Constantinople, April 13.

**T**he Grand Signior parted from *Adriano* the first of this Month, intending to make his Journey from thence to *Belgrade* in 43 days. The Aga of the Janizaries begun his March some days before, and took with him the Count de *Caprara*, the Imperial Minister, whom they continue to Guard very strictly. The Deputies of *Argiers* are still here; they were sent hither to pray the assistance of the Port against the French, but we do not hear they have obtained any.

*Madrid, May 27.* The King of *Spain* is perfectly recovered of his late illness, and the 21 his Majesty appeared in publick, and received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, the Nobility, and other principal Persons of the Court, and on the second of the next Month a great Bull Feast is appointed, to express a publick Joy for his Majesty's recovery. The Queen-Mother, who came hither from *Buen Retiro* upon the first Notice she had of his Majesty's Indisposition, continues still here. The King has made the Prince of *Montesarchio* Captain General of the Forces of *Castile*, the Marquis de *la Granja*, General of the Gallies of *Naples*, Don *Beltran de Guevara*, General of the Gallies of *Sicily*, and Don *Inigo de Toledo* General of those of *Sardinia*. The Count d'*Aquilar*, General of the Armada, and the Count de *Herman*, Nunez General of the Artillery of the Fleet, are both parted from hence in great diligence for *Cadiz*, to hasten the Equipage.

*Genoa, June 2.* This Week sailed from hence the *Loyal Goring* and the *Merchants Delight* for *Leighorn* and the *Levant*; and the *Sarah* and *Elizabeth* for *Cadiz*, and two days ago arrived the *Britain* in 24 days from *Majorca*, having ten days since met with the French Fleet, consisting of 32 Ships, great and small, (the Gallies not being with them) bound for *Argiers*: The Weather seems favourable, so that there is great expectation of what they will do there.

*Copenhagen, May 26.* The King of *Denmark*, as we are told, will part from hence the beginning of the next Month for *Holstein*, and the general Rendezvous of his Army will be held the 15th on the *Crooperbeyde*. The Danish Fleet will be ready to sail very suddenly.

*Vienna, May 30.* The Imperial Army Decamped the 25th Instant, the Duke of *Lorraine* intending to march to *Graz* in two days, and to set down before that place, which, as some Letters say, they would begin to Batter this day; It is reported, That there are 8000 Men in Garrison; That the Turks have burnt the Suburbs, and are preparing for a resolute defence, which, if it be true, will, as many believe, change the Duke of *Lorraine's* design, that he may not engage his Army in a diffi-

cult Siege at the opening of the Campaign. We have advice, That 800 Turkish Horse having advanced very near the Imperial Army, to learn what News they could of it, the Duke of *Lorraine*, upon notice thereof, sent out a Party, who charged the Turks. Routed them, and took several of them Prisoners. We have not as yet any certain account whether the Grand Vizier is marched with the main Body of the Ottoman Army from *Belgrade*, but it is confidently reported, That he has detached 20 or 30000 Men to joyn the Troops under the Command of the Vizier of *Buda*. In the mean time the Imperial Army is daily reinforced, and the Duke of *Croy* will in few days joyn it with 2000 Foot which he has newly raised. Count *Teckelej* does as yet keep the Truce; he assembles his Troops together near *Tockay*, and as we are told refuses to joyn with the Turks, who have sent him several Summons for that purpose, which makes us hope he has a mind to make his Peace with the Emperor. By an Express arrived yesterday from *Poland* we have advice, That the Prince of *Lubomirski* was on his March to joyn the Imperial Troops commanded by Major General *Schiltz*; That the King of *Poland* is hastening his Preparations for the Campaign, and that he will be in the Field before the end of the next Month, with 24000 Men. Several Sums of Money have been sent from hence to the Viceroy of *Croatia*, to enable him to bring the Troops he is raising into the Field. The Elector of *Bavaria* parted from hence the 28th Instant, on his return home, having been the day before privately at *Luxemburg*, to take his leave of the Emperor. His Electoral Highness is to command in chief the Army of the Empire designed for the Guard of the *Rhine*.

*Strasbourg, June 4.* Several Troops that were in Garrison here, to the number of 5000 Men, are marched to the Camp at *Landau*, whither the Baron de *Monclar*, the Kings Lieutenant-General in *Alsace*, parted yesterday from hence. We work here with great Diligence on the Fortifications, being desirous to have them finished against the King arrives in these parts.

*Cologne, June 8.* The Commonalty continues in Arms, and one *Gulich*, a man of a turbulent Spirit, pretends to be their Chief, and to order all things in their name; he gives Audiences, and examines the Consuls, Sindics, and other Officers of the City (whom he obliges to stand bareheaded before him) concerning several Facts which they are charged with, and what the issue of this popular Commotion may be, none can say. The Deputies of the Elector of *Trier* and the Duke of *Neubourg*, who came hither by the Emperors appointment to endeavour an accommodation between the Magistrates and the Burghers, seeing no likelihood of their performing their Commission in the confusion things are at present in, are gone home again. The Bishop of *Strasbourg*, who it was believed

believed was gone for *Alsace*, returned hither very unexpected on Saturday last.

