**T**HIS day was published a Proclamation, For the Apprehending of James Duke of Monmouth, Ford Lord Gray, Sir Thomas Armetrong Knight, and Robert Ferguson.

CHARLES R.

**W**Hereas We have received Information upon Oath, That James Duke of Monmouth, Ford Lord Gray, Sir Thomas Armetrong Knight, and Robert Ferguson, have Traiterously Conspired together, and with divers other ill-affected and desperate Persons of this Our Kingdom, to compass the Death and Destruction of Our Royal Person, and of Our Dearest Brother James Duke of York, And to effect the same, have held severall reasonable Consultations with Levy Men, and to make an Insurrection within this Our Kingdom; And being given to understand that the said Criminals are fled, and left their Habitations to avoid the Justice of Our Laws; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Publish Our Royal Pleasure, And We do hereby strictly Charge and Command the said James Duke of Monmouth, Ford Lord Gray, Sir Thomas Armetrong, and Robert Ferguson, and every of them, forthwith to render themselves to some of Our Judges or Justices of Peace, in order to their Prosecution according to Law. And We do hereby Require and Command as well all singular our Judges, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Constables, and Headboroughs, as also the Officers and Ministers of Our Ports, and all other our Subjects whatsoever within Our Realms of England, Scotland, Ireland, or Dominion of Wales, and all other Our Dominions and Territories, to be diligent in enquiring and searching for the said Offenders in all places whatsoever, as well within Liberties as without: And if they shall happen to take any of them, or that they shall render themselves, Our further Will and Pleasure is, That they cause him or them so Apprehended, to be safely carried before the next Justice of the Peace to the place where he or they shall be Arrested, whom We strictly Charge to commit to Prison, and presently Inform Us, or Our Privy Council, of such Apprehension. And we do hereby further Declare and Publish, That if any Person or Persons, after this Our Proclamation, shall directly or indirectly conceal, harbour, keep, retain, or maintain the said Offenders, or any of them, or shall connive or connive at any means whereby they or any of them may escape from being Taken or Arrested, or shall not use their best Endeavours for the Apprehension of them, as well by giving due Advertisement thereof to Our Officers, as by all other good means, We will (as there is just cause) proceed against them that shall so neglect this Our Commandment with all Severity. And We do also Declare, That whatsoever shall discover the said Offenders, or any of them, either within our Kingdoms of England, Scotland, Ireland, or Dominion of Wales, or in any other Our Dominions, and Territo-

ries, or elsewhere beyond the Seas, and shall cause them or any of them to be Apprehended and brought in as aforesaid, shall have a Reward of Five hundred Pounds for each of the said Persons, to be paid unto him in Recompence of such his Service.

Given at Our Court at Whitehal this Twentieth eighth day of June, 1683. In the Fifth and thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

Copenhagen, June 12. Count Guldenshten has taken  
 leave of his Majesty, in order to his departure  
 for Norway. The Count de Roy will very sud-  
 denly take a review of the Danish forces.

Vienna, June 17. Count Tekeley hath sent to ac-  
 quaint the Emperor, that he has received an Or-  
 der from the Grand Vizier, whereby he is com-  
 manded either to burn or put Caravans into the  
 Belg. Towns. Yesterday their Imperial Majesties  
 returned hither from Luxembourg: We have advice,  
 That Count Key having with 200 Croats, and  
 the like number of Hussars, met near Barkab, with  
 800 Turks, was repulsed by them, with the loss  
 of 25 of his Men. The Palatine of Hungary has  
 taken the strong Castle of Suran, two Leagues from  
 Nitria, as also another, called Aquan, and caused  
 both of these to be demolished.

Vienna, June 20. The Count de Caprats, the  
 Emperor's Envoy with the Grand Signior, having by  
 his Letter of the 25th past acquainted his Imperial  
 Majesty, That the Grand Vizier was expected on  
 the first Instant to effect, and that the Troops of  
 Asia followed him by early March 3, the Emperor  
 has thereupon commanded the Duke of Lorraine to  
 Post himself with the Imperial Army at St. Gotard,  
 where he will be reinforced with 3000 Foot un-  
 der the Command of the Duke de Croÿ, and 800  
 Dragoons of the Prince of Savoy. The Viceroy  
 of Croatia is Encamped with a Body of 4000 Men  
 on the River Drave, to observe the motions of  
 the Turks, and secure the Country from the Incur-  
 sions of the Garrisons of Canisa, and other places  
 belonging to the Turks. The Passages on the Raab  
 are fortified, and the Counts of Trajswitz and Bu-  
 diam are appointed to Guard them with a Body  
 of 6000 Hungarians. The Prince of Libomirski  
 and General Schurz are Encamped near Tran-  
 schin. Our Letters from Roland say, That that King  
 is sending a considerable Detachment towards Tran-  
 sylvania, to make a diversion, and hinder the suc-  
 cesses of Hslyes Abassi and Count Tekeley with the  
 Grand Vizier, whose Army, according to our  
 fresh Letters, will not consist of above 9000  
 effective Men. Count Tekeley having obtained an  
 assurance from the Grand Signior, That he shall  
 be safe in his Person and Family, is gone to meet  
 the Grand Vizier, having taken with him a Guard  
 of 500 Hays, and some of the chief of the No-  
 bility of Hungary, to prevent their accommodation  
 with the Emperor during his absence. The Duke  
 of Lorraine has ordered the great Guns to be  
 brought to Leopoldstadt and Raab. The Grand Pri-  
 nce of Hungary is Encamped on the Rivers of Mur  
 and the Drave, with a Body of 15000 Men.

Ratisbonne, June 21. Our Letters from Vienna  
 confirm the News which the last Post brought us,  
 of the raising of the Siege of Newhausel, and that  
 on the sixth Instant Count Starenberg having com-  
 manded Captain Krause to Post himself near a  
 Church, not far from the Bridge of Newhausel, he  
 accordingly performed it, but being not well se-  
 conded, and 500 Janizaries Saltyng out of the Place  
 at the same time he and most of his Men, toge-

ther with the Counts of Taxis and Kazianer,  
 were killed by the Turks, who placed their Heads  
 upon Poles on the Bulwark towards the Army,  
 and being Masters of the Church, burnt in it all  
 the Bodies of the Christians. The Diet have not  
 as yet taken into deliberation the point of the  
 Publick Security.

Frankfort, June 24. The Imperial Army is still  
 Encamped near Comorra. We have advice from Vi-  
 enna, That the Grand Signior arrived at Breicks-  
 Weissenberg, on the 12th of May, and was Lodged  
 in the House of the Company of Eastern Merchants;  
 That the 17th the Army arrived there, and that  
 after having continued there a Week, they were  
 to March further into Hungary. The Letters add,  
 That since the raising the Siege of Newhausel, the  
 Turks have already strengthened that Garrison with  
 two Basso's and 3000 Janizaries, and more are  
 expected.
