

Christian Majesty to the King of Denmark, is passed through this place in his way to Hamburg; he had a Conference with the Count d'Auxaux, who came from the Hague to meet him here. The Letters from Cologne gave us an account of a great Commotion in that City, the Commonalty being in Arms, and having possessed themselves of the Gates, the Town-house, and the Magazine, imprisoned several Persons, and committed other Violences.

Hague, June 8. This Week arrived here the Heer Van Dieft, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg. The Heer Van Sommerdyke is preparing for his Voyage to Surinam, which he purposes to begin about the middle of the next Month. On Wednesday last arrived at Amsterdam the Marquis de Villars, in his way to Denmark, whither he goes as Ambassador Extraordinary from the Most Christian King, and the same day the Count d'Auxaux, the French Ambassador here, went from hence to meet him at Amsterdam. The Deputies of the States, for that purpose appointed, are gone to visit the Fortifications, Magazines, and Garisons of the Frontier places.

Paris, June 9. We have an account of the Courts arrival at Dijon, and that the King intended to part from thence on Monday last to the Camp on the Soane. They write from Provence, That the Gallies which had been forced by the bad Weather to put into Port again, have ever since been detained there by the contrary Winds. On Wednesday last the Doctors of the Sorbonne presented to the Parliament their Answer to the Proposition they some time ago received from them, by which they condemn the Censure the Arc bishop of Gran in Hungary lately Published of the Propositions of the Clergy of this Kingdom in their last Assembly. This Week a Quarrel happened here between several young Gentlemen, they fought six against six, four of them were killed upon the place, and five Wounded. It is said, That when the Court is in Alsace the Dutchels of Orleans will take that opportunity to make her Brother the Elector Palatine a Visit.

Exeter, May 24. The eighth Instant his Grace the Duke of Albemarle, our Lord-Lieutenant, arrived at Torjham, and was received at his Landing, and conducted thither, by the most eminent Gentry of these parts. Here his Grace was received by the Artillery and the Militia, with Ringing of Bells, Firing of Guns, and other publick Expressions of Respect; and at the Town-Hall was welcomed by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council, and accompanied by them to his Lodging at the Deans House, where he received the Compliments of the Lord Bishop of the Diocess, the Dean and Chapter, &c. The next day his Grace gave out his Orders for a General Muster of the Militia of Devon, to be held the 22 of this Month upon Haldon, till which time his Grace continued here, the Town being all that while filled with the Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and the considerable Gentlemen of the County, whom his Grace entertained very splendidly during his whole stay here; Inviting likewise the Bishop and all his Clergy, the Mayor, Aldermen, the Officers of the Artillery, &c. to Dinner on several days, and was again very No-

bly entertained by them, as likewise by Sir Coppleston Bampfie.d, Sir Hugh Achland, and Henry Norleigh Esq; at their several Houses near this place. On the 22 was held the General Muster of all the Militia of the County, (being the first time of their being together so intirely in one Body since his Grace's being Lord-Lieutenant) which consisted of six Regiments of Foot, and three Troops of Horse: They made a very brave appearance, and his Grace took a particular view of them, and was extremely pleased with them; after which he was very nobly Entertained by Sir Coppleston Bampfie.d in a stately Tent. There were on this occasion at least 30000 People in the Field, who in their repeated Shouts expressed their Loyal Affections to His Majesty and the Royal Family, and their great Respect for their Lord-Lieutenant; and most of the Officers of the Militia, and the Gentry, accompanied his Grace to the place where he again Embarked.

Deale, May 30. Yesterday arrived in the Downs his Grace the Duke of Albemarle, in the Henrietta Yacht attended by the Kirchin Yacht, from the Westward: His Grace made no stay in the Down, but presently sailed again for the River.

Falmouth, May 30. Yesterday arrived here His Majesties Ship the Henrietta, Commanded by Sir John Barry, from the Streights.