*Hamburg, June 8.* We have not as yet any advice of the King of *Denmark's* departure from *Copenhagen*, but from *Gluckstadt* they give an account of the preparations they are making against the Courts arrival there. From *Lunenbourg* they write, That the Duke of *Zell* had Countermanded the Orders he had given for the March of his Troops, and that an Imperial Envoy was arrived at *Zell*. From *Sweden* they tell us, That their Fleet was appointed to Rendezvous at *Carelsroon*, but that they would not go to Sea this summer unless there was a very great occasion for it. The Letters from *Warsaw* say, That the new Levies are made with so great diligence and application that it's not doubted but the Troops they are raising will be compleat by the end of this Month, and that the Prince *de Lubomirski* was on his March, with the 6000 Men he has raised for the Emperor's Service, for *Hungary*, to joyn Major General *Schutz*, who expects him on the Frontiers.

*Brussels June 8.* The States of *Flanders* are assembled at *Gaunt*, and his Excellency has sent the Duke *de Havre* to make the demand of the next Years Subsidies, which it's hoped they will readily agree to. His Excellency has resolved to Encamp his Cavalry at *Peiton*, and the Orders are given out for that purpose. The Letters from *Vienna* which we received yesterday, say, That the Imperial Army was Encamped three Leagues from *Graz*, and that the Duke of *Lorraine* seemed resolved to attack that place, and for that purpose was making a Bridge over the *Danube*. The Affairs of *Cologne* are in the greatest disorder and confusion imaginable, the Commonalty having been in Arms for several days, and Imprisoned some of the Magistrates and others.

*Brussels, June 11.* The Cavalry and Dragoons which his Excellency has ordered to Encamp at *Peiton*, are on their March, and they will be there on Monday next. His Excellency will go and view the Camp a day or two after, and having done it, without making any stay there, will return hither. The Prince of *Orange* designs likewise, as we are informed, to have a Camp near *Maefricht*.

*Hague, June 11.* To compose the Squadron which the States-General have resolved to have abroad this Summer, nine Ships are fitting out at *Amsterdam*, six at *Rotterdam*, four in *Zealand*, four in *North-bolland*, and two in *Frizeland*, and we are told, That they will in a very short time be in a readines to Sail, especially those of this Province. It was reported, That Lieutenant-Admiral *Tromp* was to command them, but now it is said, That this Commission will be given to the Count *de Stirum*. The Deputies that have been sent to visit the Frontier places of this State do take a very strict account of the Garisons, and it's said that the Captains whose Companies are not compleat will be Cashiered. Here is arrived Count *Carleson* from *Sweden*.

*Paris, June 12.* We told you in our last, That the Court arrived at *Auxerre* the 30th past; Their Majesties continued there the 31 and the first of this Month; The next day they parted from thence and lay at *Noyers*, the third at *Monbar*, the fourth at *Chanceau*, and the fifth they arrived at *Dijon*,

the Dauphin, who parted from *Versailles* the 4th, having joyned their Majesties two Miles on this side the place, where they Dined that day. The sixth, being *Whitsunday*, the Court remained at *Dijon*; the seventh they parted again to *St. Jean de Laune*, intending to go from thence to *Bellegarde*, and so to the Camp on the *Soane*.

*Edenburg, May 9.* This being the Anniversary of His Majesties Birth and happy Restauration, was observed here with much solemnity. There were Sermons Preached in all the Churches, suitable to the occasion; and 53 old Men, all in new blew Gowns, (to each of which was given 53 s.) went from the Abbey to the great Church, Praying for His Majesties Health and long and happy Reign. About four in the Afternoon my Lord Provost, the Bailiffs, and Council, went in their formalities to the Council-Chamber, from whence they accompanied the Lord High Chancellor, the Lords of the Council, and the Nobility, to the Cross, where was Erected a large Theatre, adorned with rich Tapestry, upon which was placed a Table covered with a very noble Banquet, under an artificial Grove of Trees, Laden with Lemons and Oranges. The Lord Chancellor, the Nobility, the Magistrates, &c. having Drank their Majesties and their Royal Highnesses Healths, they caused the Oranges and Lemons, with variety of Sweetmeats, to be distributed among the People, the Cross running all the while Wine at eight several Condoits, and the great Guns from the Castle being several times discharged, amidst the Vollics of the Trained-Bands, and the repeated acclamations of the People and the Night concluding with Bonfires, Ringing of Bells, and other publick Expressions of Joy, becoming the day.
