firous, that the quarrel rifen betwirt the two Crowns might be determined any other way then by that of Armes, which is alio earneftly endeavoured by the States of the Empire. In the mean time the Spanish Ambaffactor at Vienna preffes hard for fatisfaction to be given to the Deputies from Burgundy, by fending forces thicher for its fecurity, as being a M:mber, and confequently requiring the care and affiftance of the Empire.

Count Mansfield is lately gone by Order frem his Imper!al Maj: fty to his Highness the Elector of Brandenburg , to treat with him about some private affairs of great importance. The defign for the N:w Levies in the Emperours Dominions advances, and some confiderable sums of moneys are already given out for their encouragement, 'tis not yet publick-ly fald to whom the Command of those Forces shall be given, though some talk there i', that the Elector of Brandenburg is defigned for that employment, who has already 1 2000 men in Armes , befides the forces that are on foot in the Circle of Lower Saxony.

The Government of Brifgow is lately conferred on the Marquels of Baden, who is daily expected acthe Imperial

Court, and from thence to return to his charge.

The Cardinal of Saltzburg has by the Count Ferdinand de Herberftein, and the Chancellour of Ratisbonne, demended the Invefti ure of his Bishoprick of Ratisbonne, which was accordingly performed the 27th past to his fatilfaction.

The French are not a little jealous leaft fome Alliance be privately endeavoured at between the Emperour and King of sweden, which latter, 'tis faid, has fome inclination to hearken to a Match with the Eldeft of the Imperial P.inceffet, whole Picture, with the other Princels her Sifer, are both drawing, by the hand of an excellent Painter, to be fent into Swedeland.

The Flanders Male not arriving this week according to expectation by reason of the late ill weather, we have but little account of the Affairs in those or the Neighbouring Countries, only by a Letter accidentally brought us, we have this account,

Bruges, Aug. 7. The French lye fill before Lille, and by the affiftance of the Country people commanded in, the Lines about the Town, aswell as the Contrevalistions are Buss and Mortars, though as yet with little damage. The Garrifon and Town are full of Courage to defend ir, and feem mot to be at all moved by all the threats of their Enemies.

Some few daies fince (we are told) the King of France fent into the Town demanding the release of a prisoner of fome Quality that was fallen into their hands, and in cafe of refulal, threatning them with the firing of all the houses round about the Town; which meffage being delivered to the Governour the Count de Brouay, he is faid to have made this efolute answer, That if any one house about the Town were

fet on fire, the prisoner should be roasted on the Rampart.

About two dales since the besieged with a considerable body
of men made a fout fally out of the Town, which succeeded fo prosperously to them, that they are reported to have killed neer 2000 men, and nailed up leven pieces of Ganon, making their retreat with little loss, the confirmation whereof, with the perilculars, we muft expett bereafter.

The Spanish Army is drawing together neer Ghent, where there is like to be a Rendezvous of sheir whole force, and in little time may probably make some attempt for the relief and secour of the Town, and disturbance of the Enemy.

Plymouth, Aug. 13. The Virginia Fleet is by an happy and leafonable providence fafely arrived, and though the enemies Fleet lay divided to intercept them upon these Seas, not any of them fell into their hands. Of this Fleet, fix are safely come into this Harbor, 30 put into Fey, and 23 more gone with Convoy lato Sr. Georges Channel, bound for Briftol, and fome other places on the Severne, where we believe they are by this in lafety.

Before their fetting our, the Elizabeth Fregat which lay ain Fames River to Rop her lesks, and to repair her Mafts and Rigging, much damaged by ill weather at Sea, was ai h fome Merchant men that lay there by her, unfortunately furprized by four Dutch Men of War, whereof two of 36 Guns a piece, one of 4, and the other of 18, with two Firefhips, who having made their escape from Newis after the late Vi-Gory obtained by ten of the E glifh, over them and 16 French ships, wherein they loft many men, came away for Virginia, where accidentally lighting on a small vessel comming out of the River fames, they ex orted from the men they tock, an account of the condition of the Elizabeth, and the number and pofture of the Merchants, which excou aging them, they iqstantly resolved on action, and putting up English Colours, with the advantage of fome Renegadoes they had aboutd them, they paffed undifcovered by the Merchanis, and comming up with the Elizabeth, gave and received a Salute, but fuddenly ofter paffing two Brose files into her, and finding but few men in her to make refiftance (the greatest part of them with the Officers, being employed at land to provide neceffaries) they prefently made themleives mafters of her, but fhe proving altogether unfit to put to Sea, they were forced afterwards to fer fire to her with all her Guns and Ammunicion.

The Richard and Francis ot London, Robert Conway Captain, made a very ftout and valiant refiftance, and infereral boardings bear off the Dutch with great flughter, and had he been well seconded, might in probability have stuftrated their attempt, but the Captain being dangerously hurt, and many of his men killed and wounded, he was forced to yield with a dozen other veffels, four more being also burnt in the

Briftol, Aug. 14. This day arrived here 15 fail, meft of them great fhips well fraught, from Virginia and Bermudas, the rest of their company being likewife lafely put into

their respective Ports.
Dover, Aug. 24. The storms have been lately so very great here, efpecially the laft night, that had it continued another Tyde, might have done much damage both to this Town and Harbor , the Flanders Pacquet is faid to be by the late winds driven into the Downs, fince which we have heard no fur ther news of it; three of the Dutch thips lye off the Northforeland, and on Munday laft 15 of them were riding before Margate, but did no more hure then only by the taking up fom

few Stawkers or Nets laid for Lobflers.
Harwich, Aug. 17. Yefterday the Dutch Squadron were discovered keeping their old fation , where they are also this morning, and have not of late attempted any thing. The new rais'd Tre ps and Companies are here, as well as in other places of the Kingdome, disbanding. Yefterday the three Com-panies of Sir fo. Sayers Regiment having first Multered, were afterwards without their Armes returned to their Quitters, from whence upon receipt of their pay they are to be difmift; the like method was followed by the Earl of Sunderland, and Si Richard Ingoldsbyes Troops of Horle.

Alborough, Aug 17 The Dutch Men of War continue fill in this Bay, but with little reft thele four or five dies past, by resion of the great roughness of the Sess : Only two small Hoyes have of late appeared before this place, and those English, passing unmoleked from the Northwards.
