

bility here, and particularly by the Duke of *Havre*, who accompanied his Lordship as far as *Vil-ward*. The Prince of *Vaudemont* is gone to the Camp at *Pieton*, where the Cavalry and Dragoons will arrive as this day. The States of *Flanders* have not taken any Resolution upon the Demand made unto them by his Excellency of the next years Subsidies: This Week the Duke de *Havre* goes to *Mons*, to make the like Demand to the States of *Hainault*, who are now assembled there. We hear nothing as yet of any motion of the French Troops.

Brussels, June 19. This day *Saxedo's* Regiment of Dragoons marched from hence to the Camp at *Pieton*: His Excellency's Guards, who were also ordered to march thither, are commanded to stay here till his Excellency's departure, which, as is said, will be on Sunday next. His Excellency intends to pass through *Mons*, and adjust the next Years Subsidies with the States of *Hainault*, and after having stay'd two or three days at the Camp, to return hither about the end of the Week. The Letters from *Vienna* say, That the Duke of *Lorraine*, after having view'd in Person the City of *Gran*, and observed 15000 Turks to be Intrenched upon the CounterCarps, was returned to the Camp near *Comorra*, from whence he had sent a great Detachment to invest *Newheusel*, upon the advice he received, That the *Bassa* of that place was abroad with a considerable part of that Garrison, which gave him great hopes of being soon Master of it. Yesterday a great Council of War was held at the Palace, at which Don *Balibazar de Fuen Mayor* the Spanish Minister at the *Hague*, assisted. The Letters from the Frontiers say, That the French Troops in *Luxembourg* and the County of *Chimay* increase daily.

Ghent, June 20. The Regiments of *Perez* and *Vander Pict*, consisting of 450 Dragoons, are marched from *Aeth* to the Camp at *Pieton*, whither the Prince de *Rasche*, our *Majstre de Camp* General, has caused a great quantity of Straw and other Provisions to be sent for the use of the Soldiers.

Hague, June 17. Yesterday the Prince of *Orange* returned hither from *Amsterdam*, whither he went to hasten the Ships that are fitting out by the Admiralty of *North-holland*, as well as to visit those of *Amsterdam* which have already passed the *Pampus*. The Heer *Van Somersbeck* having adjusted all matters with the *East-India* Company of these Provinces, will part the next Month for *Surinam*, of which place he is appointed Governor. The Pensioner *Fagel* is gone to his house at *Leuwenborst*, for the further Confirmation of his Health. The States-General have sent two of their Deputies to visit the Garrison and Fortifications of *Moesstricht*. Yesterday Prince *Cassimir* of *Nassau* arrived here from *Frizeland*.

Marseilles, June 9. We have advice by a Bark arriv'd here from *Alicant*, That the Chevalier de *Lery* has lately taken a Vessel of *Algiers*, mounted with 18 Guns and 150 Men, amongst which were several Captives, whom he immediately caused to be set at Liberty. The Marquis *d'Amfreville* has sunk a Vessel belonging to those Corsairs, and retaken another Laden with Marble, which they were carrying to *Argiers*, where we are told the *Sieur de Septemme* is arriv'd with five Men of War: The Letters add, That the Plague was again broke

out there, and that there being a great want of Provisions in the place, very many of the Inhabitants were retired with their Goods and Families into the Country. We have advice from *Barcelona*, That Monsieur *du Quefne* was lately seen with the Ships under his Command in those Seas, continuing his Course for *Argiers*.

Paris, June 19. The 7 Infant their Most Christian Majesties arriv'd at *Bellegarde* from *Dijon* and presently after the King mounted on Horseback and went to view the Camp upon the *Soane*, where he found the Dauphin as General at the Head of the Troops, which consisted in 11500 Men. The eighth his Majesty went again to the Camp, as he did likewise the 9th and 10th, and took a review of each particular Company. The same day the Marquis *Dogliani*, Captain of the Duke of *Savoy's* Guards, had his Audience, being sent by that Duke to Compliment their most Christian Majesties upon their arrival in these parts. The 15th Instant the Court intended to remove from *Bellegarde*, to lodge that night at *Dole*, and to be the next day at *Bezancon*.

Westminster, June 12. This day the Court of *Kings Bench* unanimously gave Judgment for the King upon the *Quo Warranto* against the City of *London*, That the Franchises and Liberties of the said City be seized into the King's hands.
