Dantzick, June 3.

Our Letters from *Warsaw* tell us, That the 28th past the Marquis *de Vitry*, Ambassador from the Most Christian King, had his Audience of Leave of the King and Senate of *Poland*, in order to his return home; That the Cham of *Tartary* had sent an Envoy to the King of *Poland* to inform him of his arrival at *Fasse*, the Capital City of *Walachia*, and that he was continuing his March towards *Hungary*, with a very considerable Body of Horse, in order to joyn the Troops of the Grand-Vizier at *Belgrade*. The same Letters add, That the Imperial Minister at *Warsaw* had received Bills of Exchange for One hundred thousand Ducats which are to be paid unto the King of *Poland*, in consideration of the Forces he is obliged to send into the Emperor's Service, in pursuance of the Treaty concluded between them; That the Preparations for the War are carried on with all possible diligence and vigor, and it is not doubted but the King of *Poland* will take the Field with his Army about the latter end of this Month.

Comorra, June 4. The 2 Instant 3 Regiments of Imperial Dragons and a considerable Party of Horse passed the *Danube* and the *Wuag*, and yesterday morning invested *Newheusel*, and took a great number of Cattel in the adjacent Fields, which the Turks had left feeding there, believing that the Imperialists were employed in the Siege of *Gran*, whither the Bassa of *Newheusel*, upon the first notice he had of the Duke of *Lorraine's* turning that way, had sent a considerable quantity of Ammunition, under a Convoy of 800 Horse. This day the rest of the Infantry marched towards *Newheusel*, whither the great Cannon, which is to be employed on the Batteries, will be sent to-morrow.

From the Imperial Camp before Newheusel, June 8. The Duke of *Lorraine* being arrived the 4th Instant before this place, commanded 1000 Men to attack an out-Fort, which they accordingly did that Afternoon, and took it. Yesterday we took the lower Town, a great part whereof the Vice-Bassa has burnt, and is retired into the chief Fortrefs, where he is preparing for a Vigorous defence. We lost in the first action 20 Men, and amongst them the Count *de Tassis*, brother to the Prince *de la Tour*, who was killed by a Janizary. This Evening we shall have three Batteries ready to play upon the Fortrefs, and hope to be Masters of the Counterscarp as this day. Our Army is Posted on both sides of the River of *Neutra*. Yesterday being Whit-Sunday we began to throw our Bombs, and to batter the place with our great Guns. The Vice-Bassa, after having sent an Officer to the Duke of *Lorraine*, to acquaint him, That he wondred he would by acts of Hostility engage the Emperor and the Grand-Signior in a Quarrel,

and break the Peace, which as yet ought to be observed between them, caused two white Flags and a red one to be hung out upon the highest Tower of the Fortrefs. The Party which the Duke of *Lorraine* sent towards *Gran* have succeeded in their attempt, having burnt the Bridge of Boats which the Turks had laid over the *Danube*, and thereby prevented them from advancing towards our Camp. The Bassa of *Newheusel* (who was abroad when the place was invested) not being able to get in, is retired to *Gran*.

Vienna June 10. Yesterday being the Emperor's Birth-day, was observed here with great solemnity. Our Letters from the Imperial Camp say, That the Duke of *Lorraine* had besieged the Fortrefs of *Newheusel*, that he was already Master of the lower City, and hoped in a short time to compel the Turks to Surrender the Fortrefs, they having no expectation of Relief. On Monday last the Nobility of the Country of *Presburg*, to the number of 3000 Horse, joyned the Army before *Newheusel*, Captain *Crauz*, and some other Officers in Count *Starenberg's* Regiment of Foot, were slain in the Attack of the Lower-City.

Copenhagen, June 12. The Troops in the Provinces of *Funen* and *Fusland* have Orders to march forthwith for *Holstein*: The King's Horse Guards are already parted from hence for *Flensburg*, where they are to stay till his Majesty's arrival. One thousand Seamen are arrived here, and 1500 more are expected for the Service of the Fleet. His Majesty has issued out a Proclamation, commanding all his Subjects that have taken Service on Board the Ships of any Foreign Prince or State, to repair home immediately upon pain of Death. The King of *Sweden* has sent 300 Men to reinforce the Garrison of *Wisnar*.

Elseneur, June 16. Two days agoe 18 Danish Men of War came into this Road, and Sailed back again to *Copenhagen* without casting Anchor. It is believed, the King of *Denmark* was on Board them.

Ratisbonne, June 14. The 12th Instant the Elector of *Bavaria* passed through this place, in his return home; He has appointed a general Rendezvous of his Troops at *Herschebfeldt*, near *Ausbourg*. The States-General of the United Provinces have ordered their Minister here to go to *Munick*, to adjust some matters with his Electoral Highness, with relation to the Treaty of Guaranty between him and the said States. The Electoral Colledge have not as yet given an Answer to the Proposals made unto them by the Colledge of the Princes. The States of *Swaben* are assembled at *Ulm*, to consider of the best means for the defence of that Circle in the present juncture of Affairs, and have made a considerable progress in the matters depending before them.

