THE Remains of His late Royal Highness Frederick Duke of York and of Albany lay in state in the Royal Apartments in St. James's-Palace, attended by an Equerry and two of the Aides-de-Camp of His late Royal Highness, two Heralds of Arms, two of His Majesty's Gentlemen Ushers, two Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber, ten of the Honourable Band of Gentlemen Pensioners, with two of their Officers, and by a party of the Grenadier Regiment of Guards, during Thursday the 18th and Friday the 19th instant. The Body, covered with a black velvet Pall, adorned with Escocheons of the Arms of His late Royal Highness, and the Coronet and Field-Marshal's Baton of His late Royal Highness laid thereon, was placed upon a platform, under a Canopy of black cloth, also adorned with Escocheons. At the head of the Corpse were seated the Equerry and the Aides-de-Camp, and the Heralds stood at the feet. On each side of the Body stood the Gentlemen Ushers and Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber, and between them and the Grenadiers, who lined each side of the platform, bearing their muskets reversed, stood three of the Band of Gentlemen Pensioners supporting Banners.

The State Apartment was hung with black cloth, and the Rooms adjoining were also hung with black cloth, and lined by Yeomen of the Guard.

The Public were admitted to the State Apartment from eleven until four o'clock on each day.

On Saturday morning the 20th instant, at eight o'clock precisely, the Procession having been formed, the Remains of His late Royal Highness were removed from St. James's-Palace, escorted by a Field-Officer's Guard, consisting of one hundred and twenty men of the 2d Regiment of Life Guards, with a Standard, and moved in the following order:

Trumpets and Kettle Drums of the two Regiments of Life Guards, and the Drums and Fifes of the Foot Guards.

Knight-Marshal's Men on foot with black staves.

A mourning coach drawn by four horses, conveying the Servants of His late Royal Highness.

At Cranford-bridge (where the Procession arrived at one o'clock and halted for two hours) the first Escort was relieved by a similar Guard of the 1st Regiment of Life Guards, the previous Escort having fallen into the rear and formed the Rear Guard.

Upon arrival at Frogmore, the Procession was joined by the Servants and Grooms of His Majesty and of the Royal Family, in deep mourning, on foot, each bearing a flambeau, and by the Trumpets and Kettle Drums, Drums and Fifes of the Royal Household, also on foot.

The whole Procession, through Windsor to the Castle-gate, was flanked by the Life Guards and Infantry of the Line, every sixth man bearing a flambeau; and the approach from the Castle-gate to the entrance of St. George's Chapel was lined by a Battalion of the Grenadier Guards.

Upon arrival at the South Porch of St. George's Chapel, the Servants and Grooms, the Trumpets and Drums filed off. The Body was then removed from the Hearse, and carried by ten Yeomen of the Guard into the Chapel.

At the entrance the Dean and Canons, attended by the Choir, received the Body, and the Procession (which had been previously formed), being flanked by the Grenadiers of the Foot Guards and a Detachment of the Royal Regiment of Horse Guards (Blue), every fourth man bearing a flambeau, moved down the South Aisle and up the Nave, into the Choir, in the following order:

Followed by a numerous assemblage of Peers, Privy Councillors, Baronets, General Officers, and other persons of distinction, who had signified their anxious desire to attend.

Upon the arrival within the Choir, the Body was placed upon a Platform, and the Coronet, Baton, and Cushions laid thereon.

The Chief Mourner sat on a Chair at the Head of the Corpse, and the Supporters stood on each side.

The Princes of the Blood Royal were seated near the Chief Mourner.

The Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household took his place at the Feet of the Corpse; and the Supporters of the Pall, and of the Canopy, were arranged on each side of the Body: The Assistant Mourners, the Executors of His late Royal Highness, and the Trainbearers, stood behind the Princes of the Blood Royal; and the Colonels, who carried the Banners, on each side below the Altar.

The Great Officers of State, His Majesty's Ministers, the Nobility, the Archbishop of York, the Bishops, Privy Councillors, Judges, and Law Officers, were placed in the Stalls of the Knights of the Garter. The Grooms of the Bed-Chamber to the King, the Equerries, Aides-de-Camp, and those who walked immediately before the Law Officers, as well as the General Officers and other persons of distinction who followed His Majesty's Ministers, occupied the remaining Seats below the Stalls of the Knights of the Garter on each side of the Choir: and those who walked before the Equerries, were arranged on each side of the Altar.

The Part of the Service before the Interment, and the Anthem, being performed, the Body was deposited in the Royal Vault; and the Service being concluded, Sir George Nayler, Knt. Garter, Principal King of Arms, pronounced, near the Grave, the Styles of His late Royal Highness, as follows:

" THUS it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory life, unto His Divine Mercy, the late Most High, Most Mighty, and Illustrious Prince, FREDERICK DUKE OF YORK and OF ALBANY, EARL OF ULSTER; Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, First and Principal Knight-Grand-Cross of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, Knight-Grand-Cross of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, and next Brother of the Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch GEORGE THE FOURTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, King of Hanover, and Duke of Brunswick and Lunenburg; whom God bless and preserve with long life, health and honour, and all worldly happiness."

After which His Royal Highness the Chief Mourner, His Royal Highness the Duke of Sussex, His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, the Great Officers of State, Nobility, and others who had composed the Procession retired:

All Persons who assisted at the Interment appeared in full-dress-Black, and the Knights of the several Orders wore their respective Collars.
