He 13th Inftant the Dutch Fleet paffed by Dartmouth, and went into Torbay, the wind at South-Weft, their number about 56 fail, the next morming the wind comming to North-Eaf, and North North-Eaft, about feven of the clock they weighed, and about two in the afternoon the headmost of their Fleet came in view of this Port, when the wind com-ming to North North-West the whole Fleet appearing for some time, plyed clof: to get near the shore, but it blowing very hard, they were forced to keep off, and with much difficulty got that night to an Anchor, being then about 42 fail in view 3 about this time they happened upon a small Fisherboar, by whom they learnt the news of the arrival of the Virginia Fleet, which was immediately communicated to the A misl, who that night called a Councel, and about 12 of one of the clock, fent off the greatest part of the Fliet towards For, where he heard there we e put in a confiderable part of the Virginia Fleet, only three of the Dutch continuing at an Anchor, and fix others plying to and fro upon thele Coafts, who all about noon followed efter the reft to the Westwards. Yesterday by nine in the morning 34 fail of the E temy came to an Anchor before the Harbor at Foy, fome of them spor aching within half Canon fhot, and fending a Galli e to found the Mouth of the Harbor. In the Afternoon two of their thips came up near the fhore, and with their Broadfides plyed the new raifed Works at the entry into the Harbor, but were fo warmiy enterrained from thence, and by feveral Guns planted along the shore, that after on hour and halfes Dispute, they were forced to reitre, with feveral flots received in their Hulls, and the lofs of one of their Top-Mans, with leveral of their men, without any loss on out file, the County Forces, both horse and Foot, being ready to receive them, and both Seamen and Souldiers active and full of Courage, and good flore of boats well manned lying ready to attend them, if their Courage will lead them on with the nex. Stable being afterwards fent out of Town to their Quarter provided for them, the Gstes of the Town were immediately four, and the Streets barrleado'd and chain'd : The next day, the Conftable, in a very rich Charlo, preceded by the Ma Rail of his Court and the principal Officers of his Army, and many Trumpeter', went to the Town-House, where the Burgomafters stood ready to receive him at the door ; and after an Elequent Speech made to him by their Pensionary, th.y conducted him to a Chair under a tich Canopy of State, where, with the u'ual Ceremonies, the City did him H .mage, according to the Agreement by the la e Treaty; and then the Ratificati. ons were interchangeally delivered, and the Acts delivered by the Chancellour : which done, they prefented the Conftable with a rich Prefent, Treating him the next day at a very liberal Dinner, which was by the Confab'e returned them with another in the Arch-bishop Palace where he lodged.