Cologne, June 11. From *Munick* they write, That the Elector of *Bavaria* has appointed a Rendezvous of the Troops of that Circle, to be held,

near *Hersfeldt*, and that he will himself be present at it; and from *Frankfort* we have an account, That the Baron of *Weydenaw* was on the 31 past Elector Bishop of *Wirtzburg*, and the Baron of *Staufenberg* Bishop of *Bamberg*. The Commonalty here continue in Arms, and their Leaders have taken upon them to examine the *Sieur Fudendoncke* and the *Sieur Hesselman*, who are their Prisoners, and to give Orders for the framing a Process against Colonel *Cirpricht*, who commanded the *Militia*, and what these Tumults and Disorders will end in nobody can say.

Hamburg June 15. The Letters from *Copenhagen* say, that the King of *Denmark* intends to begin his Journey towards *Ephstein* on the 21 Instant; and that the King of *Sweden* was sending 18 Regiments to reinforce his Garrisons in *Schonen*. The new Fortifications that are making here are continued with all imaginable diligence and application. We are told, That the Elector of *Saxony*, the Dukes of *Brunswick* and *Lunenbourg*, and the Landgrave of *Hesse*, have entered into an Alliance for the Security and Defence of the upper and lower *Saxony*. It is said, That the Electors of *Saxony* and *Bavaria* are to have an Interview at *Dresden*.

Brussels, June 22. Our Letters from the Imperial Camp before *Newbuesel* of the eighth Instant say, That it was invested the second Instant; That the fourth the Duke of *Lorraine* arrived with his whole Army and Cannon before the place, and that the Turks finding he was resolved to attack it, burnt the Suburbs, and retired into the Citadel; That the Imperialists, in taking a small Out-work, had lost 16 or 17 Voluntiers, persons of Quality, among whom was Count *Anthony de Tassis*, younger Brother to the Prince de *la Tour*, and that about 20 more were wounded. The Letters add, That the Besiegers had three Batteries playing, and were advanced so near as to be lodged under the Counter-scarp, which they intended to attack that night, and doubted not of being Masters of the place within few days.

Brussels, June 23. Yesterday his Excellency went to visit the Camp at *Pieton* which consists of 4000 Horse, under the Command of the Prince de *Faudemont*, as General. Besides these there are in several Garrisons about 2000 dismounted Cavalry, for whom his Excellency is providing Horses. Next Week their Excellencies intend to go to *Engbien*, and from thence to *Marimont*. We hope our next Letters from *Vienna* will bring us the good News of the taking of *Newbuesel*, which the Turks have not Forces enough in the Field to relieve, the main Body of the Ottoman Army being not expected in *Hungary* till the beginning of the next Month. There are Letters which say, That the Turkish Army will consist of vast numbers, some speaking of 300000 Men, and these commanded by 77 Basha's, but that they are raw and unexperienced, drawn together from all parts of the Empire, and that they are extremely harrassed with their long Marches.

Hague, June 22. The Count de *Carelson*, natural Son to the late King of *Sweden*, is arrived here, and as it's said is to be Colonel of the *Walloon* Regiment in the Service of the States, in the room of Baron *Spär*, who is lately dead at *Stockholm*. Yesterday the Prince of *Orange* returned to *Hon-*

slaerdyke from *North-Holland*, being very well satisfied with the forwardness in which he found the Ships that are fitted out by that Admiralty. It is confidently reported, That the Prince of *Nassau*, Governor of *Friseland* and *Groningen*, is to be Married to the Princess of *Anhalt*. Yesterday the *Sieurs Notwegen* and *Roy* arrived here, being sent by the Duke of *Newbourg* to sollicite the Payment of the Arrears of Subsidies which are due unto him from this State. Our Letters from *Collogne* say, That affairs continue still in the same Confusion; but that there is great hopes that the differences depending between that Elector and the City of *Liege* may be speedily composed.

Paris, June 23. The 15th Instant their Most Christian Majesties parted from *Bellegarde*, and lay that night at *Dole*, and arrived the next at *Besancon*. The Troops that composed the Camp on the *Soane*, presently after the King parted from thence, decamped, and marched in several Brigades towards the *Saar*. The News of the Town is, That Monsieur du *Quefne* is arrived with the Fleet under his Command before *Algiers*; and that the Spaniards have refused him the use of their Ports. We are told, That the Nuncio is parted from *Orleans*, having received by an Express positive Orders from the Pope to repair without further delay to the French Court, and demand an Audience of his Majesty. The Archbishop of *Rheims*, Brother to Monsieur de *Louvois*, is very dangerously sick.

Deale, June 15. This day the *Ann*, Captain *Brown* Commander, arrived in the *Downs*, being bound for *Surat*.
