Veffel arriving here from Scotland, confirms to us the recovery of the Convertine from the Dutch, and that the Scots Privateers have this laft week brought up into Leith-Road four confiderable Diizes.

Falmouth, Aug. 12. The 7th Inftant we were informed of the Landing of 300 of the Dutch upon St Agnes Iflar d's near Scilly, from whence they carryed off fome theep, cattle and onies. Several Boats they feat into the Mouth fthe Harbor to found it, two of which were prefently difabled by fhot from the Caftle , afier which they fent in four great fhips on the same errand, who with much difficulty got off again, but made no attempt to land, the posture of the place, with the great readinels of the Governor and fouldiers, discouraging hat defign if they had any fuch.

On Friday morning happened a great florm, the wind at South Waft, which cleared that Illand of those unwe come Guefts : that evening were feen about 16 fall coming off the Manacles, which we int poled to be part of their Fleet lepera-nd by the weather, Randing off at Sea to the Baftward.

On Saturday about four of the clock appeared 20 fail more toming from the Weft, Randing to the Raft, the wind at North Weft, after whom at some diffance, came a Veffel close p to the shore, which proved an English ship of 22 Guns, colled The Summer-Illand Merchant, from Bermudas, laden with Tobacco and Oyl; two of the Dutch Fleet discovering her, gave her chace for fome time, but the night coming on, they flood off again to \$:5, and the ship is now lasely arrived in

On Sunday about one of the Clock in the afternoon, a great Fleet appeared off the Manacles, and fome few others came in with them from the East, in all about 40 fail, all which food off together at Ses, the wind at North Well; about an bour after, a great fhip of that company took fire, which conthued burning at the leaft three hours, at the diffsnce of five or fix leagues from the fhore 3 a fmall veffel a little before this accident, paffing by, faluted her with three Guns, which fie inferred with one, which makes us conclude her to have been a Flag-fhip ; whilf the burnt, a fmall veffel comming up nes her (as we suppose) took in her men, and went off to the rest of the Fleet, which about five of the clock drew nigh together, and that night (as we guess) Rood away to the West.

This Munday morning about feven of the clock, we discovered a Fleet of about 35 fail of small ships comming close in-to the Bay with English Colcurs, which we guess to be part of the Virginia Fleer.

Dartmouth, Aug. 13. This Evening appeared in view of this place about 55 fail of the Durch Fleet, which ab ut Sun-let turned into Torbay, where we suppose they intend to continue at anchor this night : Upon their appearance fix C mpanies were drawn out of this Town in view of them, whereupon their Admiral put out a white Flag on his Main Top-maft head.

Hull, Aug. 14. On Monday Isft was brought into Humber a prize taken on the Coaft of Holland by one of his Ma-jesties ships, being a French Vessel of 200 Tuns, seven Guns, and 40 men, laden with Oyl, and bound from Greenland for

The other prize, called the Stadthouse of Harlem, a Durch Min of War of 46 Guns, and 240 men, is brought pinto Humber, having in the fight loft 18 of her men, with her Caprain and Lieutenant 5 molt of the men are French.
