THE Commissioners for paving, lighting, and watching that part of the parish of Clerkenwell called St. James, hereby give notice, that they intend to apply to Parliament in the next session, for an Act to explain, alter, and amend two several Acts of Parliament, the first whereof was made and passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of His late Majesty George the Third, and is intituled "An Act for paving, repairing, lighting, and watching the streets, and other public passages and places within that part of the parish of Clerkenwell called St. James, and removing obstructions and annoyances therein; for widening the passage from Clerkenwell-green to the parish church, and for watching and lighting certain highways within the said parish;" and the second of which said two several Acts of Parliament was made and passed in the seventeenth year of the reign of His said late Majesty, and is intituled "An Act to explain and amend an Act, made in the fourteenth year of the reign of His present Majesty (thereby meaning His said late Majesty George the Third, intituled 'An Act for paving, repairing, lighting,
