France*. We are very quiet in these parts, not hearing of the motion of any Troops near us. The Letters from *Vienna* tell us, That the *Duke of Lorrain* was advanced into the *Enemies Country*, and he had resolved to detach a body of men to burn the Bridge of *Effecke*, by which the main Body of the *Turks* is to pass into *Hungary*.

Paris, June 5. Their most Christian Majesties accompanied with the *Duke and Dutchess of Orleans* arrived the 26 of the last month at *Corbeil*, the 27

at *Montereau*, the 28. at *Sens*. the 29. at *Joigny*, and the 30. at *Auxerre*, where they intended to stay the next day. The *Dauphin* parted from *Verfailles* yesterday morning by break of day, and intended to be that night at *Auxerre*, and from thence to continue his journey this morning in order to his meeting the King at *Dijon*. From *Provence* we have advice that the French Fleet Commanded by *Monsieur du Quesne*, which had been forced back to *Toulon* by the bad Weather, sailed again the 18. past. The Letters from *Madrid* tell us, That the King of *Spain* had had several Fits of a *Tertian Ague*, that his Physicians had let him Blood once in the *Artery* twice in the Foot, and that his indisposition was so much abated, that it was hoped a few days would restore him to his former health. At *Cadix* they work with gunnery on the Fleet they are fitting out there, but it is said it will not be ready to sail till towards the end of this Month; It will consist of 20 Men of War, and three Fire-ships, besides the Gallies.

Windsor, May 30. The Count *de Zinzendorf*, Envoy Extraordinary from the *Electoral of Saxony* has had his Audiences of their Majesties and their Royal Highnesses, being conducted thereunto by *Sir Charles Costerel* Master of the Ceremonies, in the usual manner.
