**T**his day was published a Proclamation, For the Apprehending Colonel John Rumsey, Richard Rumbold Maltster, Richard Nelthorpe Esq; Edward Wade Gent. Richard Goodenough Gent. Captain Walcot, William Thompson, James Burton, and William Hone Foyner.

**W**Hereas We have received Information upon Oath, That Colonel John Rumsey, Richard Rumbold Maltster, Richard Nelthorpe Esq; Edward Wade Gent.

Richard Goodenough Gent. Captain Walcot, William Thompson, James Burton, and William Hone Foyner, have Traiterously Conspired together, and with divers other ill-affected and desperate Persons of this Our Kingdom; to compass the Death and Destruction of Our Royal Person, and of our Dearest Brother James Duke of York; And to effect the same, have held several Treasonable Consultations, and made great Provision of Arms: And being given to understand that the said Criminals are fled, and left their Habitations to avoid the Justice of Our Laws; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Publish Our Royal Pleasure, And We do hereby strictly Charge and Command the said Colonel John Rumsey, Richard Rumbold, Richard Nelthorpe, Edward Wade, Richard Goodenough, Captain Walcot, William Thompson, James Burton, and William Hone, and every of them, forthwith to render themselves to some of Our Judges or Justices of Peace, in order to their Prosecution according to Law. And We do hereby Require and Command as well all and singular our Judges, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Constables, and Headboroughs, as also the Officers and Ministers of Our Ports, and all other our Subjects whatsoever within our Realm of England, Scotland, Ireland, or Dominion of Wales, and all other Our Dominions and Territories, to be diligent in enquiring and searching for the said Offenders in all places whatsoever, as well within Liberties as without: And if they shall happen to take any of them, or that they shall render themselves, Our further Will and Pleasure is, That they cause him or them so Apprehended, to be safely carried before the next Justice of the Peace to the place where he or they shall be Arrested, whom We strictly Charge to commit to Prison, and presently Inform Us, or Our Privy Council, of such Apprehension. And we do hereby further Declare and Publish, That if any Person or Persons, after this Our Proclamation, shall directly or indirectly conceal, harbour, keep, retain, or maintain the said Offenders, or any of them, or shall contrive or connive at any means whereby they or any of them may escape from being Taken or Arrested, or shall not use their best Endeavours for the Apprehension of them, as well by giving due Advertisement thereof to Our Officers, as by all other good means, We will (as there is just cause) proceed against them that shall so neglect this Our Commandment with all Severity. And We do also declare, That whatsoever shall discover the said Offenders, or any of them, either within our King-

doms of England Scotland, Ireland, or Dominion of Wales, or in any other Our Dominions and Territories, or elsewhere beyond the Seas, and shall cause them or any of them to be Apprehended and brought in as aforesaid, shall have a Reward of One hundred Pounds for each of the said Persons, to be paid unto him in Recompence of such his Service.

Given at our Honour of Hampton Court, this Twenty third day of June, in the Five and Thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

We are commanded to give Notice, That the Christian Name of Wade, mentioned in this Proclamation, is NATHANIEL, not EDWARD.

Whitehall, June 21. This evening, somewhat late, was brought Colonel John Rumsey to the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Jenkins's Office, in order to be Examined.

Lisbonne, May 24. The Sixteenth Instant the Duke de Cadaval, Mestre de Camp General of the Forces of this Kingdom, held a Review of the Troops which are quartered here, and in the adjacent Places, at which the Prince assisted incognito. We have advice from Madrid, that the new Generals of the Gallies of Naples, Sicily, and Sardinia, are parted from thence to take possession of their respective Commands.

Naples, June 1. The Navigation in these Seas has been of late so extremely infested by the Turkish Corsairs, that our Governor has been obliged to set forth four Gallies, who are appointed to Cruise near the Islands of Strongoli and Volcanello.

Genova, June 9. The seventh Instant arrived here the Four Brothers, Captain Breholt Commander, with Sugars, Tobacco, &c. from Lisbonne, Cadix, Alicanti, and Villa Franca. The Count de Martenitz, the Emperor's Envoy, is arrived here from Rome: the chief subject of his Negotiation here, as well as with the other Princes of Italy, is to desire an effectual supply either of Men or Money to enable his Imperial Majesty to prosecute the War against the Grand Signior. We have advice from Tripoli, That those Corsairs have six Ships at Sea; That they are setting forth two more, and have carried thither three Fresh Vessels. This Senate hath resolved to add another Half-Moon to the Fortifications which are making at Savona, (on which 1200 Men daily work) and have appointed Signior Grimaldi to be Governor of the place. The Senate have not as yet returned any Answer to the Memorial presented to them by the Sieur de St. Olonne, the French Minister, wherein he desires leave in the King his Masters name to erect a Magazine for Salt at Savona, for the use and supply of the Inhabitants of Montferrat.

Warsaw, June 4. The 28th past the Deputies of Sandomiria were admitted to an Audience of the King whom they humbly thanked in the name of the Inhabitants of that Province for the great care his Majesty had been pleased to take in the late General Dyet of the safety and preservation of the Kingdom, assuring him they will be ready on all occasions to employ their Lives and
